After the taste is perfect for you and all is mixed, Place the mixture in a serving bowl and refrigerate until served.


The preparation is very simple; the most challenging part is deciding what fruits and spices to use.

What You Need to Know Now About Impatiens Necrotic Spot Virus (INSV)

If you are active on social media, or belong to an African violet or gesneriad club, you may have heard talk of people losing their plants to a virus called INSV (Impatiens Necrotic Spot Virus). What is INSV and how can you protect your collection? Impatiens Necrotic Spot Virus (INSV) is a common plant virus that infects hundreds of different species of ornamental and food crop plants. It is found in all areas of the world and is responsible for millions of dollars in crop loses every year. Once infected, plants must be destroyed since there is no cure and the infected plants become a source of infection for other plants. Each plant viruses has particular ways of spreading from plant to plant. This process is called 'vectoring'. Insects, mites, aphids, nematodes, tools and even your hands can

vector specific plant viruses. The main vector for INSV is the Western Flowers Thrips (WFT). Frankliniella occidentalis. Several other species of thrips are potential vectors, but WFTs are the most important. WFTs acquire the virus in one of their two larval stages, when they feed on an infected plant. An uninfected adult cannot acquire the virus even when it feeds on an infected plant and thus cannot transmit it. If a female thrips lays her eggs on an infected plant, the emerging larvae will feed on the plant and become infected. Once the larvae have the virus, it multiplies in their salivatory glands. Each time the new adult thrips feeds, it transmits the virus through their saliva. It takes an adult thrips only five minutes of feeding to transmit INSV. This is why when thrips show up in your collection, you need to act fast to eliminate them. Experts disagree as to whether INSV can be transferred by infected sap on your hands or on your tools. Thrips feeding deposits virus particles directly into the vascular system of plants, which then spread throughout the plant. Typical grooming of plants with hands or tools tends to crush plant cells, which is not conducive to moving the virus into the plant. The good news is that by following the best practice of sanitizing tools between plants, you can avoid the slim possibility of planttoplant transmission via infected sap. I wipe my tools with 91% isopropyl alcohol. You can also use Physan 20 or a 10% bleach solution. What does INSV look like? Virus symptoms show up as damaged plant tissue and can be easily confused with fungal diseases, poor culture and physical damage. The damage you see is related to the immune response from the plant. Sniffles, cough and fever can mean you have a cold, the flu or Covid 19. Similarly, necrotic spots, ring spots, line patterns, stunted growth, blackened petioles, distorted leaves, mottling, and mosaic patterns are all possible virus symptoms. The question is, which virus? If you suspect you have a plant infected with a virus and don't have a reason to suspect INSV or another virus in particular, the best course of action is to take or send the plant to your state or local agricultural extension. They can test for all of the 'big four'; INSV, tomato spotted wilt (TSW), cucumber mosaic virus (CMV) and tobacco mosaic virus (TMV). Once you know what virus plagues your plant, you can buy test kits for that particular pathogen from Agdia (www.Agdia.com). Tests

are sold in kits of five or twenty-five tests. Be sure to read all of the instructions carefully. If possible, use symptomatic tissue. The test calls for a one-inch square of tissue. If you use significantly more tissue, you may get inaccurate results. False positives are extremely rare and are usually related to testing red plant tissue. False negatives are more common. Although the virus is all through the plant, it is not evenly distributed. You may have chosen a leaf with a low level of virus or perhaps the plant was recently infected. There are two main ways INSV can enter your collection. An infected thrips can enter your growing area. INSV is a common virus that infects outdoor plants like basil and tomatoes. It also infects many perennials and weeds like chickweed. WFTs are unlikely to survive in areas with cold winters. However, INSV can survive in weeds or perennials. The second way you can get INSV is to bring an infected plant into your collection. Most of the time, the new plants you buy or are gifted look strong and healthy. Violets infected with INSV can look perfectly healthy. The virus can stay dormant for many months. Sometimes a change in temperature or stress on the plant can bring on symptoms. If the virus-infected plant enters your collection and you get thrips, the thrips can spread the virus to the rest of your plants. If new plants look sick right out of the box, don't take a chance. It might be shipping stress, but it might be something much more serious. The same goes for any plant infested with pests, especially thrips. Bag any plants with pests and dispose of them. How can you protect your collection from INSV? First, keep thrips out of your growing area. Thrips can live for more than a month and an infected thrips can transmit the virus its entire life. If they show up in your collection, make eliminating them quickly your Job #1. Second, isolate all new plants and leaves. Consider new plants and leaves quarantined until they prove to be healthy. A six-month isolation is common among seasoned growers. I isolate new plants for one year, in a warm room, far from my main collection. The trash can is your friend. If your new plants are not thriving after an isolation of six to twelve months, there's a good chance they aren't healthy. Don't risk the rest of your collection for these few. What should you do if you suspect you have a plant or plants infected by a virus? Always remove questionable plants

from your growing area and isolate them in another room, preferably in a sealed container or zippy bag. If the plant was not isolated, get a diagnosis via your local agricultural extension or purchase test kits. This is especially important if you've also had a recent thrips problem. In the next issue, I'll discuss INSV in more detail, and include more photos of symptoms on violets and gesneriads. Plus, I'll share information about three other common viruses that can infect African violets and gesneriads; tomato spotted wilt (TSW), cucumber mosaic virus (CMV) and tobacco mosaic virus (TMV).

