When you find yourself at a Friends concert or program this summer, be sure to stop by and say "hello"!



Drawing on au courant color palettes, expressionistic art strategies and her Lakota traditions, See-Walker spins her work into a contemporary vision to elevate historical perspectives as told from the side not often heard.
