

Cajun's Fickle Flirt

The final type in the series on learning foliage types is variegated. According to the AVSA Handbook, Variegated leaves have shades of green and can be marked with white, cream, light yellow, or rosy shades from light pink to a deep wine red."

"Cajun's Fickle Flirt" (Hybridized by Belinda Thibodeaux, 2010) is a gorgeous example of variegated foliage. It also has beautiful light pink, single wavy star blooms with raspberry eyes and veins.

There are several distinct types of variegation, such as mosaic, Tommie Lou, crown, and chimera. I have included graphics of these types of variegation above. Mosaic variegation has variegation in the center of the leaf with green around the edge, while Tommie Lou variegation is

the opposite with variegation around the edge of the leaf and green in the center. Crown variegation is, as the name implies, a variegated crown that becomes progressively more green as the leaves age and grow outward. Finally, chimera variegation has foliage with two contrasting shades or colors, one along the central vein and the other on both outside edges.

You can look up other varieties with variegation on the AVSA website and using the First Class African violet computer program. Keep an eye out for varieties with different types of variegation to add to your collection the next time you are looking for a new addition.

Recipe Box



Sandi's Mom's Black Beans

1 can Bush's SEASONED RECIPE Black Beans

½ cup minced yellow onion

3-4 large pegs of garlic, minced

Olive oil

Pepper, freshly ground preferred

Katsup – 1 LARGE squirt

½ cup low sodium chicken broth (optional)

1/8 tsp sugar

1/2 cup minced yellow onions for serving over beans

Saute minced onion & garlic in olive oil until it smells yummy. Add black beans and stir to mix with onion & garlic. I use a pepper grinder and add pepper to the point where I think it's almost too much, I've never measured. Using a squeeze bottle of katsup, squeeze in a generous amount — at least a tablespoon, then stir in 1/8 teaspoon sugar. Cover, turn heat to simmer, and cook for at least 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add chicken broth if you prefer more liquid. Serve over yellow (preferred) or white rice, with a sprinkling of raw yellow onion.
