What St. Anna Teaches Us about Faith

Think about the purity, holiness, and magnificence of the Blessed Virgin Mary. She was the only human being ever to be sinless and constantly in a state of grace. Because Mary was such a beautiful symbol of grace, her mother, St. Anna, must have also been a devout woman of God.

Anna and her husband Joachim were an extremely pious couple, but they were unable to conceive a child. This burden weighed heavily on Joachim's shoulders, so he spent much time fasting and in devout prayer pleading for God to bless him and Anna with a child.

According to tradition, Anna also became distraught. She went into her garden and prayed for God to bless her with a child, promising that the child would be dedicated to the service of the Lord. As Anna wept in prayer, an angel appeared and said to her, "The Lord has looked upon thy tears; thou shalt conceive and give birth and the fruit of thy womb shall be blessed by all

the world." Then the angel appeared to Joachim as well, and the couple rejoiced as they conceived a child, whom they named Mary.

St. Anna understood that all children are a blessing from God and that God alone has the power to decide when the life of a person will begin and end. When God blesses us, it can be easy to merely accept the gift and move forward with our daily lives. But St. Anna did more than receive the gift of a child. She went a step further and trusted in the plan of God by promising her child to God's service.

As we work to build a culture of life, we can easily become discouraged. But like St. Anna, we must put our faith and trust in God and His ultimate plan for our happiness. We can turn to God and pray for children, pray for an end to abortion, and pray for the gift of adoption. With God's help, nothing is impossible.

Perspective

It was reported that a movie theater displayed a short film that began with a snapshot of the ceiling of a room. No details, no colors. Just a white ceiling. The same scene remained displayed for 6 long minutes when the moviegoers started to get frustrated. Some complained about the film wasting their time and others started to leave. Suddenly, the camera lens slowly started to move until it reached down towards the floor. A small child who appeared handicap was lying fixed on the bed, suffering from a spinal cord tear. The camera then pans back up to the ceiling with the following words: "We showed you only 6 minutes of this child's daily activity, only 6 minutes from the scene that this handicap child watches at all hours of his life, and you complained and weren't patient for even 6 minutes, you couldn't bear to watch it."

Talk about perspective! All too often, we are wrapped up in our own lives that we fail—oftentimes voluntarily and willingly—to see things from another person's perspective. We get upset, angry, and frustrated with others, but we do not take the time to understand another person's hurt, another person's afflictions, another person's point of view.

There are those that constantly demand things of others. They expect everyone to cower to their will and desires, all without working to attempt to understand what another goes through. This is not what Christ teaches us: we are to be loving and patient, forgiving and understanding so that we can be a help, not an extension of the problem. These situations demand that we ourselves change so that we can care for others, much like our Lord does for

Atticus Finch, in Harper Lee's To Kill a Mockingbird tells his daughter Scout that "You never really understand a person until you consider things from his point of view. Until you climb inside of his skin and walk around in it." This calls to mind perfectly what we are preparing for on December 25th. What does our Lord do for us: He became Man so that He can save us! He walked around in our skin and faced the evils of the world, providing healing and instruction. What a great love God has for us! What a great understanding! He is born in a cave, among barnyard animals, in a lowliest of states—according to human standards—into a world not ready to receive Him. What a great example for all of us!

We need patience. We need understanding. We need to judge less and work toward seeing Christ in others. As we continue the Nativity Fast, it is important to remember that sometimes, we need to put ourselves in others shoes in order to truly help others. We cannot compare problems or say that "this person has it worse than you because..." We are called to a greater understanding, and through this, we ourselves can realize the magnitude of blessings that we are given, and we can thank God for bestowing us with such blessings that we ourselves take for granted!

The Feast of the Immaculate Conception today

This feast is similar on its basic idea to the conceptions of Christ and St. John the Baptist. St. John the Baptist was conceived by St. Elizabeth who was before thought barren. The angel's



announcement to Zachary that she would conceive is analogous to the situation of St. Anne and the news of the conception of the Mother of God to one thought barren—St. Anne! Joachim and Ann were advanced in years like Zachary and Elizabeth. They were disappointed in that they had no children. This was a great disgrace for Jewish women because although the Jews do not recognize Jesus to be the savior, still each Jewish woman hoped to be His mother. St. Anne gave birth to the God Bearer, Mary, and her reproach was turned into joy at such a wonder. The dogma of the Immaculate Conception was solemnly defined by Pope Pius IX on December 8, 1854 stating: "that the Most Blessed Virgin Mary in the first instant of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted to her by almighty God through the merits of Christ Jesus, Savior of Mankind, was preserved from all stain

of original sin is a doctrine revealed by God and therefore must be held firmly and constantly by all faithful Christians."
