There are 2 locations - one on Busch Boulevard and another on Nebraska Avenue. Trinity Café is a non-profit organization that provides a 3-course meal every Monday through Friday and breakfast on Saturday to the poor and working poor. It is funded through donations and government grants and relies on the support of volunteers. At least 32 volunteers are needed each day at each location. 

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Mary Low Harden

TUT'S TOFFEE

Cover jellyroll pan with aluminum foil (one sheet – no tears or cracks).

Arrange 7 rows of saltine crackers of 5 crackers each over the foil

In microwave bowl, cook for 4 minutes or until dissolved (I usually do 4 minutes, stir, then an additional 1-2 minutes):

2 sticks butter

1 cup brown sugar (packed)

Stir to mix, then pour over crackers. May have to spoon-spread it to cover crackers. Bake 20 minutes at 350.

Remove from oven. Immediately sprinkle over top one 12-oz pkg chocolate chips. When chips are softened, spread to cover crackers. While still warm, cover top with 1 cup medium chopped pecans.

Refrigerate or freeze until cold. Then break apart. Stores well in freezer.

The day meeting group was lucky enough to have a guest; patsy monk who shared some of her expertize (and worm poop for the raffle) on worm castings for the group. As a group we all felt this would be fun to share with everyone so we asked patsy to write up an arrticle for the newsleteter and she kindly complied!!!

Vermiculture

Such an unusual word that means the acquisition of a natural product: worm poop. It is a soil conditioner, it can stabilize toxins and has beneficial microbes that reduce or even eliminate harmful fungi and bacteria in soil. Sounds too good to be true? Well, it is good and true, but more amazing, you can make it happen.

Information that is sad but very true:

- -200 pounds of kitchen scraps are thrown away by the average family each year.
- -Americans produce 96 billion pounds of food waste alone in a year.
- -Americans throw away 25% of the food they prepare.

Vermiculture is the process of growing worms for their poop.

Eisenia Fetida is the worm of choice for bin life. They are smaller and thinner. They eat more and, therefore, reproduce more. They stay higher in the composting bin, which makes them ideal as a composting worm.

Feeding your new soil friends can be confusing at first. Their menu includes **Greens**: vegetable/some fruit scraps (low acid), plain pasta, teabags (no metal staples) and coffee grounds with the paper filters.

Browns: shredded newspaper (no shiny ads), shredded cardboard, paper, paper egg cartons, dry leaves, junk mail (no plastic windows on envelopes).

Some form of **grit**: well ground up egg shells or fine sand. Worms have a gizzard, not teeth. Grit will make breaking down of food easier.

It takes several months of 'processing' to begin to utilize the castings, which is another (nicer) name for 'poop'. Castings can be put into your soil mix, used as a side dressing or as a Tea to water your plants (label it well!)

To build your own Vermiculture bin, you can do an on line search or contact your local Florida Extension office. The office in Palmetto, Manatee County, carries a 3 tray bin for \$50.00. It includes all necessary information from constructing the bin and growing worms to harvesting castings.

What convinced me this was something to do was the fact that we were frequently throwing out salad scraps, pasta, sweet potato left overs and always have newspapers for the recycle bin. We tried the outside composting but have nocturnal foragers on our property. This way, they have less access to the bin as it is in my office.

My personal experience with worm poop is limited. It includes my few African Violets which are now thriving and blooming profusely. This is something I honestly have not seen in years. Our Jaboticaba has been fed several times over the summer and is in bloom again now. (Email monkpatsy2@gmail if you want to see photos). Our orchids are sprayed with worm tea and look super.

So, I guess it is fair to ask, 'Is it great for everything?'

I suspect not, as that would be too good to be true. Then, the following book came along just in time to help answer this question.

A good resource is **Worms Eat My Garbage** (2nd edition) by Mary Appelhof. On page 114, she discusses Chemistry and Castings. She does admit "often having a pH8 or higher, worm castings may not be suitable for acid-loving plants".

Figure 31 pg 114, is of 9 small potted African violets. "different potting media affect the health of African violets." She follows this up with a nice discussion of the experiment. Three plants

were in 100% potting soil. Three plants were in an equal mix of castings, perlite and Michigan peat. Three plants were in 100% castings. The bottom line was the plants in the equal mixture were "distinctly more vigorous, larger, greener leaves, and more robust". She goes further to discuss the findings and possible explanation of results.

