FLORIDA STATE FAIR. . . February 10-21. We'll be putting in our display on Sunday, February 6, at 1 pm. As you know, we were unable to have our show last year. Since we had already selected our theme, "Violets Celebrate the Wonders of Space." and had prepared a show schedule, we used that theme for our display at the Fair. For this year's Fair display, we'll use a related space theme, "A Galaxy of Violets."

Here are some of the things we need:

- 1. Members helping with the setup which should take only about two hours. So please plan to come and help.

Up. Down. All Around. Understanding the Three Basic Plant Nutrients

Have you ever noticed when you go to your favorite garden center that there are more choices of fertilizers to choose from than cereal

options at the grocery store? How do you decide which one to buy and what do all those numbers mean?

Let's clear the air of a big misconception. Fertilizer is not food. Plants make their own food and fertilizer helps them do it. When you look at the product label you will see three numbers, such as 9-3-6 or 10-10-10. These numbers represent the percentage of a specific nutrient. It is an industry standard that those numbers will always represent nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. They will always be in that order. Excluding oxygen, hydrogen, and carbon there are currently 15 or 16 essential elements that a plant needs. We are going to talk about the big three: N-P-K.

What do they do? A simplified way to remember what the big three do is: up, down, all around. Nitrogen helps with green vertical growth. Phosphorus helps with roots (and flowers). Potassium helps with overall plant health. Generally speaking these are the three elements that the plant needs the most to be happy and healthy.

Nitrogen is the most needed nutrient for plants. Nitrogen promotes green growth and helps with other biological processes. When a plant is lacking nitrogen symptoms of deficiencies will show up in older leaves first. We will also see poor new growth that will be lighter in color. Most species and older cultivars of violets naturally have a light green color to their leaves. Knowing what your plant should look like will help determine if the plant is lacking nitrogen. Too much nitrogen can promote rapid green growth, brittle leaves, and poor flower formation.

When you look at the product label you will notice that nitrogen could have two or three different types. Most often we see ammoniacal, nitrate, and urea nitrogen listed. Typically urea is not plant ready until converted to ammonium by bacteria. That bacteria may or may not be present in a potting mix. Using only one formulation of nitrogen can also affect the soil pH (acidity or alkalinity). It is best to use a product that has at least two formulations of nitrogen such as ammoniacal and nitrate. This will help reduce the chances of the soil pH swings[i].

Phosphorus is the second most needed nutrient. Phosphorus helps with root development, encourages flowers, and other biological functions. When a plant is deficient in phosphorus we often see leaf tips on older leaves browning following by turning dark green with a purplish hue on the backside of the leaf or the petiole. This can be challenging to diagnose because many of our violet cultivars have a red back. When a plant has too much phosphorus we see it exhibited through micronutrient deficiencies.

Most fertilizers use the phosphate formulation of P_2O_5 .

Potassium is the third most needed nutrient for plants. Potassium helps with the overall plant health. It will aid in the movement of water, nutrient flow, carbohydrates, and other biological processes. When a plant is lacking potassium we will see weak stems, yellowing of older leaf tissue (chlorosis) followed by localized death of tissue. It is rare to see potassium toxicity in the plant. However, if it does occur we will see micronutrient such as zinc, magnesium, and manganese become deficient.

Most products will use the soluble potash formulation of K_2O .

Soil pH and temperature of the growing space will also affect the availability and uptake of nutrients by the plants. Traditionally speaking most plants, including violets, prefer a soil pH around 6. This will allow all of the macro and micro nutrients to be available for uptake. Both warm and cool growing conditions can affect the availability of nutrients such as nitrogen. Ideally it is best to keep the temperature between 68°F to 82°F (20°C to 27°C). Remember that grow lights will produce some heat and keeping a thermometer on your stands will allow you to monitor. New LED lights produce less heat so you may need to adjust your growing space accordingly.

Which fertilizer ratio do you choose from? Garden centers are flooded with endless options. An industry standard is the 3-1-2 or a 1-1-1 ratio. This provides the plants with the essential nutrients that a plant needs to be happy and healthy. We often forget that most

fertilizers deliver the nutrients in a form of a salt. These salts can build up when using larger percentage numbers. Some newer natural based products bypass the salts. However, they use manures, meal-based ingredients and oils. Those come with a pronounced aroma which may or may not be desirable in a home setting. Please remember that organic does not mean it is safer and everything is a chemical. When using any fertilizer remember that more is not better and always follow the labeled instructions.

More growers have switched over from tap water to reverse osmosis (RO) water. If this is your case you may want to choose a fertilizer that contains a portion of our micronutrients. The RO process does an excellent job removing impurities from the water and in some cases it will remove micronutrients. Look for a product that will also contain sulfur, iron, manganese, and zinc.

When deciding on what to use try to buy the smallest size available. This way if your plants react poorly to the product you are not left with a quart or gallon of something you may never use again. If you decide to switch products try it first on a few plants for three months before introducing to the whole collection. This way you can monitor for any issues. Finally, if it isn't broke, don't fix it. If you found a product that you get great results with, there is no need to change.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn E Bandy It's strawberry season again!

STRAWBERRY PRETZEL SALAD

Topping

2 packages (4-serving size each) Jell-O® strawberry-flavored gelatin
2 cups boiling water
2 boxes (16 oz each) frozen sweetened strawberries, thawed

Crust

2 cups pretzels, crushed3/4 cup butter, melted3 tablespoons sugar

Filling

1 container (8 oz) Cool Whip frozen whipped topping, thawed 1 package (8 oz) cream cheese, softened 1 cup sugar

Steps

1

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir in strawberries; refrigerate until partially set, about 1 hour 45 minutes.

2

Heat oven to 350° F. In medium bowl, mix Crust ingredients. Press into ungreased 13 x 9-inch baking dish. Bake 10 minutes. Cool on cooling rack.

3

In medium bowl, beat Filling ingredients with electric mixer on medium speed until smooth. Spread over cooled crust. Cover and refrigerate until cool and gelatin topping in bowl is partially set.

4

Carefully spoon gelatin topping over filling. Refrigerate 4 to 6 hours or until firm. To serve, cut into 4 rows by 3 rows.

MIXING IT UP

Whether your first violets are starter plants or mature plants, at some point, you will need to repot them. Repotting once or twice a year enhances growth, and fresh growth encourages blooming. What will you use for a potting mix? My first violets were gifts from my grandmother when I was 10 years old. As a young girl, I had no idea what a "soilless mix" was, and even if I knew, I still would have selected the closest thing at hand... the endless supply of soil in my backyard. That wasn't the best decision and those violet are long gone, but now I know a good deal more about what makes a good potting mix for African violets.