BAKED HOT CRAB DIP RECIPE

YIELD: SERVES 4-6

TOTAL TIME: 45 MINUTES

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice
- 1/2 medium onion, diced
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

- 1/2 cup freshly grated parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon fresh cracked black pepper
- 4 green onions, chopped
- Serve dip with chips, crackers, bread or vegetables.


DIRECTIONS:

DESIGN DIVISION

The theme **VIOLET INVASION** is based on an event that takes place annually in Tampa, Florida. Founded in 1904, the event celebrates the legend of Jose Gaspar (nicknamed Gasparilla), a mythical Spanish pirate captain who supposedly operated in southwest Florida. Each year, on Gasparilla Day, a band of marauding pirates aboard the *Jose Gasparilla*, a replica pirate ship, arrive in Tampa Bay, stage an invasion of the City of Tampa and demand that the Mayor surrender the key to the City.

<u>Section X – Interpretive Flower Arrangements</u>

Designs using cut African violet blossoms. Dried, treated, painted, colored and fresh-cut plant materials as well as man-made materials are permitted. Artificial plant material, live or dead creatures and national flags are not permitted. Accessories, bases and backdrops and/or draping are permitted unless restricted by class description. Only one exhibit per exhibitor per class.

<u>Class 52.</u> "TAMPA SURRENDERS THE CITY KEY TO PIRATES." The Mayor is forced to surrender the key to the pirates. A flower arrangement to be staged in a white foam board niche 14"H x 11"W x 10"D (12" may be used for depth of niche). A key must be used in the arrangement. Limit 3

<u>Class 53</u>. "BURIED TREASURE" — Rumor has it that when Jose Gaspar died, he left an untold fortune of treasure buried somewhere along Florida's coast. To this day, it has yet to be found. A flower arrangement in a white cardboard niche 28"H x 23"W x 12"D deep (15" may be used for depth of niche). Limit 3.

<u>Class 54.</u> "DRESS LIKE A PIRATE." Pirates have gained a reputation for wearing bright and distinctive clothing and accessories during the Golden Age of Piracy (1690-1730). However, Pirates were first and foremost seamen and so they wore the clothing typical of all mariners of the period. It is true, though, that some pirates, especially the captains, did dress to impress, and colorful silks or feathered hats were a way to demonstrate success to one's victims and crew alike. A flower arrangement in a white foam board niche 22"H x 18"W x 12"D (15" may be used for depth of niche). Limit 3.

<u>Class 55.</u> "GASPARILLA PARADE OF PIRATES" – Over 300,000 people came to see the Parade of Pirates at the city-wide celebration in 2020. Everyone hopes to catch some of the colorful beads and trinkets that the pirates throw into the crowds as they pass by. An underwater arrangement, completely submerged, in a clear container not to exceed 16 inches. To be staged on mirrored risers. Limit 3

Section XI – Interpretive Plant Arrangements

Designs using one or more blooming African violet plants removed from the pot, with their rootball encased in plastic or other material. Dried, treated, painted, colored and fresh-cut plant materials, as well as manmade materials are permitted. Artificial plant material, live or dead creatures and national flags are not permitted. Accessories, backdrops, and/or draping are permitted unless restricted by class description. Only one exhibit per exhibitor per class.

<u>Class 56.</u> "GASPARILLA DANCE" – Everyone who comes to the dance dresses like a Pirate and brings an appetizer to share for a Gasparilla-themed dance with music by a well known DJ-singer. A plant arrangement to be staged in a white cardboard niche 28"H x 23"W x 12" D (15" may be used for depth of niche). *Limit 3*

<u>Class 57.</u> "GASPARILLA FOR KIDS." Kids can create pirate-themed arts and crafts and participate in other activities such as board games and sports. A plant arrangement to be staged in a white foam board niche 20"H x 15"W x 11" D (14" may be used for depth of niche). *Limit* 3

<u>Class 58.</u> "FLOATS AND MARCHING BANDS" – There's also a night parade on 7th Avenue in Ybor City in which there are many decorated floats and several marching bands. Thousands of people line the street to see the floats and enjoy the rousing music. A plant arrangement in a white foam board niche 14"H x 11"W x 10"D (12" may be used for depth of niche). Limit 3.

GLAZED BERRY SQUARES

2 cups Graham cracker crumbs

½ cup sugar divided

½ cup melted butter

12 oz cream cheese

1 1/2 cups Cool Whip

1 1/2 cup Blueberries

1 ½ cups sliced Strawberries

1 ½ cups boiling water

1 pkg (6oz) Strawberry Jello

1 ½ cups ice cubes

Mix Graham cracker crumbs, ¼ cup of sugar and butter, press into bottom pf a 9x13 baking dish.