It was exciting to see the plants of choice for this experiment are the ones that are near and dear to our hearts.

By far, please realize, I am not an expert in the subject. However, as a nurse, I do understand good nutrition is significantly important for people, plants and pets.

I do hope this has sparked your interest in some way.

If you're following our Grooming Schedule on pages 54-55 of the Yearbook, you have no doubt already noticed that Weeks 5 and 4 were

omitted! So, here is the schedule for Weeks 5 and 4:

5 Weeks before ShowJanuary 14-20

- Top Water with 12-36-27 formula (bloom booster)
- Rotate Plants
- Check symmetry, remove suckers and rearrange leaves

4 weeks before show......January 21-27

- Water with Bloom Booster
- Rotate Plants
- Check symmetry, remove suckers and rearrange leaves
- Remove spent blossoms and stubs

FLORIDA STATE FAIR

SET-UP DAY: Saturday, February 3, at 10 am

We need help setting up our display at the Fair on Saturday, February 3. When we have sufficient help, it takes only a couple hours to get the basic display put together. We cover the walls with large pieces of fabric, get the overhead poles fastened in, put the electrical cords in place, then lay the carpet. There'll be signage to put up as well as our education board. We also have a couple small tables to set in place and cover. The smaller table will be used for our culture folders, club information and cards for the public to use if they want information or to receive our e-newsletter.

PLANT PLACEMENT DAY: Tuesday, February 6, at 10 am

We need help putting the violets in the display on Tuesday, February 6. The violets will need to be unpacked and groomed. Some of the violets will be placed in baskets with decorative netting material. ALL violets must be labeled, using plant stakes. We need people to prepare and place the labels, and do whatever else is needed to make ours a lovely, attractive display.

MANY HANDS MAKE LIGHT WORK! . . . one of my mother's favorite sayings. Remember: We are all part of a club and each member is important! One member can't do it all, but together we can make a difference. . . so PLEASE help us at the Fair!



ON SHOW SET-UP

Thursday, February 22, is SHOW SET-UP DAY – and we need all hands on deck! You'll be glad to know that NO EXPERIENCE IS NECESSARY. . . YOU'LL GET ON-THE-JOB TRAINING!

We will begin setting up the showroom at 12 Noon. We will need as many people there as possible to help with set-up. Tom Schaefer has volunteered to assist Stage Manager David Matthews with room set-up. Together, they will make sure that everything goes smoothly and efficiently.

Here's what happens at set-up:

- The tables will be set in place. There are round tables and rectangular tables.
- All tables will be covered with skirting and a top cover.
- A curtain must be installed to separate the kitchen area from the show room.

- The Sales tables must be readied, our shelf installed, and Club supplies arranged in a pleasing way.
- The education display will be set up near the entrance.
- The focal point will be set up in the show room near the kitchen.
- The Club sale plants must be removed from boxes, priced and set on the sales tables.
- Club supplies—soil, perlite, fertilizer, pots, etc., must be priced and placed on the tables. Jim Matula is in charge of supplies for the show.
- The Entries process will be set up and entries for workers begins at 1 pm. Entries forms will be available at both February meetings as well as set-up day.

Since the entire set-up process takes a few hours, we ask everyone to please bring food for all the workers to share. Any leftovers will be refrigerated and used on Friday. We are also providing lunch at the church for the Judges so bring something for their lunch.

Regarding entries: All horticulture entries should be free of dust, dirt, perlite, etc., on the foliage. Use a soft brush to clean the leaves. All horticulture entries must be slip-potted and all plant stakes must be removed. Be sure to water your plants before entering them in the show.

- Bring completed Entries sheet with you. Be sure this is filled out in PENCIL
- If you are selling any of your entries, be sure to fill out one of the show plant sales forms.
- If you have finished entering your plants, please pitch in and help wherever needed.
- Return early Friday to check the entries
 make sure each entry has a card.
- If necessary, clean the tables.
- Check to see that each design entry has an entry card AND a 3x5 card listing materials used.