What does a potting mix do? Physically a potting mix provides a substrate to anchor the roots for the plant to grow. It makes water and oxygen available to the roots. Chemically, the mix holds the nutrients the plant needs. In the wild, African violets grow in crevices and loose substrate on rocky cliffs or porous rocks. You want a potting mix that approximates these conditions: evenly moist but well-draining, slightly acidic, and with a loose crumbly texture. Potting mixes suitable for African violets contain no actual soil' that is why they are called soilless mixes. Here are some tips to help you make a good decision for your plants' mix.

POTTING MIX INGREDIENTS


The most common ingredients in potting mixes are sphagnum peat moss, perlite, vermiculite and dolomite lime. Sphagnum peat moss comes from a bog plant that grows in low-pH, poorly draining environments. Since other plants cannot grow under these conditions, peat moss is free of weeds and weed seeds. It also has good water-holding capacity, which makes it ideal for houseplants and container gardens.

Perlite is made by heating a type of volcanic rock to a very high temperature. The water trapped in the rock expands, creating a light, porous material. There are various type of perlite, sorted by the average size of the particles, from very fine to quite chunky. Look for coarse or horticultural grade perlite. If it is sold by a numerical grade, look for grades 3 or 4.

Vermiculite is made by heating up a type of laminated rock. It expands into a very light material that has excellent water-holding capacity and can improve soil aeration. In general, perlite drains better than vermiculite.

Dolomite lime is a powder-fine ground rock that is used to adjust the pH and add calcium and magnesium to the potting mix. Most peat moss has a pH of around 3.5 to 4, which is well outside the ideal pH for African violets and most other plants. Unless you are buying pure peat moss, most commercial potting mixes have some added dolomite lime to adjust the pH. Be sure to look for the powdered dolomite. The granular type is for lawns and gardens.

Coir now is included in many commercial potting mixes. Coir is ground-up coconut husks. Compared to peat moss, coir has higher water retention, a finer texture and a neutral pH. Many growers have had success using this material, but I have found that I need to use a lot more perlite to make a mix suitable for wick-watering.



YOUR POTTING MIX

There is no single, perfect potting mix. The best potting mix for your plants depends on your growing conditions, including the general temperature and humidity, and how your water and fertilize your plants. If you wick water or mat water, you will want to use a potting mix that contains 40% to 60% perlite. If you buy a ready-made mix, look for words like "wicking mix" to let you know that this is a well-draining material.

The African violets you buy in the supermarket or big box store might be in a much heavier mix that holds a good bit of water. This makes sense because once these plants leave the greenhouse, their care won't be as consistent. When people get them home, it is easy to overwater them and kill them with kindness. Your violets still can grow in these mixes as long as you are careful to water them only when the top inch or so of the soil feels dry to the touch.

If you are a new grower with a small number of plants, consider getting your potting mix from

one of our AVSA commercial growers or an eBay supplier recommended by another grower. They've already done the work for you to blend an optimal mix, especially for African violets. As a new grower, you have many things to learn, and having a tried and true potting mix can eliminate one variable.

Many popular horticultural supply companies offer bags of potting mix especially for African violets. They usually come in 8-quart sizes, so it is ideal for the hobbyist with a small collection. Some of these mixes contain fertilizer, so if you choose to use them, be sure to cut back on your own fertilizer for the first few months after you repot. These blends are sold to be used straight out of the bag, but they generally are heavier mixes with very little perlite. I have had success mixing these blends evenly (50/50) with coarse perlite or a 40% mix to 60% coarse perlite. The percentage of perlite can vary because of factors like coarseness or individual growing conditions. Even variations in the base mix can affect the water-holding capacity of the final product. Start with a 50/50 blend and adjust as needed.



If you have a lot of plants or you just like to "do it yourself," you can easily blend your own African violet potting mix. A good place to start is with either Pro-Mix BX or Pro-Mix HP, or a similar commercial mix. These brands are readily available in garden centers or horticultural supply stores. One drawback is that the base-mix comes in large bags or compressed bales. Depending on the number of plants you have, that might mean you have a very large supply of potting mix.

If it seems like that much potting mix will be more than you can foresee using, consider teaming up with your local club or growing friends to share the cost of materials. Mixing up a good potting mix could be a fun club activity, and a good opportunity to learn about potting mix and repotting violets. There are a lot of good recipes, probably as many as there are growers. Talk to successful growers; most of them will be happy to share their recipes.

OTHER ADDITIONS

I don't add vermiculite to my potting mix because I wick water, and I think the vermiculite makes the mixture hold too much water. The Pro-Mix I use contains mycorrhizae, which are beneficial fungi that have a symbiotic relationship with the roots and enhance their ability to absorb water and nutrients. Since the mycorrhizae in the base mix don't have a long shelf-life, I add some additional mycorrhizae before I pot up my plants. I adjust my pH with dolomite lime to a range of 6.5 to 6.8. This is a good pH range, however many successful growers do not test or adjust their pH since most base mixes already have some dolomite lime added.

You might have read a lot about fertilizers and additives some growers include in their potting mixes. Before you start adding a laundry list of "special" additives, be sure first that you can tell whether any positive or negative changes to your plants are related to the potting mix and not some other change. No matter how promising you think the improvements or additives are going to be, try the new mix on just a few plants at first. Even the most experienced growers have made the mistake of moving an entire collection to something new, only to discover weeks or months later that perhaps they should have given it a test-drive first.

That wasn't so hard, was it? Is it time for your plants to be repotted? Buy some of your favorite mix or mix up a batch and get to it. No matter what potting mix you choose, you will find that the best "additive" of all is your time and consistent care.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn E Bandy

Secret Kiss Cookies

1 cup butter softened

½ cup sugar

1 tsp vanilla

2 cups flour

1 cup finely chopped walnuts

30 kisses

1 1/3 cups confectioners' sugar

2 Tbs baking cocoa

In a large bowl cream the butter, sugar and vanilla until light and fluffy. Gradually add flour, and mix well, fold in walnuts. Refrigerate dough for 2-3 hours until firm

shape into 1 inch balls, flatten balls and place a kiss in the center of each, pinch dough together around kiss. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake at 375 for 12 minutes until set but not browned. Cool for 1 minute remove from pan to wire rack

Mix together 2/3 cup confectioners sugar and cocoa. While cookies are still warm roll 1/2 in chocolate mixture and ½ in remaining confectioners sugar



TERI'S SPECIAL CABBAGE

½ pound bacon chopped
1 Shallot (or small onion) thinly sliced
1 small head green cabbage cored and chopped
¼ cup cider vinegar
¼ cup brown sugar
Salt and pepper to taste

Render bacon in skillet, remove and keep 2 TBS of bacon fat in pan.
Saute shallot until clear. Return bacon to pan and add remainder of ingredients, cook until cabbage is tender.



