OWNERSHIP OF THE MANSION

The home remained in the Krause family until Mrs. Krause sold it in 1917 to the Thomas Perry, Sr. family. Mr. Perry had served two terms as a Sheriff of Platte County. The Perry's daughter, "Miss Jennie" Perry Harris, was a seamstress and later used the parlor room as her fitting room. She converted the home into a compine house. rooming house.

In 1973 Mr. and Mrs. Charles Beals bought the house, to be used as a wood-working shop in the basement and a ceramic shop upstairs. In 1976, three men tried to buy the home, with the intention of tearing it down to use the beautiful woodwork and staircase in a Kansas City restaurant. But the home was preserved by a gift from Mr. Ben Ferrel, a former Platte Countian. Mr. Ferrel had bequeathed \$38,000 to be equally divided between had bequeathed \$3,8,000 to be equally divided between the Platte County Historical Society and the Platte Pur-chase Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution for the purpose of building or buying a museum or meeting place to be located in Platte City. The two organizations pooled their funds and purchased Krause Mansion in 1977, thus saving this beautiful old home.

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1977, one matching grant of \$10,000 was received from the state of Missouri. Over \$100,000 has been raised by gifts, memorials and fund raisers to restore the ne. The Parlor Room has been elegantly restored by the Platte Purchase Daughters of the American Revolu-tion. The remainder of the home is under the auspices of the Platte County Historical Society.

Platte City, Missouri, the mini-mansion has long reminded people of the Governor's Mansion in Jefferson City, Missouri. The mansard roofs, ornate grill-work and white cornerstones are quite similar. Built in 1882, the Mini-Mansion is very rare architecture for the area.

The exterior is a fine example of Renaissance Revival architecture with French influence. It is known that Mr. Krause was a friend of Governor Silas Woodson of Buchanan County, Missouri, and as he was later appointed the Missouri Ambassador to the World's Fair in his home-land, Prussia, it is reasonable to assume Mr. Krause was quite familiar with the Governor's Mansion. Although the exterior is definitely Victorian in appearance, the interior carries the heavy wood-on-wood motif of Mr. Krause's German heritage, including the tongue and groove wood ceiling n the kitchen.

No records have been found to identify the

ocated at Third and Ferrel Streets in architect or the cost of building the home, which took one year to complete. Mr. Krause owned the only brick burning plant in Platte City and dirt taken from the basement level has been baked off in a kiln that gives the same consistency as the bricks in the home. The west side of the house has no windows, creating a fire wall, and was tuck-pointed in a different manner than the other three sides of the house and was never painted. Tests show the remainder of the brick was always painted a Venetian Red, the ceilings of the two porches turquoise blue and the porch

nly two changes have been made during the history of the house. The front doorway was changed from two solid wooden doors with small windows at the top, to a single glass door with tall, narrow windows on each side. A doorway was cut in the kitchen wall to give access to a pantry added on the back porch.


