Senior Ready for Starring Role

HACKENSACK, N.J., Aug. 25 - It was the end of the first day of practice. Time for the

Each one of a dozen or so backs from Hackensack High School took hold of a padded blocking dummy, formed two parallel lines and prepared to pummel a ballcarrier who would try to streak

The first victim happened to be the team's and perhaps the state's best running back, Joe (Dash) Dawkins. In a burst of speed fueled by powerful legs and upper-body strength, Dawkins reached the end of the tunnel of players still

Dawkins then grabbed a cushioned pad and took his place in line, where he proceeded to bash every player to come down the pike, all the while joking and laughing uncontrollably as his teammates dropped helplessly to the ground. Dawkins was the only one to pass the test.

Having fun on the field has been long overdue for Dawkins, a 5-foot-9-inch, 180-pound senior tailback. For three years, he played in the shadow of the school's all-time leading rusher, Rashidi Brown, who this season has gone on to play ball at Clemson.

"I love football," Dawkins said. "This is my senior year and it doesn't get any better than

"I've been waiting a long time for this opportunity. I knew before I even came to high school that I would be playing behind Rashidi. I had to play fullback and receiver, and it made me a better player because I had to develop my catching and blocking skills. But I've always wanted to play tail and now I'm getting that opportunity to show what I could do."

In last year's 27-13 state championship victory over North Bergen, Dawkins proved to be the heir apparent to Brown, who missed most of the game with an ankle injury. In front of 10,000 fans at Giants Stadium, Dawkins responded with 160 yards rushing and 2 touchdowns, leading the Comets to their third consecutive championship in Group 4, the designation for large

As Brown's blocking back last year, Dawkins still scored 10 touchdowns and rushed for 843 yards on 110 carries, averaging 7.6 yards. He also started on defense, making 65 tackles and 4 interceptions as a cornerback. But this season, he will concentrate on offense.

Dawkins is among the most sought-after prospects in the nation. He received more than 60 phone calls from colleges on Aug. 15, the first day high school football players could be contacted. As an honor student with a 3.3 gradepoint average, Dawkins, who wants to major in communications, should have no problem gaining a scholarship to one of his favorite schools: Penn State, Nebraska, North Carolina, Notre Dame, Syracuse or Virginia.

Dawkins is also a two-time state track champion at 100 and 200 meters, earning the nick-name Dash when he broke Dennis Mitchell's state records. He lowered Mitchell's mark of 6.31 seconds for 55 meters to 6.30 and has the nation's fastest 100 meters this year, 10.31 seconds, eclipsing Mitchell's 10.47. Mitchell set both marks in 1983 for Edgewood High School in

"He could be as great as he wants to be," Dodie Donnell, Hackensack's backfield coach, said of Dawkins. "He could be better than Rashidi if he works hard and focuses on what he

Dawkins, who is 3 inches taller and 10 pounds lighter than Brown, has a distinctly different running style than his predecessor's.

'I would characterize Joe as more of a slasher," said Greg Toal, the head coach who has guided the Comets to a 30-2-1 record in the last three championship seasons. "Rashidi was more of a juker. A make-you-miss type of back. Joey is more of a slasher. A little bit stronger. A little bit more powerful."

While comparisons between the two will likely continue, Dawkins appears poised to fill

Brown's shoes. "I try and keep it a little bit light," Dawkins said, "If you put too much pressure on yourself and everything is too serious, that's when you mess up. You have to have a balance. If something is funny, you laugh. But you got to know when to focus and when to get down to busi-

Brodeur Won't Show Until He Signs Deal

MONTREAL, Aug. 29 (AP) - Martin Brodeur says he won't report to the Devils' training camp next week without a rich new contract. The star goaltender for the Stanley Cup champions, one of the most attractive free agents on the market, wants a three-year deal worth \$2.5 million a season. The Devils' last offer was \$4.3 million over three years.

"It's disappointing," Le Journal de Montreal quoted Brodeur as saying at a charity softball game. "Summer's almost over and I still don't know where I'll end up playing. We're still very far from an agreement with the Devils. But one thing is certain: I won't report to camp if we don't have an agreement. I have to protect myself in case of an injury. It's a contract, or I stay home."

Brodeur, 23, was rookie of the year in 1993-94 and led the Devils to their first title last June. He was also one of the team's lowest-paid players.

Maxwell Faces Drug Charge

Guard VERNON MAXWELL, cut by the Houston Rockets in June after quitting the team at the start of the playoffs, faces a court appearance next Tuesday after police say they found 1.2 grams of marijuana in his car.

Maxwell was pulled over Monday night along Houston's Richmond Avenue, the city's nightclub district, for running a red light, the authorities said. When the police determined that he had two outstanding traffic warrants against him, he was placed under arrest.

'Through the process of inventorying the car, illegal drugs were found in Mr. Maxwell's car," said J. L. DOTSON, the assistant chief.

Maxwell spent the night in a police station lockup, then posted a \$1,000 bond yesterday morning. Accompanied by his attorney, he had nothing to say as he walked out of jail. He faces a misdemeanor charge of possession of a controlled substance. Conviction could result in up to a \$2,000 fine and 180 days in jail.

PGA Puts Out Welcome Mat

The PGA Tour got a little more Euro-friendly yesterday when the Tournament Policy Board voted to expand the number of tournaments available to nonmembers to seven from the current limit of five. Because the Players Championship, the NEC World Series of Golf and the three United States majors do not count against the limit, the change will, in effect, allow international players who are members of an-

other circuit access to a total of 12 tour events. The change will have an impact on those who play at least 11 events on their home circuit and who wish to play more — but not the required 15 tournaments for PGA Tour membership - in the United States.

It will also be easier for graduates of the Qualifying School to get into tournaments. The board, on the recommendation of PGA Tour Commissioner TIM FINCHEM, reduced from five to three the number of tournament spots reserved for PGA of America members, amended its medical exemption category and reserved the top 125 exempt list to tour members only. In effect, this should give all Q School graduates the opportunity to compete in 26 or 27 events.