GROWING TIPS

Perfect Temperature for Violets



The perfect temperature range for violets is 65° to 80° F. At 65° growth is very slow, but violets can survive and the flower colors are often deep and rich. At 80° F growth is fast but the flowers don't last long and the color is less intense.

Many growers keep a gauge near the plants to record temperature and humidity both day and night.

Temperature changes of more than 10 degrees in 24 hours may spell trouble with diseases like powdery mildew.
Temperature changes from one season to the next may cause a change in the growth pattern of leaves. Big changes aren't ideal, and you should pay attention.

Many would say that the mid-70s are the perfect temperature, which isn't always possible. Some varieties thrive in cool and others thrive in warm. Find the varieties that like the temperatures you prefer and you can all be happy.

Adrienne "Annie" Rieck has been actively growing African violets since the mid-1990s. Her first attempt, however, was back in the wayback, when she was in college. Someone gave her a leaf to root, which promptly rotted. Her second attempt was a gift she could never get to bloom a second time. The third time was the charm: a violet rescue from a Jewel grocery store in Chicagoland, the discovery of the African Violet Society of America (AVSA), and the advent of the Internet, set Annie on the path to growing and showing her plants. She is an AVSA Senior Judge, an AVSA Life Member, an AVSC Life Member, an Honorary Life Member of the Illinois African Violet Society (IAVS), and a past member of Missouri Valley African Violet Council (MVAVC), Hoosier African Violet Society (Crown Point, IN); and Ventura County African Violet Society (Ventura, CA) where she was also a past president.

Annie was the host of video podcast *All About African Violets*, which was in production from 2012 - 2022.

At AVSA's 2020 cyber convention, Annie led a workshop entitled "African violets 101: Wait! It's Not Just for Beginners." She was also the host of the All About African Violets podcast – which many of you have seen.

However, in 2021 Annie was diagnosed with cancer and subsequently had surgery in late

October. She has since learned that she is cancer free!

Annie will tell us what she's doing now with violets and what she thinks is important for us to know about having success with growing African violets.

A link to the Zoom meeting will be sent a few days prior to the meeting.

We hope you will join us for what promises to be a most informative meeting. See below Annie's post from January 16, 2022, captioned "Keep Moving Forward. . .", which tells about her experience with cancer and gives insight into what's been going on in her life.

Keep Moving Forward



Once again, I find myself in the position of saying goodbye. *All About African Violets* will not be returning to production in 2022.

I want to assure you that I'm healthy and strong. I am very lucky that my cancer was caught so early (Grade 1). Endometrial cancer is very treatable and has a 99% cure rate. From the beginning, I focused on being in that 99% and I am (:) The treatment for me was a complete hysterectomy along with a couple of lymph nodes. I had this surgery on October 29, 2021. My surgery was minimally invasive and done on an outpatient basis (!) I am still amazed that I had major abdominal surgery and came home the same day! My surgeon did the Sentinel Lymph Node procedure on me – giving me a 90% LESS chance of ever developing lymphedema in my legs. The pathology came back about a week later with the result: No Residual Cancer. Anyone who has ever received that result knows that it means that I am cancer-free (Yahoo!!!!!). It also means that the cancer had not spread from the polyp where it was initially found. Because it had not spread, I did not even need to have chemo or radiation. My final results were Grade 1, Stage 1A. This was the best possible news for me! Again - I

know how lucky I was and continue to be. My 6-week recovery period went smoothly, and I have recovered well. My cancer journey is chronicled on my personal blog. Feel free to share that link with anyone who might benefit from it.


You can see that I have MUCH to be grateful for. And I am. Grateful. But receiving a cancer diagnosis changes everything, you guys. It really does. So much happened to me last year — I actually underwent four surgeries: two oral surgeries, one of which happened before I was vaccinated; and two gynecological surgeries. Four surgeries in one year in the time of COVID . . . it was a lot to process. It's *still* a lot to process.

But learning I had cancer and then learning I was cancer-free - those two things had the biggest impact on me. These are life-altering events, and everything is different because of them. I feel like I have been given a second chance in my life and I'm making decisions on how I want my life to look as I keep moving forward. And so, while it's not an easy decision, it's time for me to say goodbye. I want to thank Douglas the Digital Dude for all of his behind the scenes help over the years. He's seriously amazing, you guys! I would be remiss if I did not thank my resident experts, Joyce Stork and Dr. Jeff Smith. Big thanks, too, to everyone who helped defray the costs of production – and, of course, to all of you for watching. All About African Violets has always been a labor of love for me and I'm glad you have all enjoyed it. If you learned something from it, so much the better © I plan to keep posting the occasional photo of my plants on Instagram. Here is a link if you want to take a look at what's on the stands from time to time.

And finally, I encourage you to find your joy. I did and it brought me this podcast.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn E Bandy

Lemon-Almond Bars

Ingredients

2 3/4 cups granulated sugar, divided 3/4 cup butter, softened 2 tablespoons plus 1 tsp. lemon zest, divided 3 1/4 cups all-purpose flour, divided 1/2 teaspoon table salt, divided Vegetable cooking spray 6 large eggs 1/4 cup chopped crystallized ginger 1 teaspoon baking powder 2/3 cup fresh lemon juice 1/4 cup butter, melted 1/2 cup sliced almonds Garnish: powdered sugar

Step 1

Preheat oven to 350°. Beat 1/4 cup granulated sugar, butter, and 1 tsp. zest at medium speed with a heavy-duty electric stand mixer 2 minutes or until creamy. Stir together 2 cups flour and 1/4 tsp. salt. Gradually add to butter mixture, beating until just blended. Coat a 13- x 9-inch pan with cooking spray. Press dough into bottom of prepared pan. Chill 15 minutes. Step 2

Bake at 350° for 15 to 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove from oven; reduce oven temperature to 325°.

Step 3

Whisk together eggs and 2 cups sugar. Process ginger and 1/2 cup flour in a food processor 1 minute or until ginger is finely chopped. Stir in baking powder. Whisk ginger mixture into egg mixture. Whisk in lemon juice and remaining 2 Tbsp. lemon zest; pour over crust.

Step 4

Bake at 325° for 15 to 20 minutes or until filling is just set. Remove from oven.

Step 5

Stir together remaining 3/4 cup flour, 1/2 cup sugar, and 1/4 tsp. salt in a small bowl. Stir in melted butter until well blended. Stir in almonds. Sprinkle over hot lemon mixture, and bake 20 to 25 more minutes or just until lightly golden.