Beautiful Violet Relative:

Sinningia

EDITORIAL Dave Zaitlin Alan LaVergne



Sinningia is a genus of ~75 species, most of which are native and/or endemic to Brazil. Sinningia is a highly diverse genus in the New World Gesneriaceae, and is thus a genus of many contrasts: species can be erect and tall growing (S. sceptrum, S. mauroana) or very small, stemless rosettes (S. pusilla, S. concinna, S. minima). Most have tubers, but a few species do not (examples are S. schiffneri and S. barbata). Almost all species are perennials but one, S. nordestina, appears to be an annual. Many species live on nearly vertical rock faces, but there are several that are truly terrestrial (S. sellovii, S. allagophylla, S. curtiflora) and a few, such as S. douglasii and S. cooperi are often encountered growing as epiphytes on trees. In addition, S. glazioviana grows on riverbanks, sometimes with its tuber under water. S. tuberosa and S. helioana actually grow in deep shade inside the mouths of caves on cave walls and while most of the species are pollinated by either insects (bees) or hummingbirds, S. brasiliensis is pollinated by bats and S. tubiflora is visited

at night by hawkmoths. In addition, there is also considerable diversity in flower shape, size, and patterning. Corolla colors can be white, yellow, lavender, dark purple, pink, orange, or red.

Sinningias are popular with plant hobbyists because most are not challenging to grow, many species are long-lived, and the flowers are unusual and attractive. Several species are widely grown outside gesneriad circles and include *S. pusilla*, *S. eumorpha*, *S. cardinalis* and *S. leucotricha*. In fact, *S. leucotricha*, sometimes called "Brazilian Edelweiss", is often seen at cactus and succulent shows (under its old invalid name *Rechsteinaria leucotricha*), because these folks like its large "caudex", a structure that is actually a stem tuber in the genus *Sinningia*.

By far the most familiar member of the genus is Sinningia speciosa, which has been known in the horticultural trade under the common name Florist's gloxinia or just 'gloxinia', for 200 years. This long-lasting error dates back to 1817, when plants of S. speciosa imported in 1815 from Brazil were placed in the genus Gloxinia (a rhizomatous genus in the Gesneriaceae) by Joachim Conrad Loddige. His nursery in the village of Hackney (now a borough of London), was the first to offer the plants for sale. The common name 'gloxinia' is still with us, although today it is usually applied to the cultivars of *S. speciosa* with upright (peloric) flowers, rather than wild forms of the species that have nodding flowers. The peloric cultivars are quite distinct from the wild S. speciosa, although the two types can be crossed to produce fertile progeny. In addition to being peloric, the flowers of these cultivars are also guite large and come in colors (such as dark red) that are not found in species growing in nature. Research is currently underway to understand how the process of domestication changed the wild S. speciosa into the Florist's gloxinia in less than 200 years.

Different Types Have Different Likes



Each of the three types of African violets look and act differently. They need different care in the growing room.

Single Crown hybrids are the most common. Thousands of named varieties have been bred, each to have unique traits. They are meant to be grown in a rosette pattern with one center of growth.

Trailing hybrids (often called trailers) are bred to have many crowns (or centers of growth) and to bloom freely. Many flower colors are available. **Special growing techniques** will produce impressive size and form in your trailers.

Species first grew in nature with flowers in shades of lavender. Species are often labeled "Saintpaulia" which is the scientific name for African violets. Care varies, often based on where each species was found growing.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn Bandy

Lemony Lemon Brownies

Ingredients:

3/4 cup all-purpose flour {King Arthur All-Purpose Flour}

3/4 cup granulated sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt {Sea Salt}

1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, softened

2 large eggs

2 tablespoons lemon zest

2 tablespoons lemon juice

For the tart lemon glaze:

4 tbsps lemon juice

8 tsps lemon zest

1 cup icing sugar

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Grease an 8x8 inch baking dish with butter and set aside.

Zest and juice two lemons and set aside. In the bowl of an electric mixture fitted with the paddle attachment, beat the flour, sugar, salt, and softened butter until combined. In a separate bowl, whisk together the eggs, lemon zest, and lemon juice until combined. Pour it into the flour mixture and beat for 2 mins at medium speed until smooth and

creamv.

Pour into baking dish and bake for 23-25 mins, should turn golden around the edges. Allow to cool completely before glazing. Do not overbake, or the bars will dry.

Filter the powdered sugar and whisk with lemon zest and juice.

Spread the glaze over the brownies with a rubber spatula and let glaze set.
Cut into bars and serve.

Violet Magic * Eight Tips for Successful Repotting

Many of us know someone who is a magician with plants. Everything seems to thrive in that person's care. The difference between a magic green thumb and a hapless brown thumb is often found in the subtle techniques of repotting. That's especially true with African violets. Sick violets often recover if repotting is done well. Healthy violets often become weak if repotting is done poorly. Great transplanting skills can make violets thrive. Here are some repotting tips to help you develop your green thumb.

Tip #1 Choose the right potting mix for your climate.

A quality African violet potting mix should provide good water-holding capacity and ample air pockets to guarantee healthy roots. Growing violets in a humid climate will require a higher percentage of largeparticles such as coarse perlite and/or coarse vermiculite. In a very dry climate, it is helpful to use more water-holding components such as sphagnum peat moss, coconut coir, and coarse vermiculite. In simpler terms: 1) If you have many problems with root rot, add more perlite to your mix. 2) If your violets tend to dry out too quickly, add more peat moss to your mix.

Tip #2 Begin by moistening the potting mix.

Very dry potting mix may become air-borne and cause coughing. Dry potting mix draws moisture out of delicate violet roots, causing the roots to wither. Pre-moistening your potting mix will eliminate both problems. Add approximately 1 part warm water to four parts of potting mix and stir vigorously to force the peat to absorb the water. The end result should have a moist crumbly texture which is neither dusty nor dripping wet.

