SAMSUNG AMERICAN LEGION SCHOLARSHIP

In 1995, worldwide electronics leader Samsung endowed a scholarship fund of \$5 million to be administered by The American Legion. Meant to show appreciation for U.S. veterans who came to Korea's aid during its struggle against communist forces during the Korean War, the Samsung American Legion Scholarship program established a series of scholarships derived from the interest and other income from the principal amount.

Scholarship applications are only available to high school juniors who attend the current session of either an American Legion Boys State or Auxiliary Girls State program, and who are a direct descendant, i.e., child, grandchild, great grandchild, etc., or a legally adopted child, of a wartime U.S. military veteran who served on active duty during at least one of the periods of war officially designated as eligibility dates for American Legion membership.

Post Service Officer Info

ach National Veterans organization set the guidelines for Local Service Officers -

this includes the requirements and guidelines as set forth by the Veterans Administration.

On January 16, 2024, a letter was sent from the American Legion Veterans Affairs and Rehab Division to all Department Commanders and Adjutants, addressing what a Post Service Officer can, and cannot do.

Post Service Officers must adhere to pertinent federal laws and VA regulations, maintaining compliance without infringing upon laws and regulations exclusively applicable to **VA-ACCREDITED REPRESENTATIVES**.

A Post Service Officer is TO ASSIST (NOT <u>DO</u>) veterans or families in obtaining VA benefits. Post Service Officers should forward the gathered information to Department Service Officers or County Veteran Service Officers representing the American Legion.

A Post Service Officer is here to insure all questions are answered and insure that the correct information is gathered and sent to the correct person

- WE CANNOT DO ACTUAL CLAIMS PAPERWORK.

Approved VA Officers are; Henderson County has two Service Officers (Five Days a week in the new Hedrick Rhodes Service Center); at the Charles George VAMC - two Service Officers are located on 4 South (Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 0800 to 1330, first come, first seen).

Bob Scruggs -

Elected Post 7 Service Officer. July 25, 2025.

Assistant Adjutant

An American Legion may have as many appointed officers as the Post requires, and has been approved by the Post Executive Board (the elected officers of the post).

For decades, the Post has had an Adjutant (appointed by the Commander) and an Assistant Adjutant (appointed by the Commander)

- BOTH ARE THEN APPROVED BY THE Executive Board

The Adjutant's duties are spelled out in National American Legion Officer Handbook, but the duties are spelled out by the Adjutant, Commander and the Executive Board.

Generally: taking of minutes at all regular and special called meetings; typing them up; reading/handing out and getting minutes approved; insuring proper filing of minutes and making copies available when asked for.

Only letters requested to be typed up and delivered as specified by Executive Board/Commander. Any Other duties when requested by Executive Board/Commander/Adjutant.

he National Veterans Creative

Arts Festival originated as two separate competitions. Muriel Barbour, then chief of recreation therapy at the McGuire VA Medical Center in Richmond, Va., created the visual arts competition, VET ARTS, in 1981, as an observance of the International Year of Disabled Persons. Shirley Jefferies, a recreation therapist at the Waco, Texas, VA Medical Center, initiated the performing arts competition, The National Music Competition for Veterans, in 1981. The premier live winners' stage show was held in 1981 at the VA Medical Center in Tuskegee. Ala. The second show was staged in 1982 at the Coatesville, Pa., VA Medical Center.

In 1984, the live stage show was presented in Washington, D.C., and the music competition was renamed "The Music Festival." The following year, the stage show took place in the historic Constitution Hall. The Music Festival and VET ARTS merged and drama and dance divisions were added, to create the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival in 1989. Designed to spotlight the four creative arts therapies of art, music, dance, and drama, this landmark Festival was performed to an audience of 4,000 in the Fox Theater in St. Louis, Mo. In 2005, a fifth creative arts division, creative writing, was added to the Festival roster.

The National Veterans Creative Arts Festival continues to evolve each year as it showcases the artistic achievements of Veterans from across the country in each of the five artistic divisions. Each Festival features an art exhibit showing the first-place artwork from 51 categories. A live stage show, complete with orchestral accompaniment generously provided by the Music Performance Fund, is performed by Veterans who have achieved medal-winning status in a variety of categories from the performing arts divisions of music, drama, and dance, as well as creative writing. Workshops are offered during the Festival week for participants and staff, educating them in a variety of artistic modalities by utilizing the talents of local community artists. There is no competition at the Festival itself, as it is a showcase for previously judged medal winners.