Cool completely in pan on a wire rack (about 1 hour). Cut into squares.



GROWING TIPS

April 19th 2022

GETTING THE PLANTING DEPTH JUST RIGHT

Some growers struggle to know how deep to plant young violets when repotting. It's important, because when a violet plug is planted too deep, it may not survive.



See where the arrow is pointing, right between the leaf axils and the roots? That is the critical point for potting. The roots should be entirely below and the leaf axils entirely above the level of the soil.

Here is the same violet plug planted at exactly the correct soil depth.



No soil is piled into the center of the plant where it could overwhelm the growth point or trigger suckers to develop.

Plant violets at the right depth for success.

SUMMER SPINACH STRAWBERRY SALAD

Ingredients

- 5-6 Cups Fresh Baby Spinach
- 2 Cups Strawberries, cut to bite size
- 5 oz Gorgonzola Cheese
- 8 Strips Cooked Bacon, chopped (optional - but so good)
- 1/2 Cup Dried Cranberries
- 1/2 Cup Pecans, bite size, toasted
- Directions

Clean spinach, place in large bowl and top with ingredients. Add desired amount of dressing, toss and enjoy.

SWEET BALSAMIC DRESSING

- Ingredients
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil or canola
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons good balsamic vinegar

- 1/8 teaspoon dry mustard (or a little squeeze of yellow or Grey Poupon mustard)
- Few twists of fresh cracked pepper Or use 1/8 tsp of reg ground pepper

Directions

Whisk all the ingredients together, until sugar and oil are blended. It takes a few minutes for the oil and sugar to blend. Keep whisking....it will blend!

Tips

- You can add more or less of each ingredient - do what you prefer.
- Top with grilled chicken breast a favorite in our house!
- To toast pecans place in skillet on medium high heat, stirring until lightly toasted.
- If you plan on serving the entire salad, go ahead and add the dressing a little at a time, blending until you reach desired amount. If not, keep dressing separate and add individually.

Is it time to

LIMIT YOUR COLLECTION?

At some point, most growers hit their limit and realize that violets can be overwhelming. Violets reproduce so easily. When that happens, the hobby is more work than fun. You do not need to grow every clone from every leaf. Several growers recommend keeping only two of a variety (1 + insurance) and tossing the rest (either to those who want them or to the trash). That allows these growers to choose the strongest and to take excellent care of them.

Another grower wrote 52 years ago about keeping her collection to just three! You may enjoy her sage advice in a vintage article from the June 1970 African Violet Magazine.

HOLD IT!

Lillian Lewis Bodine, St. Louis MO African Violet Magazine, June 1970, page 22

The African Violet Magazine is always filled with wonderful information about the propagation of African violets by a simple method involving a leaf from a well-loved plant with very little trouble or time. Gardening magazines frequently have material about an easy way to fill you home and that of your friends with these lovely plants.

Well!

It is time that somebody tells the world that it IS possible to have as few as THREE violet plants without the owner having to prove that she is a citizen in good standing even if she sticks to the minimum. Violet growers somehow all too often prove that they can grow and GROW and GROW even when there is a plant housing problem. Many homes have so many violet plants that there is little room for any other kind of plant or any other kind of decoration. It is time that those who love violets but won't move out to give them room, speak up.

I love African violets. I like to arrange the flowers and to combine these delicate little beauties with other plant material to make bouquets for my home or to give to my friends. However, I only want to grow about three plants. It is as hard to do this as it is to make

the proverbial attempt to eat only one potato chip. But if you try hard to keep your mind on what you are doing, you CAN overcome any tendency toward violet addiction. In any case, I have limited space for plants and I enjoy contrasting leaf shapes and plant structure, so I do not want all of my house plants to be of one kind. I do want some healthy violet plants which will give me plenty of bloom so that I can pinch off one or two stems now and then to use in an arrangement. For this reason, I have learned to dispose of a plant that doesn't earn its way.

Dispose of them

I had help in learning to control any idea of hoarding an unhealthy plant. A long time ago I was given a beautiful violet plant by a dear friend, Neva Anderson. I suffered and bled over this plant and every time a leaf drooped, I used all the remedies I'd ever heard about. The plant continued to suffer and one day when Neva came by, she said, "What would you have done if I'd sent you a box of cut flowers?" When I said I'd have disposed of them long ago when they faded, she said, "Then use that same method on the violet."

Well - from that moment I ceased to be a slave to any growing thing. I keep violets until they are too shabby and then OUT with them and I get another and keep my total at three. No - I do not replace the one I gave up with another of the same kind. I pick and choose until I find one that is worthy of being in such select company and try to grow it. I have favorites and some are old well-loved varieties and others are newer. Frequently they are gift plants and new to me and that is fun too. I don't mean to be so arbitrary about the number three that I would refuse a beautiful plant if my quota were already filled. But I do mean that I would make no effort to propagate plants no matter how beautiful unless I wanted one just like one which was on its way out. In that case, I might grow a second in order to preserve a special shape and color of plant and bloom. In deciding for yourself how many plants you can cope with, there are three elements to be considered: time, space, and energy. If all of these are unlimited in your life, you can grow violets by the dozens or hundreds and all is well. But if there is a limit to your supply of any one of these elements, you need to be careful.

Don't let your plants become a burden. You may have all the time in the world and plenty of energy but if you lack space, you should limit your plants to the number that looks uncrowded. Crowded plants look uncomfortable and cannot develop to their greatest potential.

Few are Better

If you have limited time for your plants, you should decide how many you can care for without pushing yourself or neglecting some phase of their culture. A few well-grown plants are infinitely superior to many shabby and neglected ones. If you have plenty of space and time but there are many places where you must expend your energy, then be very sure that you don't let your plants become too demanding. All the joy can go out of working with something as lovely as violets if you are too exhausted to enjoy every minute of the time you work with them. Limitations of your time, of your space, and of your energy are what can tell you how many violets you can grow without the sacrifice of either the plants or of time and energy. If violets are grown for the sheer joy of it, they should not become a burden in any way. Grow the number that is comfortable for you and let it go at that.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn E Bandy

DIRT CAKE

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 package Oreos
- 8 oz cream cheese, softened
- ½ Cup butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 Cup powdered sugar
- 2 small boxes (3.4 oz size) instant vanilla pudding
- 3 Cups milk
- 1 large tub (16 oz size) Cool Whip
- Chocolate candy rocks (optional)
- Strawberries with hulls intact (optional)

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Crush cookies until they resemble soil. Press about half into the bottom of a 9x13 dish. Set aside.
- In the bowl of your mixer beat the cream cheese, butter, sugar, and vanilla until light and fluffy. In a separate bowl, whisk milk and pudding mix for 2 minutes until thick. Fold in Cool Whip.
- 3. Gently fold pudding mixture into cream cheese mixture until combined.
- Spoon filling on top of the crushed Oreos.
- Press strawberries into the filing until just the green pokes out of the top (optional). Top with remaining crushed oreos.