Tip #3 Never pack the mix as you repot.

Always pile the mix loosely around the cutting or plant. Packing down the soil eliminates air pockets, increases the chances of root rot, and will actually stunt the violet's growth. Air pockets in the mix will discourage rot diseases and allow roots to flourish. Adding water after repotting will compact the soil to some degree, but this is unavoidable. As needed, you may add a little more potting mix to the top of the pot to stabilize the plant.

Tip #4 Keep the pot small and shallow.

African violet roots generally do not grow deep or wide. In nature violet roots grow into the cracks in limestone or in mossy areas above the rocks, epiphytically. Violets grown indoors do not require a lot of room for the roots, so the pot should always be smaller than the plant. A confined area for roots provides a mild threat to the violet's existence, and as such it triggers blooming. At full bloom, show violets are expected to be three times wider than the pot in which

they are grown. Position the plant so that all leaves and stems are above the soil line and only the roots are buried.

Tip #5 Repot often.

Any potted plant has a lot of chemistry going on in its pot. Water, fertilizer, and potting mix components interact and change chemically over time—usually for the worse. Fresh quality potting mix provides an ideal environment for the roots, but after just a few months that environment may be much less satisfactory. The effects of these chemical changes are more dramatic in smaller pots. For best results, repot violets growing in pots smaller than 3" every 2-3 months; repot violets in 4" or larger pots every 6-12 months.

Tip #6 Avoid disturbing roots during repotting if you want to keep enjoying the flowers or buds.

Whenever the fibrous roots of violets are disturbed, the roots tend to stop functioning. This may cause open flowers to collapse, and developing buds may open much smaller in size than usual. To preserve flowers and buds, lift the entire root ball from the pot and set it into a larger pot (this may be easier if the plant has been watered a day or so ahead of transplanting.) Add fresh potting mix around the edges as needed. This gentle move to a larger pot is sometimes called a "soft" transplant.

Tip #7 If you must disturb the roots, remove buds, flowers, and older outside leaves.

Sometimes it is necessary to pot a plant down (into a smaller pot) or to refresh the soil (removing all of the old mix). Disturbed roots will not function well until new roots are generated. Because flowers, buds and outer leaves will die from lack of water, simply remove them during the repotting process. This also allows you to bury the neck that is (or will be) exposed by those lost leaves. This harsher repotting is often called a "hard" transplant.

Tip #8 Reduce shock by enclosing

repotted violets in a clear plastic bag or a dome.

In average or dry climates, leaves will often wilt suddenly after a hard transplant. This is because the process of transpiration (the natural process of releasing water to the air through the leaves) continues whether or not roots are functioning. Transpiration may be reduced by increasing the humidity around the leaves. This can be done by enclosing the repotted plant in a closed environment (once the violet has been watered). Possible enclosures include clear domes, disposable plastic food containers, or large inflated clear plastic bags. Violets may stay safely inside these enclosures (out of direct sunlight) for a month or more, often without additional watering or need for attention. During that time it is normal to see condensed moisture inside the enclosure.

VIDALIA ONION PIE

INGREDIENTS

1 cup ritz cracker crumbs

4 tablespoons butter, melted

2 cups vidalia onions, thinly sliced

2 tablespoons butter

2 eggs

3/4 cup milk

3/4 teaspoon salt

1 dash pepper

1/4 cup grated sharp cheddar cheese paprika

DIRECTIONS

Mix Ritz cracker crumbs and 4 tablespoons melted butter.

Press mixture into an 8-inch pie plate. Bake for 10 mins

GROWING TIPS

March 20th, 2023

GROOM, GROOM, GROOM

Step one in a best practice violet growing regime should be the very regular removal of dead flowers."

When most people think of taking care of their violet collection, they think about watering, repotting, fertilizing and perhaps getting their plants ready for a show. For many people, grooming is something that only comes into serious consideration when they are getting plants ready for a show. This is unfortunate because regular grooming can make the difference between a blue-ribbon winner and a plant which stays home.

Flowers

Most growers will remove dead or fading flowers on a regular basis. This is something that should be done as soon as the flowers fade. The stalks of dead flowers are ugly. While it sounds easy enough, it's something you need to stay on top of. Of course, the more serious grower, concerned primarily about their annual shows, keep their violets disbudded nearly year-round and don't have this problem. But for the rest of us who like to enjoy their violets year-round, step one in a best

practice violet growing regime should be the very regular removal of dead flowers.

Leaves

Likewise look for small immature leaves below older leaves and remove them. This is very important when the plants are young. The small leaves were the first to emerge on the young plant but they never grow larger. They have to be removed at some point if you want a strong healthy plant, so remove them as soon as other leaves are growing above them to a larger size. They are easy to identify. They are typically the ones on the bottom which are smaller than those on the next row of leaves above them. Also, on a regular basis, remove yellowing leaves. Again, these tend to be the bottommost row. They do not add to the strength of the plant, but rather detract from it. Also, they are unsightly. Remove them early on and your plants will be stronger. The plant's energy can go into supporting healthy leaves and producing new ones.

