Every Thursday in October: Senior Social Club. We're ready to meet in person once again. Please join us for our weekly chat in Sophie's Place at the front of the library. Be prepared for some special guests at one of our get-togethers—sweet dogs from the Humane Society of the South Platte Valley will stop by for cuddles. 9–11:30 a.m.

Oct. 1: Mundo Mistico—Equatorial Guinea.* These monthly classes invite students to learn about Spanish language and culture through the unique lens of different countries. Attend in person or via Zoom. 9:30 a.m.

Oct. 2: The Dangers of Censorship: Banned Books Week Wrap-Up. Libraries stand against censorship and promote the right to read. But some books can be hard to defend. This interactive discussion wraps up a week of focusing on books that have been challenged and invites participants to think about difficult books and the value they still have for readers. 2 p.m.

Oct. 12: Ray Miller: The Journey of a Closeted Pastor. Ray Miller lived with the possibility of disaster for 79 years. If he had been publicly outed as a gay man, his ordination in the United Methodist Church would have been revoked, his marriage ended, and his family devastated. Despite all that, his story has hope and humor. Join this local author to hear about his journey as a Christian gay man before gay rights were recognized or protected. 2 p.m.

Oct. 14: A Musical Journey to Japan.

Classically trained musician Yoko Hiraoka will perform on the koto (Japanese 13-stringed zither) and sing beautiful melodies of Japan while sharing poems, images and stories with each song in this introduction to Japanese culture and history. 2 p.m.

Oct. 18: Native Americans of Colorado with Active Minds. Learn about Colorado's Native American history and legacy through civilizations of the Ute, Cheyenne, Arapaho, Pueblo and other tribes. 2 p.m.

Oct. 2: <u>Friends Craft Fair.</u> Shop 200+ curated vendors at our 50th anniversary craft fair at Ketring Park. 9 a.m.–4 p.m.

Through Oct. 16: <u>Print Renaissance</u>—Mid-century Masters of American Print Making. Featuring 18 artworks representing artists working alongside skilled printmakers.

Nov. 5–27: Secret Life of Clothes. This exhibit tells the everyday story of the "lifecycle" of clothes: The overlooked journey of clothing as a progression from fiber to finished garment, sale to storage, and finally to mending, disposal or reuse.

Nov. 12–Dec. 31: <u>Own an Original</u>. The 56th Annual Own an Original art competition features Colorado artists working in any art medium (except photography) with the theme of "Together (Again)."