Tips:

This can also be placed in a plastic pail using golden oreos in place of chocolate to resemble sand using a sand shovel to serve.

Gummie candies/worms can be used in place of the strawberries.

African violets - Plants

One plumeria had a seed pod, which is apparently a rare occurrence, so of course, when the pod matured, I had to try germinating and planting the seeds. CONTAINER GARDENS: TERRARIUMS

Terrariums are just miniature landscapes created in a clear, covered, container. The choice of the container and appearance of the landscape is entirely yours!

Step #1: Collecting plants and materials.

Nearly anything can be grown inside a glass container. What makes a good terrarium, however, is a miniature landscape that can be easily maintained to keep its intended appearance. For this reason, it is very important to use only plants that can grow (and not outgrow) within the confines of the container.

Use plants that are naturally small-leaved, don't grow too quickly, and can easily be maintained. Using these plants allows you to keep the original appearance of the landscape for a longer period of time, with a minimum of effort.

Don't use large, fast-growing plant material that is "cut down" to a size to fit into the container. They'll soon overwhelm slower-growing material planted with it and outgrow the container. Also, be careful about using too many blooming plants, or plants that easily shed their leaves. Old blooms and leaves will more quickly decay in the humid atmosphere inside a terrarium.

The choice of container is yours. Any clear, waterproof, container will do. Anything from a fine piece of crystal to an old mayonnaise jar. Unless you are adept at using tweezers, choose a container with a large enough opening for your hand—this will make planting and maintaining your terrarium easier.

Step #2: Add drainage material and soil.

Since your container is not likely to have drainage holes in the bottom, it's important to have a place for excess water to collect, so that plant material doesn't become overwatered. One way to provide this is to put a thin layer of perlite or horticultural charcoal in the bottom of the container. These materials will absorb little water and will provide good drainage. Charcoal has the advantage of being black (less visible) and freshens the soil in the container.

After the layer of drainage material is placed in the bottom, you can add your potting mix. Don't overfill the container. Since you'll be using small plants with small root systems, it isn't necessary to have more than a few inches of soil. To create some "depth" to the planting, mound the soil higher on one side (usually the back) than the others.

A light, porous, "soilless" (peat-based, no topsoil) mix is better, since too heavy a mix can retain too much water, a more serious problem when growing plants inside a closed container. We use our regular potting mix, a little over 50% of which is perlite and vermiculite. Use soil that has been

premoistened (moist, not soggy), since it will be easier to work with. Also, if it's too wet or too dry, it will be more difficult to keep the plant material and container clean.

Step #3: Place non-plant material.

Start your landscape by placing your large, nonplant material, like wood or rock into the container. We prefer to use natural materials, since we intend to create miniature view of what we might see in nature.

Like an outside garden, such a piece can act as the "anchor" around which plant material can be placed. This piece also provides some height and scale to the planting, making it more "three dimensional" and providing a background for the plants that will be added.



Step #4: Add plant material.

To make planting easier, you can remove much (or most) of the soil and rootball. Pruning the roots of a larger plant will slow their growth and help keep them small. Also, the layer of soil in the container shouldn't be more than a few inches deep, and won't accommodate plants with very large root systems.

Step #5: Placing plant material.

Add the larger, taller, plant material first–like planting trees and shrubs first in your garden. Use plants of differing heights, shapes, and textures. This is what makes your planting a "landscape" rather than just "plants in a glass jar".

If getting your hand into the container to place plants is difficult, use long-handled tweezers to make a planting hole and then grasping and placing plants. The same principles that apply in landscaping an any garden apply here, in miniature.

Place taller plants, or "trees" from middle to back, use intermediate plants to represent "shrubs", and smaller, low-growing material as "ground cover".

Use materials of different colors or textures, either as focal points of the planting, or to highlight (or hide) other materials. Since this is a miniature representation of a natural scene, it isn't necessary to use artificial or man-made materials or accessories.



Step #6: Covering the soil.

We like to cover the soil, with either lowgrowing plants or mosses once all of the plants have been placed. Shape and press the moss in between the plants and other material. Should you want to add more plants after placing the moss, simply create a hole in the moss and plant into it.

If mosses aren't available we might use fine (orchid) bark, or other natural, neutral-colored material to cover the soil surface. These mosses will eventually turn brown and die, but even then they look attractive. Should you wish to keep that "green" look, you can easily remove the old moss, or simply place sheets of new moss over the old.

Step #7: The finished terrarium.

Our last step is to place a miniature blooming plant into the planting—which would be necessary to exhibit in many shows. As before, select a miniature plant that won't outgrow the container, like a miniature violet or other gesneriad. Plants with blue, white, or other pastel colored (not multicolored) blooms are

best, since these are the colors one most often sees in nature.

Finally, clean excess debris from the container. Use a small brush to get rid of loose soil stuck on the glass. Small particles of soil can be washed from the plant leaves and wood when you water the planting. Do this gently and carefully. Provide only as much water as the plants need—don't overwater, especially if you intend to keep the container covered.



Step #8: Maintaining your terrarium.

Place your terrarium in a bright location free of direct (hot) sunlight—the glass can magnify the sunlight and heat will be collected inside, roasting the plants. Artificial light is good for this reason (bright but not hot), though we've grown many near (not in) windows. Water when needed, and lightly—rather than pouring water, try "spraying" water into the container.

Trim plants that become overgrown, pinching off tips of too-tall plants, and removing dead or decaying material. To limit plant growth even more, trim the *roots*, by poking a sharp (modeling) knife into the soil around the plant—this will cut the roots, which will limit the size of the plant. Properly maintained, plantings can be kept attractive for a year or more before replanting.

Give it a try, have fun, and good luck!

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn E Bandy

LEMON COOLER CREAM CAKE

1 (18.25 ounce) package lemon cake mix

1 cup hot water

1 cup cold water

2 (3 ounce) packages lemon flavored Jell-O® mix

1 cup milk

1 (3.4 ounce) package instant vanilla pudding mix

1 (8 ounce) container frozen whipped topping, thawed

Prepare cake and bake according to package directions in a 9x13 inch baking dish. With a fork, poke holes all over top of cake.

Combine 1 cup hot water and 1 cup cold water with one package of lemon gelatin. Stir until gelatin is dissolved, and pour mixture over cake. Chill in refrigerator until cool.