Suckers

Lastly, be on the lookout for suckers. Suckers are those secondary side-shoots that, left alone, soon produce another full crown – ruining the symmetry of the rosette of leaves. Once removed, suckers may be rooted to produce another plant. However, they sap energy from the primary crown and (until separated) both crowns will produce fewer flowers.

The trick with suckers is to distinguish them from bloom stalks. When they are quite small, that may take a little detective work. Look closely at the emerging growth (between the leaf axils.) If it has only two leaves, it may be a bloom stalk. Once it has three or more, it is definitely a sucker. Carefully remove the sucker, for if you are not careful, you might damage the mother plant. The smaller the sucker, the easier it is to remove. You may use a dull pencil, a small knife, your fingernails, or my favorite – a tool called a "sucker plucker."

Every week or two, look at your plants. Pick up each violet and look at it closely for spent flowers, small leaves, yellowed leaves, and suckers. Remove all of them.

Washing Your Plants

While we don't really grow violets for their foliage, the leaves on a well-grown violet can be quite beautiful. That doesn't happen without some effort. Think about your home. No matter how good your housekeeping is, eventually dust gets in. And dust doesn't discriminate. It lands equally on all surfaces, including the space where your violets live. Left unchecked, that dust will block the pores of the foliage and leave the plant with an overall dull appearance.

Removing that grime is relatively easy. Wash your plants. Don't use a dusting product (it's oily.) Also, washing is much easier if you do it when the plant is not in bloom – but you probably figured that out already.

Take the plant to your sink and give it a good spritzing. If your sink has a sprayer attachment, you may use that. If not, mist the plant, using a plastic sprayer bottle, being gentle not to break leaves. The water used should be room temperature or warmer, but of course not scalding hot. Give each plant a nice gentle shower making sure you thoroughly cover every leaf. Since you've already got the plant at the sink, this might be a good time to leach the soil as well. This involves pouring a cup (or more) of clear plain water into the top of the pot and through the roots to help rid it of any fertilizer salts which may have built up in the pot. This is especially important if you bottom water.

Don't let the plant stand in the water that drains off the plant, for violets don't like wet feet. You might check the center of the crown to make sure no water has settled in there. Gently dab the excess water up with a tissue to remove it.

If you are growing under lights, you may return the plants whenever you want to their usual location since the moisture on the leaves is unlikely to cause any damage. If you grow in natural light however, let the plants dry thoroughly before returning them to a window with direct sunlight.

Concluding Thoughts

Spend a little time grooming each of your plants on a regular basis and they'll repay you by blooming their heads off – and isn't that why we grow them?

GROWING TIPS

JANUARY 30th, 2023

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS HUMIDITY

QUESTION: How much humidity do African violets need? Answer: African violets can tolerate humidity as low as 10%, but that is so dry that tiny buds rarely survive to open as flowers. To encourage flower development, it is best to aim for 30-60%. Fungus diseases often thrive in higher humidity and may be almost uncontrollable over 60%. Oddly, when a violet crown has no roots, we recommend enclosing it in a Ziploc bag or in a dome with 100% humidity for a month or two. That high level of humidity restricts evaporation from the leaves and allows excellent conditions for roots to form. That treatment is not recommended in warm tropical climates where disease spores may be more prevalent.

QUESTION: What is the range of humidity the plant is use to and what temperature range? I am putting some in a vivarium with the humidity around 80-90% plus the amount of water needed. I mist once or twice a day. Answer: If the humidity range is actually in the 80-90% range, you may not need to add much water at all. African violets in nature commonly grow in a range of 30-60% humidity with temperatures ranging from the low 60's to the 80's

Fahrenheit. At high humidity, fungus diseases are more likely to thrive, especially in an enclosed environment. I would suggest trying just one African violet in the vivarium to see how it does for a few months before you try more. Updated 07-2020

This month's recipe submitted by Lynn Bandy

CHOCOLATE LASAGNA

Ingredients

36 Oreo cookies (regular, not double stuffed)

6 tablespoons butter, melted 8 oz cream cheese, softened

1/4 cup granulated sugar

3½ cups cold milk, plus 2 tablespoons, divided

12 oz tub Cool Whip, divided

2 – 3.9 oz packages chocolate instant pudding mix

½ cup mini chocolate chips

Instructions

In a large food processor, crush Oreo cookies into fine crumbs. Make sure there are no large chunks left.

In a medium bowl, mix melted butter into cookie crumbs using a fork. When the butter is thoroughly mixed in, transfer it to a 9 x 13 inch baking dish. Using a spatula, press the crumbs down into the bottom of the baking dish as evenly as possible. Put baking dish in refrigerator while you work on the next step.

In a medium bowl, mix the cream cheese with an electric beater until fluffy. Add the 2 tablespoons of cold milk and sugar and mix well. With large spoon or spatula, mix in 1½ cups of the Cool Whip until combined. Spread cream cheese mixture over cookie crust. Return baking dish to refrigerator and let chill for 10 minutes.

In a large bowl, mix together chocolate instant pudding and 3½ cups cold milk with electric beater or whisk until the pudding starts to thicken. Spread the pudding over the cream cheese layer.

Return baking dish to refrigerator and let chill for 10 more minutes.

Have a seat on your couch and dream of how delicious this heavenly dessert is going to be. Start to drool.

Spread remaining Cool Whip over the pudding layer and sprinkle mini chocolate chips over the top. (Feel free to use more than ½ cup of the chocolate chips if you want more!)


