
A message from our President

Program Notes

On July 18, 2025 Sandi Soto gave a presentation on the discovery of the original African violets in the wild, the importance of preserving species in the wild and in cultivation, and tracing their journey from the wild into cultivation. The first African violets were discovered in the late 19th century by Baron Walter von Saint Paul-Illaire in the Udzungwa Mountains of Tanzania. He found the plant in 1892, near modern-day Tanzania, and sent specimens back to his father in Germany. The father then shared them with a botanist at the Royal Botanic Garden in Hanover, Germany.

The plant was later named Saintpaulia ionantha, ionantha being the Latin term for "violet-like." In 1893 the first African violets were commercially grown from seed, and in 1926 African violet seeds were imported into the US. Slides were shown of wild African violets growing from cliff faces, rocks, and trailing plants that looked like S. clone grotei Silvert spreading out over the ground.

A traditional Middle Eastern salad, tabbouleh is one of my favorite summer dishes. Light, refreshing and easy to make, I'll often top it with garbanzo beans or falafel.

Tabbouleh

From *The Complete Vegetarian Cookbook*

Ingredients:

Salt and pepper

3 tomatoes, cored and cut into 1/2-inch pieces

1/2 cup medium-grind bulgur, rinsed

1/4 cup lemon juice

6 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1 1/2 cups minced parsley

1/2 cup minced fresh mint

2 scallions, sliced thin

Toss tomatoes with 1/4 teaspoon salt in finemesh strainer set over bowl and let drain, tossing occasionally, for 30 minutes: reserve 2 tablespoons drained tomato juice. Toss bulgur with 2 tablespoons lemon juice and reserved tomato juice in bowl and let sit until grains begin to soften, 30 to 40 minutes.

In large bowl, whisk remaining 2 tablespoons lemon juice, oil, cayenne, and 1/4 teaspoon salt together. Add drained tomatoes, soaked bulgur, parsley, mint, and scallions and toss gently to combine. Cover and let sit at room temperature until flavors have blended and bulgur is tender, about 1 hour.

Before serving, toss to recombine and season with salt and pepper to taste.

INTRODUCTION TO YOUR PROJECT PLANT

The project plant for 2026 is a semi-miniature with crown variegation. You'll get the newly potted baby fitted with a wick and a reservoir. The soil is light enough for Florida, with lots of perlite to keep it that way, so it may not need repotting for several months. Keep an eye on The Petal, as there will be little "blurbs" with information on care in every issue, right through February. For the next month, recommendations are:

- Don't let the wick dry out, and if it does, set the potted plant in a bowl with a small amount of the water you usually use for your African violets, and let it soak up all it wants for about 20 minutes. That will re-wet the wick without packing down the potting mix as top watering CAN do.
- Because it's crown variegated, and variegation goes away when the plant gets too warm, keep it on a lower shelf if possible. As we all learned way back in school, warm air rises, and cold air falls.
- Look at it daily. Most days, you won't do anything but look. If you do that, and there's an issue (very low water, plenty of water but the plant looks droopy, etc.) you'll see it before it becomes a problem.


