

Please listen and take all of this seriously. As always, please advise if we can assist you in any way to accomplish these requirements.


Initiation of New Members

America's Mission to the Moon and Mars: The Role of American Companies and SpaceX's Accomplishments

Dragon: Before Starship, SpaceX's Crew Dragon successfully transported astronauts to the International Space Station (ISS), marking the first crewed commercial spaceflight. This technology is foundational for further human space missions.

Falcon 9 and Falcon Heavy: These rockets have been instrumental in launching satellites and cargo to orbit, including NASA's payloads, showcasing SpaceX's capability in providing reliable, reusable launch vehicles.

Accomplishments: SpaceX has achieved numerous firsts, including the first private company to successfully return a spacecraft from orbit, the first to launch a crewed spacecraft to the ISS, and pivotal milestones in rocket reusability which directly support cost-effective lunar and Mars missions.

Blue Origin: Blue Origin, founded by Jeff Bezos, has been developing its own lunar lander, the Blue Moon, aiming to be part of NASA's lunar strategy. Although not selected for the initial Artemis landing, Blue Origin's technology continues to be developed with future missions in mind.



Dynetics: A subsidiary of Leidos, Dynetics proposed a human landing system for Artemis, featuring innovative approaches to landing and ascent operations from the lunar surface. While their design wasn't chosen for initial missions, their concepts contribute to the broader ecosystem of lunar exploration technology.

Intuitive Machines: Known for their Nova-C lander, Intuitive Machines has been contracted under NASA's Commercial Lunar Payload Services (CLPS) to deliver scientific and technological payloads to the Moon. Their successful IM-1 mission in 2024 marked the first American lunar landing since Apollo, emphasizing private sector capabilities in lunar exploration

Lunar Outpost Inc.: This company works on lunar rovers and mobility systems, crucial for surface exploration and logistics, which are integral for establishing a lunar base and for future Mars missions.

Challenges and Innovations

- Reusability: SpaceX's focus on reusable rockets has set a precedent, making space travel economically viable for repeated missions to the Moon and Mars. This concept is central to reducing the cost barrier for space exploration.
- In-Situ Resource Utilization (ISRU): Developing technologies to use local resources on the Moon and Mars for fuel, water, and construction materials is another area where companies like SpaceX are innovating, aiming to make long-term habitation feasible.
- Public-Private Collaboration: The model where government sets the vision and private companies execute, innovate, and compete has proven effective. However, it also brings challenges like ensuring safety standards, coordinating timelines, and managing intellectual property rights.

Future Outlook:

- Mars: SpaceX's ultimate goal is human settlement on Mars, with Starship being central to this vision. The plan involves not just short visits but establishing a self-sufficient colony, with initial uncrewed missions scheduled for the late 2020s to test landing and habitat technologies.
- Moon: Beyond Artemis III, regular lunar missions are anticipated, with a focus on building infrastructure for a sustainable human presence, which could involve commercial activities like mining or tourism.

SpaceX has significantly shaped America's path back to the Moon and towards Mars through pioneering reusable rocket technology, innovative spacecraft design, and strategic partnerships with NASA. While other companies like Blue Origin, Dynetics, and Intuitive Machines contribute uniquely, SpaceX's accomplishments stand out for their transformative impact on the economics and feasibility of space exploration. As these partnerships evolve, the synergy between public ambition and private innovation continues to push the boundaries of what's possible in space, aiming for a future where humans are not just visitors but residents of the cosmos.

Ensuring America's Freedoms: The Strategic Partnership of SpaceX and Other American Companies with the U.S. Space Force and Air Force

The landscape of national defense has expanded beyond Earth's atmosphere, with space becoming a critical domain for strategic military operations. The U.S. Space Force, established to protect U.S. interests in space, has found robust partners in American private sector entities, particularly SpaceX, but also other key players. This partnership aims at safeguarding America's freedoms both on Earth and in space, through a combination of technological innovation, infrastructure development, and operational support.

SpaceX's Starshield initiative is specifically tailored for military applications, providing secure satellite communications for the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD). Starshield leverages the technology behind SpaceX's Starlink to offer capabilities like high-speed broadband, space domain awareness, and alternative positioning, navigation, and timing (PNT). The Space Force has awarded SpaceX contracts worth \$70 million for this service, highlighting its importance in military

SpaceX has been a vital part of the National Security Space Launch (NSSL) program, which includes launching sensitive national security payloads into orbit. Through multiple contracts, SpaceX has been awarded tasks for launching military satellites, including those for missile warning, intelligence, and communications. This role is crucial for maintaining the U.S.'s space-based strategic advantages.