So. . .plan to come and help share the load. It's always a busy time, but we have a lot of fun!

Second plant is smaller than the first and ferns add a nice mixture. She suggested using plants with different types of foliage and including a piece of wood and mondo grass to look like a natural scene. She also suggested making the dish garden in advance so you can observe it from day to day to see if you want to change anything. Use a miniature African violet for your dish garden and, if necessary, remove leaves to make sure it is the right size. Fern can be placed in front of larger plants to fill in empty spaces. When all the plants are placed, cover the soil with sheet moss to give your garden a finished look. You can use a mirror at the lowest point of your garden to make a little pond. Mary Lou sometimes covers the mirror with plastic wrap and sprinkles with water to

make it look real. She encouraged members to gather all the necessary materials – then just get in there and do it!!!

Jim's Hearty Tortellini Soup

2 cloves garlic, crushed

1 Tablespoon butter

2 (13 1/2 fluid oz) cans Chicken broth

1 8oz package fresh or frozen tortellini

1 10oz package fresh or frozen spinach, thawed

1 16oz can tomatoes drained and coarsely chopped

Grated Parmesan cheese

In a large saucepan, over medium heat, cook garlic in butter for 2-3 minutes. Add broth and tortellini, heat to a boil. Reduce heat, simmer for 10 minutes. Add spinach and tomatoes, simmer 5 minutes more. Serve topped with cheese



RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by King James

CREAMY SAUSAGE STEW (Therese) 10-12 Servings (about 1 1/2 cups each)

10-12 small to medium red potatoes, cut into quarters

- 1 large sweet onion, cut into eighths
- 1 large green pepper, cut into 1" pieces
- 1 large sweet red pepper, cut into 1" pieces
- 2 packages smoked Polish sausage (26 oz), cut into 1" slices
- 1/3 cup veggie oil
- 1 tablespoon basil pesto or dried basil
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pint heavy whipping cream
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- 3 tablespoons water

Preheat oven to 350F.

Place potatoes in a 5 qt roasting pan. Add onions, peppers and sausage; toss gently. Combine oil, basil, salt and pepper. Pour over the meat and vegetables; toss well.

Cover and bake 45 minutes; stir. Add the cream; cover and bake 30-40 minutes longer or until potatoes are tender. May need additional liquid (1/2 & 1/2).

Combine cornstarch and water; stir into stew. Place on stovetop and bring to a boil, stirring constantly until thickened.

NOTES: 6-23-13 Added 1 link of mild Italian & 1 of linguica (a mild Portuguese sausage). Don't

think it improved the stew. Cut the potatoes into quarters next time. Use a very large red pepper or 2 small ones. Had to use a large casserole dish & transferred to a pot at the end. 2-25-16 Used combo of new potatoes, Yukon Golds & russets. Worked fine. Kielbasa works best. 7-30-16 Used the small stock pot. Took a LOT longer to roast the veggies. Put on baking sheet & cover. Add to pot with cream. 2-20-18 Added leftover fresh mushrooms & green onions. Worked fine.



I began by taking care of my girlfriend's violets while she was student teaching. At that time violets didn't thrill me at all. My first encounter with gorgeous African violets was at a florist shop, in Glendale Mall in Indianapolis, where I worked nearby. I was fascinated at their beauty and bought two. I set up a very simple light stand and was rewarded amazingly. These two never stopped blooming and always had at least 40 blooms open. This was 1975.

The club rapidly grew, and many excellent growers showed their gorgeous plants. The club continued to be kind and helpful. Shows had 400 or more violet entries. There were shows in malls and thousands came to be a part of our shows. I am greatly indebted to Tampa African Violet Society for all the kind, loving support that I have received for so many years. I have learned volumes it seems, and my life has been completely enriched by the many wonderful members who are a part of this long history.

I guess one of the highest points in this history was seeing my wife, Barbara, grow beautiful violets. She was so happy with her plants and prizes. She did so well. Her plants were blessed.

My theme or motto is that a beautiful African Violet is a gift that I am entrusted. I recognize and respect its beauty since I am just the caretaker and no more.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Linda Bennett

Dear fellow members.