Chill in fridge for 4 hours or freezer for 1 hour.

GROWING TIPS

Getting the Planting Depth Just Right

Some growers struggle to know how deep to plant young violets when repotting. It's important, because when a violet plug is planted too deep, it may not survive



See where the arrow is pointing, right between the leaf axils and the roots? That is the critical point for potting. The roots should be entirely below and the leaf axils entirely above the level of the soil.

Here is the same violet plug planted at exactly the correct soil depth.



No soil is piled into the center of the plant where it could overwhelm the growth point or trigger suckers to develop.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn Bandy

GLAZED LEMON POUND CAKE

INGREDIENTS

CAKE

- 1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened, plus more for pan
- 3 cups all-purpose flour (spooned and leveled), plus more for pan
- ¾ cup low-fat buttermilk
- Zest of 2 lemons, finely grated
- ⅓ cup fresh lemon juice (about 2 lemons)
- 1 ½ teaspoons salt
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 cups sugar

5 large eggs

GLAZE

- 2 cups confectioners' sugar
- 3 to 4 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees, with rack in lowest position. Butter and flour two 4 1/2-by-8-inch (6-cup) loaf pans.
- In a small bowl (or liquid measuring cup), combine buttermilk with lemon zest and juice. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, salt, baking powder, and baking soda.
- 3. With an electric mixer, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition.
- 4. With mixer on low, add flour mixture in three parts alternately with the buttermilk mixture in two, beginning and ending with flour; beat just until smooth (do not overmix).
- Divide batter evenly between pans; smooth tops. Bake until a toothpick inserted in centers comes out clean, 50 to 60 minutes (tent with foil if browning too quickly). Cool 15 minutes in pan. Turn out cakes onto a rack; cool completely before glazing.
- 6. Set rack with cakes over a baking sheet lined with waxed paper. Pour glaze over cakes, letting it run down the sides; let dry, about 30 minutes.

The batter can also be baked in a 12-cup buttered and floured nonstick Bundt pan; the cooking and cooling times are the same.

GROWING TIPS

I FORGOT TO WATER MY VIOLETS AND NOW THEY ARE AS DRY AS THE DESERT!

NOW WHAT?

We've all made the mistake of forgetting to water one of our violets. You might not notice until its soil is a dry block and your beautiful plant is all droopy. It's very tempting to give that thirsty violet one large drink. Unfortunately, that large drink could do more harm than good. Just like you wouldn't take someone who is dehydrated and give them a quick dunk in a swimming pool, you don't want to treat you violet that way either!

Giving your plant a little bit of water and then waiting for it to absorb into the soil and then giving it a little more and waiting again, gives the roots and soil a chance to rehydrate slowly and thoroughly. If you water the entire root ball with a large amount of water all at once, it can cause problems. It could cause white spiderweb like patters on the leaves from absorbing too much water too guickly or damage already fragile roots. The soil might not fully re-hydrate from one fast watering and could be left with dry pockets of soil or only a wet surface. Treat your violet like that dehydrated person in the desert, let it sip water a little at a time and slowly recover. This will return the soil to its evenly moist state and allow your plant to recuperate at a leisurely pace it can handle.

MIXING IT UP

Written for the 2019 November-December issue of the *African Violet Magazine*

Whether your first violets are starter plants or mature plants, at some point, you will need to repot them. Repotting once or twice a year enhances growth, and fresh growth encourages blooming. What will you use for a potting mix? My first violets were gifts from my grandmother when I was 10 years old. As a young girl, I had no idea what a "soilless mix" was, and even if I knew, I still would have selected the closest thing at hand... the endless supply of soil in my backyard. That wasn't the best decision and those violet are long gone, but now I know a good deal more about what makes a good potting mix for African violets.

What does a potting mix do? Physically a potting mix provides a substrate to anchor the roots for the plant to grow. It makes water and oxygen available to the roots. Chemically, the mix holds the nutrients the plant needs. In the wild, African violets grow in crevices and loose substrate on rocky cliffs or porous rocks. You want a potting mix that approximates these conditions: evenly moist but well-draining, slightly

acidic, and with a loose crumbly texture.

Potting mixes suitable for African violets contain no actual soil' that is why they are called soilless mixes. Here are some tips to help you make a good decision for your plants' mix.

POTTING MIX INGREDIENTS

The most common ingredients in potting mixes are sphagnum peat moss, perlite, vermiculite and dolomite lime. Sphagnum peat moss comes from a bog plant that grows in low-pH, poorly draining environments. Since other plants cannot grow under these conditions, peat moss is free of weeds and weed seeds. It also has good water-holding capacity, which makes it ideal for houseplants and container gardens.

Perlite is made by heating a type of volcanic rock to a very high temperature. The water trapped in the rock expands, creating a light, porous material. There are various type of perlite, sorted by the average size of the particles, from very fine to quite chunky. Look for coarse or horticultural grade perlite. If it is sold by a numerical grade, look for grades 3 or 4.

Vermiculite is made by heating up a type of laminated rock. It expands into a very light material that has excellent water-holding

capacity and can improve soil aeration. In general, perlite drains better than vermiculite.

