We have the Sandhills, two time zones, thousands of miles of rivers, the only publicly-accessible chalk mine in the United States (near Scotia and North Loup), the largest handplanted forest in the Western Hemisphere (near Halsey and Thedford), the largest railroad classification yard on the planet (Bailey Yard in North Platte, the Golden Spike Tower provides an aerial view), the world's best zoo (Omaha Zoo), the Archway (Kearney), the spring sandhill crane migration (the largest gathering of cranes on earth, Platte River) the Pine Ridge, the Loess Hills, the Bohemian Alps, Chimney Rock, the Wildcat Hills, Ionia Volcano (near Newcastle), the smallest incorporated community on the planet (Monowi in Boyd County), Carhenge (Alliance), the only Chokecherry Jamboree (Sargent), the Greeley Irish Festival (in Greeley), the Loup County World's Fair (Taylor), Nebraska's Great Lakes region (Calamus, Sherman, Davis Creek, and Ericson lakes), the Rainwater Basin, the Bartak Crater (near Merna), Toadstool Geologic Park (in Sioux County), Ashfall Fossil Beds State Historical Park (in Antelope County), the largest common snapping turtle alive on earth (Big Snap Daddy lives at Schramm Park State Recreation Area and Education Center near Gretna), National Museum of Roller Skating (Lincoln), the world's longest main street (O Street in Lincoln), world's largest covered porch swing (Hebron), world's largest plow (Gothenburg), America's largest indoor rainforest (Omaha Zoo), world's largest ball of stamps (the 600-pounder at Boy's Town near Omaha is plastered with nearly 5 million stamps), world's largest shamrock (O'Neill), world's largest

maze (a corn maze near Denton), world's largest time capsule (Seward, scheduled to be opened in 2025), world's largest covered wagon (sort of, near Milford), Berrypepper Days (Creighton), Annevar (an annual celebration in Ravenna), Scratchtoberfest (Ord), Fort Cody Trading Post (North Platte), Harold Warp's Pioneer Village (Minden), Hudson-Meng Bison Bonebed (Sioux County), Bigfoot Crossroads of America Museum and Research Center (Hastings), Ole's Big Game Steakhouse and Lounge (Paxton), the Taylor Villagers (Taylor), the International Quilt Museum (Lincoln), Fred's Flying Circus (Grand Island), Museum of the Fur Trade (Chadron), one-time smallest courthouse in America (now a museum in Arthur), (Pilgrim Holiness Church (also in Arthur and made of straw bales), Strategic Air Command and Aerospace Museum (Ashland), Fort Hartsuff State Historical Park (Valley County), the Potter Sundry (birthplace of the Tin-Roof Sundae in Potter), Standing Bear Bridge (Niobrara), Kolach Days (Verdigre), Kool-Aid Days (Hastings), Klown Doll Museum (Plainview), world's largest pair of overalls (Nebraska State Fairgrounds, Grand Island), world's largest collection of marbles (Lee's Legendary Marbles and Collectibles in York), the Bob Kerrey Pedestrian Bridge in Omaha, and the Mignery Sculpture Garden (Bartlett).