I am sharing with you the most precious and delicious recipe I have ever been given. Why? The food speaks for itself and why precious??? My Dad tore it from the Sunday paper November 5, 1972, because now that I was finally out on my own, I enjoyed cooking for my family and friends in my own home and this recipe has never failed to please. So Bon appetit!!

Drain 1 can (13 1/4oz) pineapple chunks, reserve ½ cup liquid, cover, refrigerate fruit. Combine ½ cup pineapple juice, ½ cup Heinz 57 sauce, 2 Tablespoons dry white wine, 1 Tablespoon salad oil, ½ Teaspoon salt, and dash of pepper. Pour this over 2 pounds beef sirloin tips that have been cubed to 1 inch. Cover and refrigerate for 2-3 hours.

Thread 4-5 pieces of meat and 5-6 pieces of pineapple on each 12inch skewer. Brush with marinade sprinkle with salt and pepper and broil 3 inches from heat for 5 minutes on each side for medium rare.

Makes 6 servings

Propagation: Making Little Ones Out Of Big Ones*

I love propagation! I have been very successful over the many years of growing in propagating from seeds and from cuttings of all sorts. Of course, I went through that novice stage where I couldn't bear to toss a leaf, but soon got over that, the decision being made by running out of space!

Learning to propagate different types of cuttings takes a bit of study, and some trial and error depending upon your growing conditions. You may need to cover your cutting(s) by sealing them in a clear bag, or perhaps just inverting a bag over the container until the cuttings take root and can be weaned from their terrarium conditions. Leaf cuttings are probably most popular for African violets and many of the gesneriads. Be certain to cut the petiole short: do not leave it long. Three quarters of an inch to one inch is plenty on standard sized leaves and even shorter on the miniature and semiminiature leaves. I usually take a slice off the top of the leaf blade as well. That seems to make that 'mother leaf' pay attention to forming baby plants as opposed to actually growing itself. If the leaf is large, I usually cut it down to a wedge: a triangle above the petiole. It really does not need more than that to do its job.

Some plants, such as Streptocarpus, can be put down two ways: by cutting the (long) leaf in sections and inserting the stem into the rooting medium just as you would an AV leaf, or by cutting the midrib vein out of the leaf and putting down the two halves, barely inserting them into the rooting medium. Baby plantlets will emerge from each of the side veins.

I must admit that I have much more success putting these cuttings down using the first method above. I have lost more doing it the second way. When propagating vine-type gesneriads, I like to cut the vines into sections so that there are two leaf nodes (stripped of their leaves) to plant below the soil surface and two leaf nodes above the soil. This allows for good root growth and good growth from the nodes above the soil surface. Once growth has begun and established itself, those new growths can be pinched and even more

branching will occur, eventually forming a compact, bushy plant.

Propagating from stolons or runners is another easy way to put cuttings down. With Episcia, for instance, taking each small stolon and inserting it into the rooting medium will result in new plants quickly. Episcias are similar to annuals in that they need to be taken apart and/or separated when they outgrow their pot, tray, or enclosed container.

Some genera require barely moist rooting medium and may require barely inserting the stem or petiole into that rooting medium. I am thinking here of petrocosmea leaf cuttings. I cut the petioles short, and barely insert them into the barely moist rooting medium. I usually use a plastic salad container with a lid that seals it. I don't even open that container until I see sizable baby plants.

Most of the time, I use SOLO cups with the bottom edges cut so there is drainage for my cuttings. I put a tablespoon of coarse perlite in the bottom and then add my rooting medium. Enclosing the newly-planted cuttings for a week or three will help them to establish more quickly. Then, you can gradually wean them from the terrarium/"incubator" conditions. I have been asked often for my recipe for rooting medium. It is one that really works well for me and has for many years. I got this recipe many years ago from Carol Schreck, a wonderful grower from Florida. Rooting Medium 4 parts coarse vermiculite 2 parts milled sphagnum moss 1 part coarse perlite ½ part horticultural charcoal.



MEET THE MEMBER

This month's member profile is from Carolee Carter

I was born in Chicago, Illinois, and moved to Ogden Dunes, Indiana, on Lake Michigan when I was 12. I attended Indiana University and graduated with a B.S. in Business Administration. I moved to Chicago's Near Northside to my first apartment and began working in a non-profit organization whose agenda was right in the midst of the Richard J. Daley years of Chicago politics and the high-fashion "Magnificent Mile" of North Michigan Avenue.