The Department of Veterans Affairs and the American Legion Auxiliary present the National Veterans Creative Arts Competition and Festival in a new city annually to raise the visibility of the creative achievements of our nation's Veterans. The program is also supported by many other organizations both locally and

Hiking, being out in nature is very therapeutic for me - I had the desire to share my hiking various outdoor experiences with those that weren't physically able to get to these beautiful places God has blessed us with.

My wife, who is a member of the Marine Corps League Auxiliary, started printing my pictures and making greeting cards for our local DAV chapter. The demand quickly grew, and now my photos are used for sympathy cards at the VA, as well as greeting cards for Post 77. It's my way of contributing to our local Legion mission. While hiking and photography provides me with healing and reconnecting, it's has been really special giving back (photos) for those who aren't able to physically handle the extreme hiking required to get to some of these places.

Editor: Your photography takes you to many places. Do you have a favorite? And how would you describe your style as a photographer?

Greg B: Great questions. Yes, I love the beach! But I also really enjoy visiting and hiking through the variety of National and State parks. I would describe myself as an outdoors extreme photographer, because of the weather conditions and challenging hikes I often face. I specialize in capturing nature and wildlife, and sometimes I incorporate the blend of man-made structures in those natural settings. 

The Legacy of 9/11: Americanism Then and Now

On September 11, 2001, the United States faced an unprecedented terrorist attack that forever changed the nation and its people. The coordinated hijacking of four commercial airplanes by al-Qaeda operatives resulted in the tragic loss of nearly 3,000 lives and left a deep scar on the American psyche. The collapse of the World Trade Center's Twin Towers, the damage to the Pentagon, and the crash of United Flight 93 in Pennsylvania marked the beginning of a new era—one defined by grief, resilience, and an evolving sense of Americanism.

he Days Following 9/11: Unity in the Face of

The Flag Code: PART 1

According to the U.S. Army Institute of Heraldry the United States flag never becomes obsolete. Any officially approved American flag, irrespective of the number or arrangement of the stars and/or stripes may continue to be used and displayed until no longer serviceable.

A flag that has been used to cover a casket can be used for any proper display purpose to include displaying this flag from a staff or flagpole.

The Flag Code is simply a guideline for proper flag etiquette. The law does not provide penalties for violation of any of its provisions.

There are no provisions of the Flag Code, which prohibit the washing or drycleaning of the flag. The decision to wash or dry-clean would of course depend upon the type of material.


There has been NO CHANGE to Flag Code section 6(a), which states: "It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flag staffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed twentyfour hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness."

The Flag Code as revised and adopted by the Congress of the United States in 1942 has never included the word(s) "private" or "in privacy." Section 8(k) of the Flag Code states: "The flag, when it is in such a condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning." Since 1937, The American Legion has promoted the use of a public flag disposal ceremony. This ceremony is a fitting tribute and an overt expression of patriotism, which enhances the public's understanding of honor and respect due the American flag.

THINGS TO INCLUDE IN YOUR PLAN:

 Know what to do with your pet during an evacuation. Many public shelters and hotels do not allow pets inside was as fel place where you can take your pets before disasters and emergencies happen Develop a buddy system. Plan with neighbors, friends or relatives to make sure that someone is
available to care for or evacuate your pets if you are unable to do so.

- Have copies of your pet's vaccination record, and make sure your pet is microchipped. Keep your address and
 phone number up-to-date and include an emergency contact outside of your immediate area.
- Keep contact information for your local emergency management office or animal control office and shelters on hand in case you become separated from your pet.

Build a Kit for your Pet

Just as you do with your family's emergency supply kit, think first about the basics for survival.

Review your kit regularly to ensure that their contents are fresh.

HERE ARE SOME ITEMS TO INCLUDE IN AN EMERGENCY KIT FOR YOUR PET:

- Food and Water. Keep several days' supply of both.
- Keep food in an airtight, waterproof container, and have a water bowl to use.


