IN EVERY SEASON, GOD IS PRESENT

November is always an interesting month because it's kind of transitional. For most places, even here in Valdosta, by November summer is clearly over and fall has begun.

It's the last month before we really move full strength into the holidays, because after Thanksgiving, there's Christmas, New Year's, College Football Championship, and the Super Bowl (I count them as holidays!), Valentine's Day, Easter, and then Graduation Month and May, all before we get back around to summer. Even for the Church, November is the last month before things get busy! Advent starts right after Thanksgiving, then it's Christmas and Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Lent, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter, before finally festival season is over with Pentecost at the start of June. If you're anything like me, you're going to spend this month preparing for all the busyness that comes afterward! And so I find it appropriate that even the Worship life of the church is kind of transitional, beginning with All Saints Day and ending with Thanksgiving and the start of Advent.

All Saints Day is generally regarded as a somber occasion, the congregation's chance to remember and honor our loved ones, the saints. who have passed away. A painful time for many of us as we hear the names of people we love repeated in Church as part of the group of saints in heaven, and want them so badly to be here with us. Thanksgiving and Advent, on the other hand, are generally joyous occasions, celebrating family coming together and all that God has gifted us, and looking forward to the birth of Jesus Christ! Two very different sentiments in the span of one month that nonetheless speak to the human experience, that constant transition from sad and from somber to joyous and celebratory. A transition that is so often reflected in Scripture in

The Psalms: Psalm 13 How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me?

How long must I take counsel in my soul and have sorrow in my heart all the day? How long shall my enemy be exalted over me? Consider and answer me, O Lord my God; Light up my, lest I sleep the sleep of death, Lest my enemy say, "I have prevailed over him," Lest my foes rejoice because I am shaken. But I have trusted in your steadfast love; My heart shall rejoice in your salvation. I will sing to the Lord because he has dealt bountifully with me.

It's because of Psalms like these that we can know that we are not alone in our pain and our loss, our crying out to God, and that we are also not alone in our worship and joy and celebration! Christians throughout all of history have gone through the same troubles and pain, crying out, "How long Lord?" one day and "I will sing to the Lord because he has dealt bountifully with me!" the next. That transition isn't always easy; sometimes it's even jarring when it happens too quickly, leaving us reeling from the shift between suffering and joy. But in Scripture, suffering and joy are, paradoxically, often connected to one another. In our sorrow, we are brought closer to God when we seek His presence, His answers, His comfort and peace. And that seeking out of our God, our Father, is always something worth rejoicing over! It brings us closer to our heavenly, eternal home, there with all believers, where the transition between suffering and joy, sorrow and celebration, will be replaced with the never-ending,

I pray that all of you, whether this time of year is painful or joyful, peaceful or chaotic, a time of remembrance or a time of celebration, or, like most of us I imagine, a bit of both, would seek God and His presence, His comfort and peace, and His Son Jesus Christ, as we look forward to his birth and his return.

Fall is here! The weather is cooler. The sky seems bluer! What a wonderful time of the year to have the Lord with us! As year-end approaches, many Council positions will open up and elections will occur. Think about the gifts you might have to offer to our church family, and consider running for a council position that fits your skills.

My own term as treasurer ends in December 2026, not many months away! I will be 76 years old then, and I am hopeful someone will be interested in the position. If you have an interest, let me know. On December 1st, we will receive a \$5/month increase in internet costs from AT&T, raising our cost from \$55 to \$60/month plus taxes. Just as happens at home, costs go up for your church family. As the new year approaches, I encourage you to look carefully at your budget and to consider increasing your gifts to Messiah to continue our mission of building a bigger heaven!

We purchased 1700 pounds of food from 2nd Harvest in the month of October, and we're out of food! Food purchases from 2nd Harvest average a cost of 19 cents...I don't about you, but I'm charged far more than that when I shop!

To keep us operational, we need your continuing help...your donations are greatly appreciated. All monies received go into the operation of the food pantry...the hours we work are strictly volunteer...77.25 hours so far this month, and we have a whole week yet to prepare for the next opening on November 5th. Together, we can make sure no one in our community goes hungry.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER: HARMONIOUS STEWARDSHIP

Pointing to the Rock of Ages

Not the labor of my hands Can fulfill Thy Law's demands; Could my zeal no respite know, Could my tears forever flow, All for sin could not atone; Thou must save, and Thou alone. (LSB 761:2)

While the classic hymn "Rock of Ages" shows up in the Lutheran Service Book in the "Hope and Comfort" section, it can also teach us a valuable lesson about Christian stewardship. If that surprises you, stay with me on this one.

No Lutheran would ever dispute the fact that our work does not save us. Ephesians 2 makes it truly clear that we are dead in our trespasses and sins and would remain in that state until Christ raises us by grace. There is not a ladder on which we can climb out of the grave that our sins have dug for us. No blood, sweat nor tears will be able to rescue us. We all know this.

Our works do not save. Christ's work on the cross of Calvary does! He bore human flesh. He carried the burden of our sin to the cross. His body was beaten, bruised and bloodied for us. He has indeed atoned for us! This is more than enough reason for this hymn to be bouncing around in your head all day today!

But our work has a place. The place is in response to what the Father has done for us in Jesus. The Rock of Ages, who is Jesus, becomes the foundation on which our lives of faith are built. The Holy Spirit uses the means of grace to make us God's workmanship that Paul talks about in Ephesians 2:10.

Our workmanship does not display our power or prowess. Like the heavens declare the handiwork of the Creator, the works of a redeemed sinner point others to the salvation that is worked only by Jesus alone. Our work is a response to and reflection of a grace and glory that we ourselves could never accomplish or achieve.

We become stewards of the treasure that is the Gospel. When we faithfully support the work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ with our financial support, we are doing the work which points to the One who alone atones. When we come alongside a struggling sister or brother for whom Christ died and we share the stewardship work of compassion and care, we enflesh the treasure of God's love and redemption.

When we make it a weekly priority to arrange our schedule to be in the Lord's House with other stewards of the Gospel to receive again and again the Gospel's

precious gift, we are stewards of the Body of Christ in the congregation that points even more people to Jesus.

We cannot do this. Jesus does it through us. We are simply stewards of this precious treasure!
