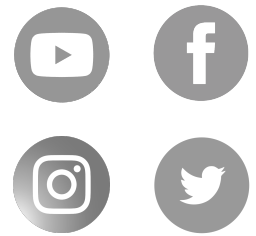

We pray especially for Deirdre McGowan, Margaret Boyle and Rita Nunan who died recently. We pray for Phillip Murray, Patrick Devine, Francis D’Souza, Jimi Delaney, Zosia Szakacs and all whose anniversaries occur at this time. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. We pray for all those who work in Brixton Prison as guards, caterers, chaplains, medical staff, cleaners, porters and mental health professionals: we especially remember our chaplains Deacon Joseph, Sr Janina and all those who help the chaplaincy. We ask for God to help all prisoners at this time who cannot be visited (especially those in solitary confinement), that they will be helped to reform their lives, repent and start again.

Some years ago, I was introduced to the Eisenhower decision matrix. As I recall, it stressed organising your life so that you are not constantly bombarded by urgent tasks but rather focus more on important items. The disciples attempt to do this in our first reading through sharing out their work, so the primary importance of spreading the Gospel is not neglected. They adhere to the insistence of Jesus about the first commandment of the law being fulfilled; loving God first and foremost; this is the source of our charity and our charity is to offer ourselves in this life. This offering of self is the way in which we are all priests, as St Peter teaches in our Second Reading; through charity, kindness to a colleague, praying with one another, giving care, education and good example to children, ‘phoning a lonely friend or volunteering. In short, each time we choose God or another person, and make a sacrifice to do so, we make an offering (a gift); we are a priestly person. The ministerial priesthood offers Jesus’ one supreme sacrifice making him sacramentally present and enabling him to feed us spiritually. Our common priesthood involves the offering of gift and sacrifice in our own lives by which we make Christ present to others and attract them to know, love and serve Him. **Deacon Dermott**

Deirdre McGowan RIP: Deirdre McGowan, wife to Bill (who plays the guitar in our 10:30 Mass music group) and mother to Niamh (who served at the altar and is now studying at Liverpool University) passed away last Saturday afternoon in Guy's Hospital. She worked as a specialist nurse caring for those with diabetes. She ran the plant stall at our Summer Fair with her sister, Mary McGowan, and was a Eucharistic Minister in the parish. Many individuals have shared their stories of Deirdre's sensitive and kind nature. May she rest in peace.

St Damien of Molokai: Today would ordinarily be the memorial of [St Damien of Molokai](#) (short video via link) and it's a feast that's replaced by the Sunday (as is usual liturgical practice). It's good, however, for us not to forget the example of St Damien particularly in this time. He was alive at the end of the 19th century and declared a saint by Pope Benedict XVI in 2009. He was ordained a priest on the island of Hawaii at the age of 24 and then, four years later, discerned a call to serve on the Kalaupapa Peninsula, Hawaii. A leper colony had been founded there by the State where those with leprosy were quarantined. Fr Damien brought order to the place; built houses, schools and the Church which still stands. He coordinated medical care for lepers and dignified burial of the deceased. He caught leprosy (which he eventually died from) himself but continued to work while unwell deriving strength from his devotion to Our Lady and the Eucharist saying **"it is at the foot of the altar that we find the strength we need in our isolation."** St Damien of Molokai, pray for us!
