As she emotionally began her acceptance speech, DeBose referenced her character with gratitude and awe.

RECIPE INGREDIENTS

Here's what you'll need to make this Pumpkin Coquito:

- Dark Rum
- Cinnamon Sticks
- Sweetened Condensed Milk: to create the creamy consistency!
- Coco Lopez: aka cream of coconut (this is not the same thing as coconut cream or coconut milk!)
- Coconut Milk
- Pumpkin Puree
- Evaporated Milk
- Spices: Ground Cinnamon, Nutmeg and Cloves
- Vanilla Extract
- Shredded Coconut: this is optional but offers additional flavor and a little added thickness to your coguito.

HOW TO MAKE PUMPKIN COQUITO

Mix: In a very large pitcher with a lid (or two large jars with lids – this will make about 70 oz of liquid) add rum and cinnamon sticks.

Soak: Let rum and cinnamon sticks sit for 1 hour or for a couple of days! This is an optional step, but really adds to the overall cinnamon flavor!

Puree: In a blender, puree all the other ingredients. Pour into the bottle and shake well to combine with rum and cinnamon sticks.

Refrigerate: Chill for at least 4 hours and store in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks. (It never lasts that long at my house!)

Serve: You will need to shake vigorously before pouring.





HALLOWEEN IN PUERTO RICO

Immerse yourself in the culture of Puerto Rico by celebrating Halloween the local way: with the mask of the vejigante. You'll see these beak-shaped masks, called careta, with horns jutting out from them around the country any time of year. The vejiganteare folkloric demons that can be traced back to medieval Spain and they've become integral symbols of Puerto Rican culture. If you dress as one during Halloween, be sure to pair your mask with a flowing cape in true vejigante style.



HERITAGE MONTH September 15 to October 15

Hispanic Heritage Month has been a big celebration in the U.S. for more than 40 years. Americans across the country celebrate this month with pride and joy, while commemorating the importance of diversity. Here are five things to know about Hispanic Heritage Month, its history and why we celebrate it in the middle of September.

What is Hispanic Heritage Month?

It's a national celebration to honor the history, culture and influence of past generations who came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America. The observance started in 1968 under President Lyndon Johnson's administration as a one-week celebration called Hispanic Heritage Week. Years later, President Ronald Reagan proposed extending this celebration into a month-long event. It was enacted into law on Aug. 17, 1988, officially designating the 30-day period starting on Sept. 15 to Oct. 15 as National Hispanic Heritage Month.

Why Does Hispanic Heritage Month begin on Sept. 15?

Hispanic Heritage Month is celebrated from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15. The celebration starts mid-month because Sept. 15 marks the independence anniversary of five countries: Costa Rica, Nicaragua, El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala. It is followed by Mexico's Independence Day on Sept. 16 and Chile's on Sept. 18. Another important date that falls within this 30-day period is Día de la Raza, or Columbus Day, which is celebrated on Oct. 12.

What does Hispanic mean?

While many people use Latino(a) and Hispanic interchangeably these two words mean different things. A Hispanic person is someone While many people use Latino(a) and Hispanic interchangeably these two words mean different things. A Hispanic person is someone who comes from, or is a descendant of a Spanish-speaking country. Latino(a) is used when referring to someone who comes from Latin America, or is a descendant from any Latin American country. A person can be both Hispanic and Latino(a), but not all Latinos are Hispanic. Brazilians, for example, are Latinos, but their native language is not Spanish. Conversely, not all Hispanics are Latino(a). Spaniards are considered Hispanic, but not Latinos, since they are part of the European Union. Hispanic countries are: Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Equatorial Guinea, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Puerto Rico, Spain, Uruguay, and Venezuela. Latin American countries are: Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, French Guiana, Guadaloupe, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Martinique, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Puerto Rico, Saint Barthélemy, Saint Martin, Uruguay, and Venezuela.

How many Hispanics are there in the U.S.?

The Pew Research Center says the U.S. Hispanic population is the nation's second-fastest-growing ethnic group after Asians. The Hispanic population in the U.S. reached a record 62.1 million in 2020, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. Hispanics account for 18.7% of the total U.S. population.

How to celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month?

People use this celebration to show the importance of Hispanics in the U.S. by donating to Hispanic charities, eating food from any of the countries that are being celebrated, learning from their cultures and honoring influential Hispanics who have made an impact on society.

Firstly, we have a former Chair of WRPRC and member of PRUMA who has retired and is living in Puerto Rico, Johnny Saldivia. Johnny has agreed to help us distribute both monetary and physical donations to the people who need help the most. There are three cities near Johnny, Cabo Rojo, Mayaquez and Lajas that he will focus his time and efforts.

Secondly, there is a friend of the club whose daughter, Joanna Ruiz, a schoolteacher at Félix Garay Ortiz School, and knows the student and the needs of their families so we will be adopting them as well. Lastly, I've been in contact with Eurando Piñero Fire Chief for the Metro Emergency Response Team, Inc. Puerto Rico Volunteer Fire Department. They have saved the lives of 7 people during the initial hurricane and are self-reliant on donations to keep the fire department going.

So, as I mentioned we are raising monetary donations for these three worthy causes within Puerto Rico but in addition we are setting up an Amazon wish list for generators, flashlights, water purification tables, diapers, formula etc. so people from the comfort of their devices can donate from a list of well needed items. These items will be delivered to Johnny, and he will make sure that the other two causes listed above are supplied. Please check out our website as this will be updated soon.

This event will go a long way to helping those people that lost everything and we are ready to help.