In large bowl stir together milk, vanilla pudding mix and remaining package of lemon gelatin until powders are dissolved. Fold in whipped topping and spread mixture over cake.

Refrigerate until serving

GROWINGTIPS

WATERING AFRICAN VIOLETS

Seasoned growers will tell you that proper watering is one of the most important skills you will learn in growing African violets. In fact, overwatering may be the number one cause of violet demise. The good news is there are many good ways to water African violets, and this is an easy skill to learn.

WATER QUALITY

In most locations, tap water will be fine, but the quality of tap water can vary. Chlorine levels may fluctuate, depending on the season. In some areas, tap water may have high amounts of chlorine, chloramines, or dissolved solids, All these things may adversely affect your African violets. Your water supply company can give you information on water quality, or you may have your water independently tested. In general, it is a good idea to fill a jug with water and let it sit overnight to let any chlorine dissipate. You may also use bottled water, filtered water, or reverse osmosis water. Water from a water softener may contain dissolved salts, and this will be a problem for your African violets.

Many growers use rainwater, with good results. While rainwater is generally free from some of the common contaminants in tap water, like chlorine and chloramines, it can acquire contaminants during collection. For example, roof runoff may contain pollen, roofing chemicals and bird droppings. Be sure the water you collect is clean and free from particulates and other contaminants. It is a good idea to test your water pH periodically. Tap water can fluctuate with the seasons, since chlorine and chloramines levels

tend to be higher in the warmer months. If your pH is outside the ideal range for African violets (6.5-7.5), you may adjust it using pH up or down products which are sold in aquarium or hydroponics stores. These stores also sell products that reduce or eliminate chlorine and chloramines.

Many growers will add their liquid or granular fertilizer to a jug of water and then use that solution to water their plants. The fertilizer is used at a low strength so that there is a low but constant level of fertilizer for consistent blooming and growth. For example, if the directions say to use 1/4 teaspoon per gallon per week, use 1/8 teaspoon.

TOP or BOTTOM WATERING

Casual growers (or growers with smaller collections) commonly use top or bottom watering. Water the plants either from the top or the bottom when the top half inch of the soil is somewhat dry. Put your finger in the top of the soil to test for dryness or lift the pot to feel the weight (pots with dry soil feel lighter than those with moist soil).

A dish or saucer is used under the pot to catch drainage. To water from the top, pour the water through the soil, taking care to keep water off the leaves. To water from the bottom, add the water directly to the saucer. When watering from the bottom, it may take a couple hours for the plant to absorb the water up to the top of the pot. In either case, pour off any water remaining in the saucer after a few hours. Advantages:

There is little preparation involved, other than having a saucer available.

You can check each individual plant to identify its exact water needs.

Disadvantages:

Can be time consuming, especially if you have a lot of plants.

Vacation watering can be a problem.

It is easy to over-water plants which can lead to root rot.

If the plants become very dry or wilt, do not flood the plant with water right away. A dry root system cannot absorb water; the roots need time to "plump up" before they are able to draw water again. Just add a tablespoon of water on top of the soil, and then repeat every hour or so until the soil is fully moist and the roots are ready to function again. It may help to place the

plant in a plastic bag to provide extra humidity to help it recover.

If the plant is limp but the soil is very wet, act quickly. Place the plant on a wad of paper towels or folded newspapers to help draw out the extra water. You may lose the outer rows of leaves, but, if the center survives, the plant will be saved.

WICK WATERING

Wick watering is a convenient way to water violets, especially if you have a large collection. Before you begin wick-watering, be certain that you have the correct pot size and potting mix, or you may end up with rotted plants because the soil was too wet.

The potting mix must be very porous so that there is plenty of air around the roots even when the mix is wet. Use a potting mix that is at least fifty percent coarse perlite. Growers with high humidity may need more perlite to get adequate porosity. If you buy your potting mix, look for words like 'wicking mix' as an indication that the mix is suitable for this type of watering. The potting mix should be moistened before you begin potting your violet, or the wicking process may not function properly. The wick should be 6 to 8 inches long (for a 4" pot) and must be a synthetic material such as acrylic, rayon, strips of old pantyhose, nylon yarn or cording. Wick watering takes advantage of capillary action to pull water through your plants.

Insert a wet wick when repotting by stringing it through the drainage hole in the pot and up to the top rim, then adding potting mix and the violet. Alternatively, you may put the wick in after potting by using a hook such as stiff wire, a crochet hook or a long darning needle. Push the straight end of the tool into a hole on the bottom of the pot, catch the wicking material in the hook, and pull on the tool at the top of the pot to bring it on through. Be careful not to puncture any leaves.

The wick should dangle out of the bottom of the pot and into a reservoir of water below. The pot itself should not contact the fertilizer water. The reservoir may be as simple as a plastic food container, or recycled glass jars. Make two holes in the cover – one for the wick and the other big enough to add more water to the reservoir (so that you do not have to remove the top).

Some people wick water with a community reservoir for many plants, such as a large water-filled tray with "egg crating" laid on top. Egg crating, which is used to diffuse fluorescent light fixtures, may be found in hardware stores or online. A community reservoir is convenient — you must fill only one reservoir instead of many. But there is a significant downside. Pests like soil mealybugs and some fungi (phytophthora and rhizoctonia) can spread from one plant to all the others on the same community watering system.

Advantages:

Less time consuming than watering individual plants.


Large reservoirs can keep the plants watered for weeks; no vacation watering issues. Disadvantages:

Algae often grows in the reservoir. To resolve, line the reservoir with a sheet of plastic which extends over the sides of the reservoir. You can throw out the plastic when it turns green instead of washing out the whole reservoir. Or, add one tablespoon of 3% hydrogen peroxide to a gallon of fertilized water to prevent algae growth. The plant may not soak up the water. To

resolve, pour water through the top of the pot to try to get the capillary action going. If the pot is broad and shallow (such as for trailing violets,) two or three wicks may be needed.

The plant may become too wet. In that case, repot with potting mix which contains more perlite.

MAT WATERING

Mat watering is similar to wick watering. Plants are placed on a damp absorbent mat. You can place pots directly on the mat, but some people use wicks in those pots to be sure there is

contact with the mat. Both the wick and the mat material must be synthetic. Old (or cheap) blankets or synthetic felt or fleece may be cut to size for the mat. Add water to the tray on a regular schedule, just enough to keep the mat moist. Use a porous soil mix like that used for wick watering. Mat watering works very well for small plants.