After living in Chicago, I moved to Maryland for a few years, where I worked for the President of the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (it's that organization that tests cars with dummies in them!). After four years in Maryland, I again moved, this time to South Florida, where I was married to Clive and began working for a major newspaper company (Knight-Ridder). I was the Executive Assistant to the Publisher of The Miami Herald and later to the Vice Chairman of that company (same person).

During the time when I lived in Ft. Lauderdale, I "stumbled" upon an African violet show that was being held in the mall I usually frequented. "I couldn't believe how beautiful they were". After buying a dozen or so plants, I discovered that there was a club whose meetings were close to my home and they met at a time when I wasn't working! It was The Violet Patch of South Florida.

But, despite so many high-tech diversions in today's world, simply walking into my violet room and staring at the beauty they share with me is a joy and allows me to relax from whatever stresses the day may have offered!"

Other hobbies? "Besides African violets, I'm thoroughly engrossed in the art of rubber stamping & creating artsy greeting cards. I quilt – but not bedspreads! Mostly my quilts are wall hangings with a landscape theme. I also am a photographer and belong to a small photography group and post on Flickr. I do machine embroidery too as well as other crafty things like book folding! I volunteer at Hospice of Marion County and belong to the Ocala Star-Banner's Reader's Forum that meets once a month to discuss what was good or bad about the news reporting that month and how they could do better. RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Carolee Carter

Tortellini Salad with Roasted Peppers, Parmesan and Fresh Basil

1 lb. or 2 (9-oz.) packages of cheese-filled tortellini
2/3 cup extra-virgin olive oil
1 red bell pepper
1 green bell pepper
½ cup frozen petite peas
6T freshly grated Parmesan cheese
½ cup chopped fresh basil
Salt, if desired & freshly ground pepper to taste
1 tsp. red pepper flakes, if desired

Bring a large pot of water to a boil; add salt, then pasta. Cook uncovered over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally, about 8 minutes or according to package directions. Drain, rinse gently with cold water, and drain well. Transfer to a large bowl. Add olive oil and toss to combine. (It might appear that there is too much oil, but it will be absorbed by the remaining ingredients.)

Preheat broiler. Broil bell peppers about 2 inches from heat source, turning about every 5 minutes with tongs until pepper skin is blistered and charred – about 15 to 25 minutes. Transfer to a Ziplock freezer bag (it is thicker) and close the bag. Let the peppers stand 10 minutes.

Peel off the skin from each pepper using a paring knife. Halve peppers lengthwise & discard seeds and ribs. Drain well on paper towels & pat dry. Halve pepper pieces crosswise; cut each half in thin lengthwise strips about ¼-inch wide.

Add Parmesan cheese to the salad & toss. Add pepper strips, peas & basil and toss unto combined. Season to taste with salt, red pepper flakes, and pepper. (Salad can be kept, covered, up to 1 day in refrigerator. Bring to room temperature before serving)

Makes 4 main-course or 8 first-course servings.

Violet Growers Kill a Lot of Violets!

Violets die pretty often. They can be a challenging plant to grow and many people say that they can't keep them alive. If that's you, you can learn more about the skills at our website.

But wait... why are the expert growers "killing" African violets?

To Limit Collection - Growing every violet you can find and rooting every leaf that breaks will soon make your fun hobby into a lot of work. Good growers carefully select the violets that do best for them and keep just one or two. That means less watering, more time to grow them well, and a prettier collection.

To Get Rid of Problems - The

easiest way to keep violets healthy is to throw away anything that looks suspicious -quickly. Very few violets are so valuable that it is worth the risk of losing everything to save them. And when you dispose them, do it right! Seal suspicious plants in sealed bags before you put

them in the trash so that bugs or disease are confined.

To Develop Quality New Hybrids - Seedpods from hybrid crosses produce a lot of little seedlings. Hybridizers often find that only 1% of the seedlings will have the exact combination of traits they wanted. The rest are discarded, often into a compost bin for recycling in the garden. It's brutal life making such decisions.