Dolomite lime is a powder-fine ground rock that is used to adjust the pH and add calcium and magnesium to the potting mix. Most peat moss has a pH of around 3.5 to 4, which is well outside the ideal pH for African violets and most other plants. Unless you are buying pure peat moss, most commercial potting mixes have some added dolomite lime to adjust the pH. Be sure to look for the powdered dolomite. The granular type is for lawns and gardens.

Coir now is included in many commercial potting mixes. Coir is ground-up coconut husks. Compared to peat moss, coir has higher water retention, a finer texture and a neutral pH. Many growers have had success using this material, but I have found that I need to use a lot more perlite to make a mix suitable for wick-watering.



There is no single, perfect potting mix. The best potting mix for your plants depends on

your growing conditions, including the general temperature and humidity, and how your water and fertilize your plants. If you wick water or mat water, you will want to use a potting mix that contains 40% to 60% perlite. If you buy a ready-made mix, look for words like "wicking mix" to let you know that this is a well-draining material.

The African violets you buy in the supermarket or big box store might be in a much heavier mix that holds a good bit of water. This makes sense because once these plants leave the greenhouse, their care won't be as consistent. When people get them home, it is easy to overwater them and kill them with kindness. Your violets still can grow in these mixes as long as you are careful to water them only when the top inch or so of the soil feels dry to the touch.

If you are a new grower with a small number of plants, consider getting your potting mix from one of our AVSA commercial growers or an eBay supplier recommended by another grower. They've already done the work for you to blend an optimal mix, especially for African violets. As a new grower, you have many things to learn, and having a tried and true potting mix can eliminate one variable.

Many popular horticultural supply companies offer bags of potting mix

especially for African violets. They usually come in 8-quart sizes, so it is ideal for the hobbyist with a small collection. Some of these mixes contain fertilizer, so if you choose to use them, be sure to cut back on your own fertilizer for the first few months after you repot. These blends are sold to be used straight out of the bag, but they generally are heavier mixes with very little perlite. I have had success mixing these blends evenly (50/50) with coarse perlite or a 40% mix to 60% coarse perlite. The percentage of perlite can vary because of factors like coarseness or individual growing conditions. Even variations in the base mix can affect the water-holding capacity of the final product. Start with a 50/50 blend and adjust as needed.

If you have a lot of plants or you just like to "do it yourself," you can easily blend your own African violet potting mix. A good place to start is with either Pro-Mix BX or Pro-Mix HP, or a similar commercial mix. These brands are readily available in garden centers or horticultural supply stores. One drawback is that the base-mix comes in large bags or compressed bales. Depending on the number of plants you have, that might mean you have a very large supply of potting mix.

If it seems like that much potting mix will be

more than you can foresee using, consider teaming up with your local club or growing friends to share the cost of materials. Mixing up a good potting mix could be a fun club activity, and a good opportunity to learn about potting mix and repotting violets. There are a lot of good recipes, probably as many as there are growers. Talk to successful growers; most of them will be happy to share their recipes.



OTHER ADDITIONS

I don't add vermiculite to my potting mix because I wick water, and I think the vermiculite makes the mixture hold too much water. The Pro-Mix I use contains mycorrhizae, which are beneficial fungi that have a symbiotic relationship with the roots and enhance their ability to absorb water and nutrients. Since the mycorrhizae in the base mix don't have a long shelf-life, I add some additional mycorrhizae before I pot up my plants. I adjust my pH with dolomite lime to a range of 6.5 to 6.8. This is a good pH range, however many successful growers

do not test or adjust their pH since most base mixes already have some dolomite lime added.

You might have read a lot about fertilizers and additives some growers include in their potting mixes. Before you start adding a laundry list of "special" additives, be sure first that you can tell whether any positive or negative changes to your plants are related to the potting mix and not some other change. No matter how promising you think the improvements or additives are going to be, try the new mix on just a few plants at first. Even the most experienced growers have made the mistake of moving an entire collection to something new, only to discover weeks or months later that perhaps they should have given it a test-drive first.

That wasn't so hard, was it? Is it time for your plants to be repotted? Buy some of your favorite mix or mix up a batch and get to it. No matter what potting mix you choose, you will find that the best "additive" of all is your time and consistent care.

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn Bandy

PUMPKIN LATTE COFFEE CAKE

INGREDIENTS

5 eggs

2 teaspoon instant espresso coffee powder or instant coffee granules

1 8 ounce package cream cheese, softened

²⁄₃ cup sugar

2 tablespoon all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon vanilla

3 cup all-purpose flour

2 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice

½ teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon salt

½ cup butter, softened

1 ½ cup sugar

²/₃ cup canned pumpkin

1 cup buttermilk or sour milk

Streusel

½ cup packed brown sugar

1/3 cup rolled oats

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon pumpkin pie spice

1/4 cup butter, col

In a medium bowl combine brown sugar, rolled oats, flour, and pumpkin pie spice. Using a pastry blender, cut in butter until crumbly.

Coffee Drizzle

1 1/4 cup powdered sugar

1 teaspoon light-colored corn syrup

1 tablespoon cooled Espresso or strong-

brewed coffee

In a small bowl stir together powdered sugar and corn syrup. Stir in enough cooled espresso or strong-brewed coffee (1 to 2 tablespoons) to make drizzling consistency.