Some growers lay their matting over plastic egg-crating, which is elevated above the water. The egg-crating is cut to sit on the rims of the tray. The matting is cut and laid on the crating with one or more "tails" dangling on the side into the tray of water below. These tails will wick water and keep the matting moist for a longer time. The matting must be fully moist for the wicking action to work properly.

Advantages:

Fewer reservoirs to fill, compared to individual wick watering.

Disadvantages:

The mat may dry out very quickly.

If the shelf is not level, some of the plants may not get enough water.

Pests and diseases, such as soil mealybugs and some fungi such as phytophthora (crown rot) can spread very quickly through community watering.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn E Bandy

BOSTON CREAM PIE POKE CAKE

- 1 box yellow cake mix, plus ingredients called for on package
- 2 (3.4 oz) boxes instant vanilla pudding
- 4 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 12 oz bag chocolate chips
- 1 1/2 cups heavy cream

PREPARATION

- Prepare yellow cake in a 9x13-inch baking pan according to package instructions. Let cool completely.
- Once cake has cooled, poke holes all over the cake using the end of a wooden spoon.
- While cake cools, whisk together the instant pudding, milk, and vanilla extract in a large bowl. Before the pudding has a chance to set up and thicken, pour it evenly over the cake. Place in refrigerator to chill for one hour.
- 4. Once cake has chilled, make the chocolate ganache:
- 5. Place chocolate chips in a heatproof bowl and heat cream until simmering on the stovetop over low heat. (You can also heat it in the microwave.)
- Pour hot cream over chocolate chips and let sit for 5 minutes to soften the chocolate. Stir until smooth and let cool for 10 minutes.
- 7. Pour chocolate over cake and smooth with a spatula. Chill in refrigerator at least 4 hours and up to overnight before slicing and serving. Enjoy!

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn E Bandy

SALTED CARAMEL BUTTER BARS

- Crust/Topping:
- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 pound (4 sticks) salted butter, room temperature
- 1 1/4 cups powdered sugar
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 tablespoons vanilla extract
- •
- Filling:
- 50-60 caramel candies, wrappers removed (14 oz. bag)
- 1/3 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 tablespoon sea salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

PREPARATION

- 1. Preheat oven to 350° F and lightly grease a 9x13-inch dish with non-stick spray.
- 2. For the crust, cream together butter and sugars in a large bowl for 3-5 minutes, or until fluffy and lightened in color.
- 3. Mix in vanilla extract, then gradually beat in flour until just incorporated, when smooth dough comes together.
- 4. Take 1/3 dough and gently press it into greased baking dish, then place in oven and bake for 20 minutes.
- 5. Wrap remaining dough tightly in plastic wrap and refrigerate until further use.
- 6. Remove crust from oven when golden brown and let cool.
- 7. Place unwrapped caramels and heavy cream in a large, microwave-safe bowl and microwave for 1 minute.
- 8. Stir vigorously, or until smooth. If not melted after 1 minute, microwave in 30-second increments, stirring in between, until smooth.
- 9. Stir in vanilla extract, then pour caramel over cooled crust, sprinkling sea salt over the top.
- Remove chilled dough from fridge and crumble pieces evenly over carameltopped crust.
- 11. Once you've used all dough, place baking dish in oven and bake for 26-28 minutes, or until top crumble is light golden brown.
- 12. Remove baking dish from oven and let cool completely, then cut into squares and enjoy!

Ready, Set, SHOW!!

If you attended the day meeting on Friday, Oct.

21st, you heard me say you had exactly 6 weeks before you needed to start "bloom boosting" the AVs you hope to show February 24th, 2023. If you weren't there, you've lost a little time, but you still have time to succeed. I know, because I was politely informed even later last year that I "raise good enough plants to show," (thank you Glenn!). I succeeded, so you can too! Here we go . . .

Step 1 – Take a CRITICAL look at your AVs, and single out those you consider the best. When I say critical, I mean look at them the way a movie critic looks at a movie, i.e., what's good as well as what's bad. What you're looking for isn't perfection, it's POTENTIAL! Which plants have the best balance, good foliage, and decent size for the type and variety. Set those plants apart, and get to work on . . .

Step 2 – Repotting and grooming. If the plant has a neck, it's still not too late to remove a layer of the root that's equal to the length of the neck, gently scrape the neck, and repot. Use pots that are acceptable for show because you don't want to have to repeat this step. I wet the soil with the same water I use to feed (plant food, thrive, Physan 20, etc.), mix well to make sure it's moist, and large lumps are broken up, and prepare the pot. I'm sure we all know how to repot, so I won't bore you with my procedure. Before you put the repotted AV back on the shelf, GROOM IT! I use half-sheets of plain white paper and insert them between rows of the leaves until I see a well-shaped plant. Any leaf below the papers at that point is removed. I'll repeat this several times: you can expect an inch a month in growth from a properly repotted standard AV, so when you choose the size pot at this critical stage, think about the size your plant is LIKELY to be by the end of February, and act accordingly. If you act now, that means 4 inches larger than it is today.

Step 3 – This hurts but start disbudding now. In fact, *finish* disbudding now. It's earlier than you have to, but I've found it's a good move. I see an obvious difference in the foliage growth rate between twin plants I've repotted when one is COMPLETELY disbudded, and the other is left with a bud or two. I've been doing this a short enough time that I have to experiment! Again,

average growth is 1 inch a month for a standard AV, so your plant still has time to grow enough foliage to cover the soil area before the show.

Step 4 – Practice patience and observe. Look at those *potential* show plants daily, feed at least weekly, and maybe take photos so you can see the difference week to week. Remember that with fresh soil full of nutrients, your AV has all of November, December, January, and most of February, to grow!

On November 18 at the day meeting, I'll present details on when to start bloom boost feeding, light increases, and all the other little extras that will bring out the best in your AV, and maybe give you the thrill of a big win at our show. In the meantime, if you're disbudding, keep it up, keep feeding a balanced AV food, and enjoy your AVs every day. I know I do!!

SECRETS TO BLOOMING SUCCESS

There are many reasons why we love African violets, but the fact that they bloom tops the list. Very few other plants in the world can live in our homes and bloom so often with minimal care. Sometimes, however, even violets can pout and not bloom as well as we might like. There are a few "secret" methods that anyone can use to encourage better blooming.

Secret One - Bright Light

It's not much of a secret that an African violet will bloom best in good light. Light is one of the primary factors plants need to produce the energy necessary for the production of blossoms. Violets that do not receive enough light will often reach their leaves upward or grow toward the light source.

Grown at the window, violets should be within twelve to eighteen inches from the glass. A large window is always preferable to a small one, and windows that face the east morning sun are ideal since they are both bright and cool.

