Squirrel vs. Window

During the long closure of the museum due to the pandemic, staff kept the historic buildings closed. Over this period, a squirrel got into the Isaac McBroom cabin on the 1860s farm. In a panic to find its way out, the squirrel gnawed up the wooden

windowpanes, damaging the windows beyond repair. Eventually, the rodent escaped, and staff noticed the damage to the two ground floor windows. (The current windows are not original; they were installed after

a 1991 break-in.)

Longtime volunteer and master carpenter John Marchetti, under the supervision of Museum Facilities Technician Keith Wynkoop, undertook the project in stages, working on one section of window at a time in an isolated work area. First, the original window was removed, and was temporarily replaced with a large piece of acrylic. Then, the window was carefully measured and examined to see how it was originally built. The third step had John cutting and assembling new pieces of soft pine wood (either spruce or fir) in the same







manner, all to match the window's historic look.

The final step was was to stain the new wood to blend in and mimic the historic look of weathered logs on the cabin. John and Keith investigated a variety of wood staining processes. The first attempt involved a "tea" of vinegar and steel wool, which corrodes and creates a dark brown stain, depending upon how long the steel wool is immersed in the vinegar. John tested the darkness of the stain on scrap wood, but the overall look was too gray.

After consultation with curatorial staff, they decided to apply a light coating of store-bought stain, and then use a wire brush to lightly rough up the surface to simulate weathering. Finally, a coating of boiled linseed oil would be brushed over all exposed areas of wood, before in-

stalling the panes of glass and remounting the window into the cabin.

While the historic buildings on the site are not protected with a historic building designation, as part of the Littleton Museum complex, the buildings are maintained using internationally recognized professional standards and best practices, and are considered part of the museum's collection.

Museum Access: To see the McBroom cabin, the museum is open Tuesday–Saturday, 9 a.m.–3 p.m. (closed Sundays, Mondays, and major holidays). Reservations and masks are required for entry into the museum. Call 303-795-3950 to make reservations.
