A short walk, maybe half a mile, to an area of flat red rocks and gnarled trees. I took a few shots, then turned to leave and saw the view in the photo above and immediately realized it had potential. I even knew immediately how I was going to process it to get the clouds to stand out. The result was more than I expected. It has received some attention including a request from

the town of Sedona to use it on their website. I almost quit and walked away too soon, but felt like my work wasn't yet complete - there's a lesson in that. I'm a believer in an old project management saying, that perfection is the enemy of good enough. Well, in this case good enough required a little more and I'm glad this happened. When I see this shot it reminds me of the entire trip and gives it a feeling of success. I guess there was indeed more interesting stuff to stand in front of.