If there is no perfect window, then the grower may wish to supplement the light with a fluorescent light fixture. As a general rule, the lights should be positioned about ten to twelve inches above the leaves and should be turned on for ten to twelve hours a day. Violets under any of the newer energy-efficient lights may need even less hours a day. If there is too little light, the leaves will usually reach up. If there is too much light, the leaves may bleach and lose their deep green color.

Secret Two - Water

Buds dry off when violets are allowed to dry out completely, sometimes before the grower is even aware that they were forming. Violets thrive on slightly moist conditions, never being bone dry, never soggy wet, and especially never being left to stand in water for more than a few minutes.

Water from either the top (under the leaves) or from the bottom pretty thoroughly once a week and drain the excess water promptly. If the climate is a dry one, it helps to supplement with a bit of water halfway through the week to keep the soil from becoming too dry. Self-watering plants, wicking and capillary matting systems are also effective for maintaining even soil moisture.

Secret Three – Humidity

Along with having even soil moisture, the buds will survive better when there is some humidity in the air. Drafty currents of dry air are especially hard on buds. Ideally the humidity should be at 40-50%.

Secret Four - Fertilizing

Starving violets lack the energy to bloom. Many growers have the best success fertilizing once a week with a mild fertilizer designed for African violets. A balanced formula such as a 20-20-20 or one that has slightly more phosphorus, like a 15-20-15 will do well in most growing situations. Read the package! If the fertilizer gives directions for once-a-month watering (e.g., 1 teaspoon per gallon of water monthly), the formula may be adjusted by cutting the fertilizer ratio by 4 (e.g., ½ teaspoon per gallon weekly).

Secret Five – Potting Mix and Keeping the Roots Happy

Healthy violet roots can only grow in potting mixtures that don't inhibit their development. When violets have roots that fill the pot, they are more likely to bloom.

To encourage better root development, use a potting mix with lots of porosity (the fancy word for fluffy and full of air). A violet mix with plenty of perlite will allow air (and roots) to move freely through the particles of peat moss. A long-time good recipe for potting mix is one part each of Canadian sphagnum peat moss, perlite and vermiculite. If using a commercial African violet potting mix from the store, it is often best to mix it half and half with perlite to achieve a mix that won't pack into a heavy ball.

Secret Six – Choose the Right Pot

Violets in nature do not grow in dirt. Instead, they are found clinging to moss-covered rocks. Growers have found that the best way to duplicate that environment is to keep them in pots that are one-third the diameter of the plant and usually not more than two or three inches deep. Violets tend to bloom when their roots become crowded. Bigger pots seem to allow the plant to expend lots of energy making roots instead of flowers.

Secret Seven - Choose the Right Violets

Some violets are simply shy bloomers. They do not have the genetic tendency to bloom freely. Other violets not only bloom often, but the blossom stems carry more buds. Those are the

most desirable varieties! If a violet refuses to bloom after using all these tips, it probably isn't the grower who is at fault.

Secret Eight – Threaten Them!

A gently threatened violet is often a blooming violet. The survival of the species instinct causes plants to increase photosynthesis and to try to make seed (by blooming) when there is a possibility of death. Confining roots in small pots or grooming off fading leaves and flowers will all stimulate the development of more flowers. Yet another simple trick is to tap the pot of a non-blooming violet firmly on a hard surface to disturb the roots. This minor earthquake often results in flowering within a month or two.

Cucumber Sandwiches

one or two cucumbers thinly sliced

cocktail rye

one 8oz pkg of cream cheese softened a generous cup of mayo

1/2 pkg Italian Good Seasons dressing mix (dry pkg)

Fresh dill finely chopped

Blend together cream cheese, mayo and dressing mix
Spread mixture on rye slices, top with cucumber sprinkle lightly with dill

1 3oz can mushroom pieces minced or can use fresh mushrooms

1 3oz pkg cream cheese 1/4 tsp salt

1 pkg refrigerator crescent rolls

spread on crescent rolls that were divided into 4 rectangles

roll from the long end,

wrap and refrigerate

when ready, cut in 1inch pieces, bake on cookie

sheet at 375 for 12 minutes

INTRODUCTION TO TRAILERS

Trailers may be classified as micro-miniature, miniature, semiminiature or standard according to the size of the individual leaves. The overall size of a mature trailer, regardless of its size classification, can be quite large. They are floriferous and come in most of the flower types/colors of other African violets.

Trailers have two distinct growing habits. Some trailers have short internodes or short distances between successive leaves along the stem. They produce clumping or upright growth habits. Others have long internodes and are more vining, with a sprawling growth habit.

In order for a trailer to be a show plant, it must be a single plant with no less than three crowns. Trailers are judged on form, not symmetry. The goal is to achieve a pleasing form. Try to anticipate the ultimate form of the plant and work towards that goal. Blooms should be spaced evenly around the plant from all main crowns. One crown should not have leaves noticeably different in size than the other crowns. All the crowns should be uniform in size and shape. The plant should be well groomed and in great condition, clean with no faded blooms, yellow, or marred leaves.

Trailers may be grown in different ways.

- One method keeps a trailing violet in a pot that is approximately one-third the overall diameter of the plant. This allows the plant to grow out over the sides of the pot. The crowns are often pinched out to encourage secondary growth between leaves so a pretty form develops. In this method, the main stems of the trailing growth are not allowed to come in contact with the potting mix.
- A second method of growing, called the Japanese method, is to place the plant into a broad shallow pot or tray. As the stems elongate, they are positioned/pinned to the soil. This results in a mound that extends just to the edge of the pot. Plants grown using the Japanese method can grow to be quite large.

However, no matter which method you use the

best way to produce bloom is to keep the plant pot-bound and give it plenty of light.

Grooming trailers is a necessity. All violets need to occasionally have their leaves washed and spent blossoms removed and that is also true for trailers. Grooming leaves is different for trailers. Leaves should all be the same size according to their stage of growth, but trailers tend to develop immature and off-sized leaves that need to be removed. Also marred, yellowing or old limp leaves need to be removed. You may groom with a pair of tweezers, or simply cut or pinch with your fingers.

An important grooming technique is the removal of leaves to expose center stems. This results in the growth of more dormant crowns. Removal of leaves that crowd or cover other crowns allows the crowns to grow more evenly. Another technique is staking or pinning to train or balance the growth of crowns. After removal of the leaves, small wood stakes or hairpins are used to move the crown to promote proper form.

What can be done with a plant that has minimal branching or one dominate leader? First, trim back the dominate crown. Then, thin the leaves to expose the stem to more light to encourage branching. You can also pinch out the crown to encourage the development of new crowns.

Above all, enjoy your trailer!