To have more vigorous plants - Most growers want violets that grow well, bloom true to the variety, and don't require extra attention just to keep them alive. Choosing the strongest and truest plants is wise, whether at a sale, when removing suckers, or when selecting which babies to save from leaf cuttings. In the latter case, it means that many if not most of the babies from a leaf will be discarded. Saving weak strains of your favorite varieties will not make you love them more. Add them to the compost heap and nature will re-purpose them.



RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynne Wilson

Butter Brickle

2 cups flour
1/2 cup oats
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup chopped pecans
1 cup (2 sticks) of butter, melted
1 box of vanilla ice cream
1 iar of butterscotch sauce

Preheat your oven to 400°F. Mix together the flour, oats, brown sugar, and pecans in a large bowl. Add the butter and mix thoroughly. Spread the mixture evenly on a baking sheet and bake for 15 minutes. Watch closely during the last few minutes, as the edges can start to burn.

Using a 9 x 13-inch pan, crumble half of the mixture into the bottom. Top with half of the jar of butterscotch sauce. Cover with ice cream. * Sprinkle the remaining cookie mixture over top of the ice cream and top with the rest of the butterscotch sauce. Cover and freeze for at least a couple of hours before serving. *Tip: Open your box of ice cream completely and slice the ice cream into 1-inch slices. The ice cream will start to soften slightly once on top of the warm cookie mixture, so let it sit for a few minutes and then spread the ice cream so that it is an even layer.

Where Did That Baby Come From?

Babies, plantlets, clones... each term refers to the same thing. When you propagate, or put down a leaf, each little plant that develops has



grown from one single cell on that leaf stem.

When Jeffery Smith, B.S., M.S., PhD (Botany) and AVSA Research Chair, was asked if it was a cut cell which generates the plantlet, he replied, "The injured cell puts out a signal (I'm hurt, help) and a neighboring cell responds to the message... The



message the injured cell puts out can only travel a certain distance. It probably is carried by the veins and concentrates where a vein terminates. Unspecialized cells (such as epidermal or skin cells) near the location where the signal travels or concentrates will be the most likely to respond and divide." One cell signals danger, and another nearby cell makes an identical plantlet, which guarantees the survival of the species. It also makes our hobby more fun.



Chimeras, such as 'Yukako' seen here, cannot be propagated by leaf cuttings.

That is because a chimera has two different sets of DNA in its cells. Each plantlet from leaf propagation will carry only the set of chromosomes that were contained in the cell from which that plant generated.

Warning... propagation works very efficiently in African violets. One propagated leaf has many unspecialized cells near the cut end of the stem. That leaf may produce many clones - 10 or more is possible.

You can even spray mist the plants once or twice a week. However, you'll want to use warm water and you can add a small amount of fertilizer to the water. The violet leaves actually take up more nutrients through foliar feeding rather than through their root system. We finally have a theme for our 2019 show: "Dancing With Violets." It's a good theme and gives us plenty of possibilities for designers. Thanks to Carolee Carter who will be writing the schedule. Show dates are February 21-23, with set-up on the 21st. There are only 10 weeks before the African Violet Council of Florida's show and plant sale in Lakeland. The show will be held at Hilton

Chicken Delish

6-8 Boneless, skinless chicken thighs 1 small jar Apricot preserves (10-12oz) 1 small bottle Ranch Dressing (16oz) 1 envelope onion soup mix

Place chicken in a greased 2- 3-quart glass baking dish

Combine the preserves, the ranch dressing and the onion soup mix, pour over the chicken. Bake in a 350-degree oven for 45-50 minutes until the sauce is bubbling and the chicken is cooked through

Serve with rice and a side salad or vegetable.

AVSA Weekly Growing Tip

July 9th, 2018

This weeks growing tip was apropos for this time of year!

Violets in the Oven



Kateri Pavlik had a disaster this spring in rural New York State
"Oh, my gosh. I stupidly put them outside on a cloudy but warm day, thinking they'd love it. I can't believe it. Four boxes of species, Russians, all beautiful leaves and babies - dead."



