The History of Veterans Day and How It's Celebrated in the U.S.

V eterans Day, observed annually

on November 11, is a day of remembrance and gratitude for the men and women who have served in the U.S. military. While the day's origins trace back to the end of World War I, it has evolved into a solemn occasion for honoring the bravery, sacrifice, and dedication of all U.S. veterans. The Significance of November 11

The date of November 11 is significant not just as a commemoration of the armistice, but as a day for reflecting on the sacrifices made by those who have served in the armed forces. The specific timing of the observance—at the 11th hour—is a powerful symbol of the final

cessation of hostilities during World War I, and it continues to serve as a reminder of the human cost of war.



How Veterans Day Is Celebrated

Veterans Day is a federal holiday, but the way it is observed varies across the country. Here are some common ways Americans honor veterans:

- Ceremonies and Parades: Across the U.S., cities and towns hold parades and ceremonies to honor veterans. The largest of these is in New York City, where veterans march down Fifth Avenue, and in Washington, D.C., where a ceremony is held at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. The ceremony at Arlington, which includes the laying of a wreath and a moment of silence, is broadcast to millions.
- Schools and Community Events: Many schools hold assemblies or invite veterans to speak to students about their experiences. Local communities may host luncheons or special programs to bring veterans and civilians together in a spirit of appreciation.
- Moment of Silence: At 11:00 AM on November 11th, a moment of silence is observed nationwide to honor those who gave their lives in service to the country. This pause is often marked by official observances, as well as personal reflections.





• The National Veterans Day Ceremony: Held at the Arlington National Cemetery, the National Veterans Day Ceremony is a highlight of the observance. The ceremony includes the laying of wreaths at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, an important tradition that acknowledges the sacrifices made by those who are missing in action or whose remains were never identified.

• Businesses and Special Deals: Many businesses show their appreciation for veterans by offering special discounts or free meals on Veterans Day. Retailers, restaurants, and entertainment venues often run promotions to say "thank you" to those who served in the military.

The Importance of Veterans Day Today

While Veterans Day began as a remembrance of World War I, it is now an inclusive holiday that recognizes all U.S. military veterans. The holiday offers a moment to reflect on the sacrifices that veterans have made in defending the freedoms enjoyed by citizens. Operation Comfort Warriors

The American Legion delivers comfort items to military hospitals, warrior transition units, and other facilities worldwide, bringing hope and support to our service members during their recovery.

While the care at many military hospitals and warrior transition units is extraordinary, The American Legion's Operation Comfort Warriors program was created to provide nonessential items that help wounded warriors recover but don't usually show up as a budget line on government spreadsheets.

How Operation Comfort Warriors Works:

The Legion contacts officials at military hospitals, warrior transition units and surrounding communities, and obtains lists to determine which items are needed by wounded, injured or ill service-members. Once a need is identified, the items are ordered by the Legion and delivered in an expeditious manner. It's as simple as that. No red tape.

Most military medical centers are not equipped to store large quantities of care packages. The Legion strongly prefers monetary donations so that it can expedite the purchase and delivery of items to troops.

Pay The Coast Guard

"Coast Guard personnel are vital to national security, but they serve in the only military branch working without pay during government shutdowns. The Department of Homeland Security, not the Department of Defense, oversees the Coast Guard. That means that during shutdowns Homeland Security employees — Coasties and others — are not paid.

While the Coast Guard is not a part of DoD, its role involving national security on our nation's borders and around the world is equally vital to the work our military performs. The Coast Guard provides law enforcement, port security, and maritime and coastal safety, while too often operating outdated equipment and vessels.

Organized under the Department of Homeland Security since 2003, more than 50,000 members of the U.S. Coast Guard operate a multi-mission, interoperable fleet of 259 cutters, 200 fixed and rotary-wing aircraft, and more than 1,600 boats and vessels. Previous government shutdowns caused members of the Coast Guard to temporarily lose pay and benefits, resulting in unnecessary financial burdens, and significant degradation in readiness. During the 2019 government shutdown, The American Legion stepped up and issued more than \$1 million in expedited Temporary Financial Assistance grants to Coast Guard personnel and their families.

The American Legion believes that the Coast Guard's mission is essential to national security, and its personnel should never go without pay. H.R.2693 - *the Pay Our Coast Guard Parity Act of 2023* would make appropriations for Coast Guard pay in the event an appropriations Act expires, providing the same protection for personnel that the other U.S. Armed Forces branches have.

With the risk of potential government shutdowns still in play, I urge you to support the men and women in the Coast Guard by ensuring that their pay and allowances are protected just as they are for other branches of our military. The Pay Our Coast Guard Parity Act would accomplish this by making appropriations for Coast Guard pay in the event an appropriations Act expires before a new one is passed. I urge you to be a part of the effort to protect these brave young men and women, and co-sponsor H.R. 2693 before another government shutdown is upon us.