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease a 13x9x2-inch baking pan; set aside. In a small bowl stir together two of the eggs and the espresso powder; set aside. In a medium bowl beat cream cheese with an electric mixer on medium speed until fluffy. Beat in the 2/3 cup sugar, the 2 tablespoons flour, and the vanilla until smooth. Beat in egg-espresso mixture; set aside.

In a medium bowl stir together the 3 cups flour, the baking powder, pumpkin pie spice, baking soda, and salt. Set aside.

In a large bowl beat butter with an electric mixer on medium speed for 30 seconds; gradually add the 1-1/2 cups sugar, beating until fluffy. Add the remaining three eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in pumpkin. Alternately add flour mixture and buttermilk to pumpkin mixture, beating after each addition until combined.

Spread half of the batter in the prepared baking pan. Spoon half of the cream cheese mixture by small spoonfuls on top of the batter. Add the remaining batter in spoonfuls; carefully spread over the cream cheese mixture. Top with spoonfuls of the remaining cream cheese mixture. With a knife, swirl batter to marble. Sprinkle with Coffee Streusel.

Bake in preheated oven for 45 to 50 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool in pan on a wire rack for 45 minutes.

Spoon Coffee Drizzle over coffee cake in a lacy pattern. Cool completely on wire rack.

GROWING TIPS

WHAT IS CAL MAG? DO MY VIOLETS NEED IT?

Cal-Mag is a supplement sold by many different horticultural suppliers consisting of balanced bio-available calcium and magnesium. It may also contain other elements such as iron and other trace minerals. Calcium deficiency presents as yellowed and/or deformed new growth. Magnesium deficiency shows itself as yellowing of older growth. Calcium is important for cellular nutrient transport and enzyme activity. Magnesium is essential for creating chlorophyll.

Cal-Mag is very important for African violet growers using rain, distilled, RO, or naturally soft water to water their violets. Calcium and magnesium can be very low in soft water and nonexistent it the other types of water mentioned. It is important to add these two elements to water from these sources. Many fertilizer blends do not contain enough of these elements in their blends and depend on the water source and soil to provide these minerals.

Hard water naturally contains calcium and magnesium and most of the United States water supply is somewhat to very hard. You can test your water supply with available water hardness test strips to determine the hardness (mineral content) of your tap water, but if you use any of the other water sources mentioned, be sure to add a bottle of Cal-Mag to your violet supplies!

RECIPE BOX



This month's recipe submitted by Lynn Bandy
This makes a fun gift to share and the bread is asssome!

AMISH FRIENDSHIP BREAD STARTER

3 cups flour 3 cups sugar 3 cups milk

- To prepare starter: Place 1 cup flour, 1 cup sugar, and 1 cup milk in a 1gallon resealable plastic bag. Seal bag and knead mixture until well combined. Let stand at room temperature overnight.
- For the next 4 days, continue kneading mixture once a day; keep at room temperature. On the sixth day add 1 cup flour, 1 cup sugar, and 1 cup milk to bag. Seal and knead to combine; let stand at room temperature overnight.
- 3. For the next 3 days, knead mixture twice a day. On the 10th day, transfer mixture to a large bowl. Add 1 cup flour, 1 cup sugar, and 1 cup milk; mix until well combined.

 Measure 1 cup of the mixture into each of 3 resealable plastic bags.

 Seal plastic bags and give each bag

of starter mixture to a friend to make their own friendship bread.

For the Bread

- 1 cup of starter
- ½ cup milk
- 1 cup vegetable oil or ½ cup vegetable oil and ½ cup applesauce
- 3 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 2 cups of flour
- 1 ¾ cup of sugar
- 1 ½ tablespoons baking powder
- 4 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 1 package (3.4 ounces) instant vanilla pudding
- 1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans (optional)

 Preheat oven to 330 degrees. Add oil to bowl with starter mixture along with eggs, 1/2 cup milk, and vanilla extract. Stir until well combined; set

aside.

In another large bowl, mix together 2 cups flour, 1 cup of sugar, baking powder, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, salt, baking soda, pudding, and nuts, if desired. Add dry ingredients to starter mixture and stir until well combined. Divide batter evenly between two 8-by-4-by-2 1/2-inch loaf pans.

 In a small bowl, mix together the remaining 3/4 cup sugar and 2 teaspoons cinnamon; sprinkle evenly over batter. Transfer to oven and bake for 1 hour. Let cool 15 minutes before removing from the pan.



WHAT'S WRONG WITH MY LEAVES?



Many growers might look at the picture above and think there is some sort of problem with the leaves of the plant. Is it not getting enough fertilizer? Is it some sort of insect or disease damage? No, it's crown variegation and is supposed to look that way. You can breathe easy!

Here is the description of variegation from the AVSA Handbook for Growers, Exhibitors, and Judges. "Variegated leaves have shades of green and can be marked with white, cream, light yellow, or rosy shades from light pink to a deep wine red". Crown variegation is when the variegation is more pronounced in the new leaves (crown). As the leaves age and grow larger, they begin to develop more green pigmentation.

This is why it is important to have the official name and description for a new plant in your collection. It will tell you the correct color, shape, and pattern of the blooms. It will also tell you the leaf color, shape, and if variegation is present. No need to keep giving that crown variegated plant extra fertilizer so it will "green up". Just enjoy your crown variegated African violet and happy growing!