She has shared her story as a warning to anyone who is tempted to think that violets would like to be outside in the fresh air. Kateri said, "Don't (put them outside), even on cloudy days! It was thunder stormy, but I guess they cooked."

Keeping her leaves in clear plastic boxes as they went outside, caused the damage to occur very quickly. The heat built up and could not escape. Notice that Kateri's leaves just went limp, much like a cabbage leaf would collapse in boiling water.

Kateri kept the leaves a little longer hoping the below-ground stems might generate offspring. It was worth a try, but there was never any sign of life.

Lesson learned... African violets grew outside originally in the shade of a deep forest canopy. They really won't tolerate sitting outside in bright direct light for very long, even on cloudy days. Keep those violets safe out there!

Mix all ingredients, chill, serve with ginger snaps and/or Vanilla wafers



RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Jim Boyer BUTTERNUT SQUASH MAPLE BACON CASSEROLE 12 servings

4 lb butternut squash, peeled and chopped (about 10 1/2 cups)
4 eggs, lightly beaten
1/3 cup butter, cut up
1/4 cup packed brown sugar
1/4 cup maple syrup
1/4 cup milk
8 oz maple flavor bacon, chopped
1 medium onion, quartered and sliced
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon, or more to taste
Maple syrup

Preheat oven to 350F. Grease a 3 qt rectangular baking dish; set aside.

In a large Dutch oven cook butternut squash, covered, in enough boiling salted water to cover for 25-30 minutes or until tender; drain. Return to pan. Mash squash with a potato masher. Gradually stir about 1 cup of the mashed hot squash into the beaten eggs. Return mixture to remaining squash in pan. Add butter, brown sugar, the 1/4 cup maple syrup, and the milk. Whisk until well combined. Transfer squash mixture to the prepared baking dish. Bake uncovered for 25 minutes.

Meanwhile, cook bacon and onion over medium heat about 10 minutes or until bacon is slightly crispy and onion is tender, stirring frequently. Remove from heat, drain off any excess fat. Stir in cinnamon.

Top the casserole with the bacon and onion mixture. Bake uncovered about 10 minutes more or until edges are set and casserole is heated through. Drizzle with additional maple syrup. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving.

NOTES: 9-1-17 Tender after 25 min. Too sweet. Leave out brown sugar next time. 9-23-18 Made exactly but didn't add syrup at end – great.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn Bandy

ALMOND CRESCENTS

2 cups flour

1 Tbs Vanilla

½ tsp salt

5 oz toasted almonds (ground fine)

1 cup confectioner's sugar

1 cup butter

Mix all above ingredients together. Form into a large ball and let rest for 30 minutes
Form 1 tsp of dough into a ball, roll into crescent shape
Bake in a 325 degree oven for 15-18 minutes until just slightly browned on the edges

When slightly cool, dust with additional confectioner's sugar,
Dust again when completely cool
Store in an airtight container

Makes 56 cookies

I also make these into balls and roll in red and green sugar crystals

Two Violets Sitting Pretty in Isolation



When violets need to be isolated, protected, or need more humidity some growers look for beautiful ways which also enhance home and decorating.

Andee Bui thought of Beauty and the Beast as she placed her miniature African violet 'Jolly Bambino' inside a Mason jar. Why is it in isolation? Andee says, "My jar is used to protect both the plant and Marcie, the cat, who loves when I put a blooming plant on a table. I just sprayed the plant with AzaMax, so the jar separates them. No cat hair on plant, no chemical on cat. Now she can take a nap next to it without being tempted to eat it."

A small jelly jar is set inside as a wickwatering reservoir. Occasionally Andee lifts the jar to diffuse condensation inside the glass.



Theresa Bennett of Indianapolis, Indiana, had a problem in the Spring of 2018. "I needed a way to isolate a sick violet and keep it from getting knocked off a table. And I wanted a pretty way to display some other violets too."

She went to the Internet to find an idea. What she came up with is this beautiful glass case made from picture frames! The style is similar to Wardian cases which were popular in the 19th century.

A glass case is useful for isolating a sick or a newly purchased violet. It may also help keep humidity around violets especially in drier climates. And, as an added advantage Theresa finds "It does keep the cat hair off the leaves... for a while." And it looks beautiful!
