Dear Church Family,

As I write this article, I am back. I am back in the pastor's study after my three months at Fort Jackson, South Carolina. The course that I took (and passed) was the Chaplain's Basic Officer Leadership Course. You may be asking, "What is that?!" According to The US Army Institute for Religious Leadership, the definition of CHBOLC is, "an intensive, outcomes-based, entry-level, initial military training process for newly accessioned chaplain and chaplain candidates." Alrighty then.

Approximately eighty-five male and five female soldiers populated the program, seeking to become Army chaplains. We each had our own hotel room/suite. Holiday Inn and Candlewood Suites were two of the hotels on base. Safe to say all of us missed our friends and family back home.

Mondays through Fridays we went to an outdoor physical training field, arriving at 5:15 a.m. First we did calisthenics and stretching. Then we worked out with two-mile runs, or sprints, etc. At the three or four gymnasiums on post, we sometimes worked out indoors. On some days, we had to get up at 2:00 or 3:00 a.m., if there was a special event, like a ten-mile ruck march that had to be done before the weather got hot and humid. By about 7:00 a.m. we were done and went to breakfast. Typically, we were told to get breakfast, do hygiene (i.e., take a shower), and somehow walk or run to class a quarter of a mile away by 8:15.

Classes usually went until 4:00, sometimes earlier or later. Some students called the lectures "Death-by-Power-Point." Falling asleep in class was a big no-no. If any of the students were falling asleep, it was acceptable to stand at the back of the classroom to keep from dozing. I availed myself often of that option.

In the evenings, I called Lisa, did my homework, including writing the required papers, and tried not to go to bed too late. I had a t.v. but never turned it on, not even during the Olympics. Meeting with Lisa, and meeting with the Lord in prayer were daily highlights.

The food was served in a dining facility ("the DFac"). The meals were excellent. For the first month we were treated like 18-year-old basic trainees. We were in formation and marched in cadence to and from the DFac three times daily. After the first month we no longer had drill sergeants marching us to our meals. At that point, we were free to eat in our rooms, whatever we might have picked up at Walmart. Or we could get the DFac meals to-go. But enough about food.

I was the oldest student in the class. One other man, a rabbi, was six months younger than I. I made a lot of mistakes, as did all of us who did not have "prior service" in the military. Several of my classmates and I became friends. The classmates who did have prior service were very helpful to those of us who did not.

All in all, it was a very difficult three months. I almost quit. There were many moments of desperation. I was not suicidal, not by any means. But the desperation seemed to almost be a kind of despair that was close to being such as I had not experienced since the death of my brother in 2005. But the Lord gave me Lisa to talk to each night. And I, in turn, talked to the Lord. On the bright side, my prayer life grew as never before.

In future newsletter articles, I will give updates about my service with the Iowa National Guard. I want to express my thanks to Patrick Baum, who served as interim pastor. Many thanks to the deacons and the entire congregation for unanimously voting to support this endeavor which I have documented above.

I have never been so happy to come home to Iowa, to Lisa, and to all of you at First Baptist Church.

From the Deacon Bench



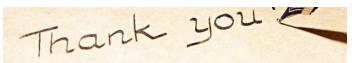

Ham and Cheese Pinwheels



Ingredients

YIELDS: 36 serving(s) PREP TIME: 20 mins TOTAL TIME: 1 hr.

Cooking spray

2 oz. cream cheese, softened

2 Tbsp. prepared ranch dressing

2 green onions, finely chopped

2 (8-oz.) packages crescent roll sheets

1 c. shredded sharp cheddar cheese, divided

1 c. shredded gruyere cheese, divided

8 ounces thinly sliced deli ham, divided

1 large egg, lightly beaten

1 tsp. poppy seeds

Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 375°F. Spray a 13-by9-inch baking pan with cooking spray and line with parchment paper.
- 2. In a medium bowl, mix together the cream cheese, ranch dressing, and green onion.
- On a very lightly floured cutting board, unroll 1 crescent roll sheet. Keep the other sheet refrigerated until ready to
 use. Use a rolling pin to roll the sheet into an even rectangle, around 12-by-8 inches, with the long sides parallel to
 the counter.
- 4. Spread half of the cream cheese mixture over the surface of the sheet, leaving a 1- inch border clean on the long side furthest from the edge of the counter. 4 Tip: The ham, cheddar, and gruyere cheese can easily be substituted for any other deli favorites including turkey, roast beef, Colby jack, havarti, or gouda. Maintaining the 1-inch border and in individual layers, sprinkle ½ cup of the cheddar cheese and ½ cup of the gruyere cheese over the cream cheese. Lay half of the ham in a single layer on top of the cheese, overlapping if necessary. Brush the clean border with the egg wash.
- 5. Starting with the long edge closest to the counter, roll the crescent roll sheet into a log, using the side of the crescent roll sheet that has egg wash to pinch and seal the log closed.
- 6. Wrap the log with plastic wrap and chill in the refrigerator for at least 1 hour or up to 12 hours. Repeat with the remaining crescent roll sheet, cream cheese mixture, cheeses, and ham
- 7. Unwrap one chilled log and place it on a cutting board. Using a serrated knife, trim the ends of each log and slice each log into 12 rounds. Place the slices into the prepared baking pan. Brush the pinwheels with egg wash and sprinkle with the poppy seeds.
- 8. Bake until the pinwheels are puffy and golden brown, about 30 minutes. Allow to cool for 5 minutes before serving.

Tip: The ham, cheddar, and gruyere cheese can easily be substituted for any other deli favorites including turkey, roast beef, Colby jack, havarti, or gouda.

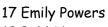