In a groundbreaking move, SpaceX has been contracted to demonstrate technologies for point-to-point space transportation, which could revolutionize military logistics by delivering cargo anywhere on Earth quickly. This project, under the Air Force Research Laboratory, explores using SpaceX's heavy rockets for global logistics, emphasizing humanitarian aid and disaster relief.

SpaceX is developing a network of spy satellites under a classified \$1.8 billion contract with the National Reconnaissance Office (NRO). This initiative aims to enhance U.S. intelligence-gathering capabilities in space with hundreds of satellites forming a network for persistent Earth observation.

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Other American Companies' Involvement:

Blue Origin: While not as deeply integrated into military operations as SpaceX, Blue Origin has competed for launch services under the NSSL program. Their New Glenn rocket is anticipated to play a role in future national security launches, potentially diversifying the launch options for military payloads.

United Launch Alliance (ULA): A joint venture between Boeing and Lockheed Martin, ULA has maintained a significant role in national security launches. Their Vulcan rocket is designed to meet the specific needs of the military, offering another pillar of launch capability alongside SpaceX for critical missions.

Northrop Grumman, Rocket Lab, Astra, Virgin Orbit: These companies are part of the broader ecosystem expanding the capabilities of the U.S. in space. They offer various services from small satellite launches to innovative propulsion systems, contributing to the resilience and diversity of U.S. space operations. The Space Force has expressed interest in leveraging these capabilities to ensure operational flexibility and innovation in space.



Strategic Benefits:

- Enhanced Space Situational Awareness: Through partnerships with these companies, the U.S. can better monitor space activities, detect potential threats, and manage space traffic, ensuring that America's space assets are protected.
- Rapid Deployment and Resupply: The ability to quickly deploy satellites or other assets in response to global events is enhanced, providing strategic advantages in terms of intelligence, surveillance, reconnaissance (ISR), and communication.
- Innovation and Cost Reduction: By fostering partnerships with commercial space companies, the military benefits from cutting-edge technology developed by the private sector, often at a lower cost due to competition and innovation.
- Security of Communication and Navigation: The reliance on space for GPS, secure communications, and intelligence gathering means these partnerships are vital in maintaining and defending these capabilities from adversaries.

Challenges and Considerations:

- Security and Control: The integration of private sector capabilities into military operations raises concerns about control over critical infrastructure and the security of sensitive operations.
- Dependence on Private Entities: The military's increasing reliance on private companies for space missions could pose risks if commercial interests diverge from national security needs.

A HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO WORK MORE CLOSELY WITH JAPAN ON TRADE ISSUES AND FOREIGN INVESTMENT, EXPRESSING SUPPORT TO THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS FOR THE UNITED STATES-JAPAN ALLIANCE AND REMORSE AT THE SLAYING OF FORMER JAPANESE PRIME MINISTER ABE SHINZŌ, CELEBRATING ONE HUNDRED THIRTY YEARS OF FRIENDSHIP BETWEEN NORTH CAROLINA AND JAPAN, AND REAFFIRMING THE BONDS OF FRIENDSHIP AND COOPERATION BETWEEN THE STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA AND STATE OF JAPAN IN THE REIWA ERA.

Whereas, North Carolina and Japan have enjoyed 130 years of friendly relations since Japan sent its first student nationals, Mogi Shinzaburō, to attend the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1893, and Sugishita Teisaku, to attend North Carolina State University (then "North Carolina State College") in 1894; and

Whereas, Japan is North Carolina's second-largest foreign investor, with nearly \$5 billion invested by Japanese companies in North Carolina's economy to date and nearly \$7 billion in investment announced since 2018; and

Whereas, more large companies investing in North Carolina come from Japan than any other foreign nation; and

Whereas, Japan employs over 24,000 North Carolina workers, or roughly 10% of all North Carolina workers employed by foreign companies, with over 5,000 additional jobs announced by Japanese companies since 2018; and

Whereas, trade with Japan annually accounts for nearly \$4 billion in economic activity for the State of North Carolina; and

Whereas, Japan and the United States have been close allies since 1952, safeguarding peace in the Pacific; and

Whereas, the post-war order of which both the United States and Japan have been resolute defenders and beneficiaries, an order which rests soundly on democracy and friendly trade, faces subversion by rogue actors and disaffected nations; and




