Friends Funding @ Work



Oral History Digitization Project: Thanks to Friends funding, the Littleton Museum was able to work with Northeast Document Conservation Center to digitize a large portion of its oral history recordings. The project involved digitizing 29 open-reel tapes and 40 cassette tapes from the museum's first oral histories in 1974 up through 2010. In addition, the museum was able to rehouse the openreel tapes into archivally stable containers. Digitizing all the oral histories will eventually lead to unprecedented access to the recordings for researchers and museum staff alike.



Photography Equipment Upgrade: The

Littleton Museum's Collections division purchased a new camera, lens, lighting and tripod with funds provided by the Friends. With the new equipment, the museum is able to produce high-quality photographs of objects in the Permanent Collection. The photographs are accessible to researchers and members of the public through the museum's PastPerfect Online program, and they contribute to a deeper understanding of the objects that we hold in our collection.




