*The Children's Advocacy Center of Northeastern Pennsylvania is a private, non-profit, charitable organization whose mission is to provide excellence in the assessment and treatment of child abuse and neglect. CAC/NEPA provides medical assessments and child forensic interviews for victims of abuse and neglect and coordinates a multidisciplinary team response to child abuse and neglect in Lackawanna and surrounding counties of Northeastern Pennsylvania. The Center provides child abuse prevention education to professionals and communities served.*

Crisis Receiving and Stabilization Unit (CRSU):

*A 24-hour walk-in facility located at Scranton Counseling Center, 329 Cherry Street Scranton, PA 18505, the CRSU is available to divert crisis situations where individuals may need added support on a 24-hour basis but do not quite need the level of safety support provided by an inpatient psychiatric hospital. Crisis counselors can help connect these individuals with services and resources to be successful in the community. It is an 8-bed unit that provides a less restrictive option to help manage individuals in crisis. \*NOTE: You must be 18 years of age and had already graduated from high school\**

*Marley's Mission is a group program that focuses on students who have experienced trauma. A "groundwork" based facility, Marley's Mission allows students to express and process emotions in a non-clinical setting.*

They have discovered friends who understand, as few others can. They have found the tools to help themselves – which can indirectly help their alcoholic relatives or loved ones. Contentment and even happiness is possible whether the alcoholic is still drinking or not. Alateen, a vital part of the Al-Anon Family Groups, is for younger members seeking help while walking through life with an alcoholic parent, other close relative or friend. Teens meet to share their experience, strength, and hope, gaining a better understanding of the disease of alcoholism and themselves. The support found in Alateen helps with personal development and the troubled thinking that is often associated with growing up in an alcoholic home.*

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## CROSS at Holy Cross High School

**What is CROSS?:** *The CROSS program is a team process used to mobilize school resources to remove barriers to learning. CROSS is designed to confidentially identify academic, social, attendance, substance use, mental health, and other concerns which pose a barrier to student success. The primary goal of the program is to help students overcome these barriers so that they may achieve, advance, and remain in school.*

**Who is CROSS?:** *Mrs. Bravis, Mr. DeGrazia, Mr. Higley, Mrs. Hudak, Mrs. Kanuik, Mrs. Morrison, Mr. Musso, Mrs. Taylor (Coordinator). The HCHS CROSS team also includes Community Representatives from Lackawanna/ Susquehanna Office of Drug & Alcohol Programs and Scranton Counseling Center.*

**What is the purpose of CROSS?:** *To provide assistance to students, in order to help remove barriers to learning*

**Who can access CROSS?:** *Anyone can utilize CROSS (Teachers, parents, guardians, guidance, administration, office staff, students, etc.)*

**How can I access CROSS?:** *To refer a student, please contact a member of our CROSS team.*

**What happens if a student is referred?:** *If someone is referred, there is a process to validate the referral through observation. If warranted, parents and/or guardians will be contacted. They must give us permission, in order to pursue the referral. The process requires various units of support and we will work to make sure that everyone is on board. The CROSS team also has access to community resources that can assist.*

**CROSS is NOT...:** *A discipline board or group that administers punishment if someone is referred or judges those who are referred.*
