

THE PARABLE OF THE TALENTS

In this parable (Matt.2:14-15,19-21), the man who gave out the talents to the servants represents God. The servants represent all human beings. The talents are the natural and supernatural gifts of God to us. God gives us talents differently according to our abilities. There are some people who have more gifts than others. That is the way God wants it. In today's gospel for instance someone was given five talents, the other person two and the third person one. What matters is not the number of gifts or the type of gifts you have but how you use the gifts. The person who received five talents in today's gospel parable made effort and produced extra five. Likewise, the person who received two produced extra two but the person who received one did not use it at all. This last person made no effort to put his gift into use. That was why the master blamed him and punished him.

This parable teaches us that whatever gifts we have, little or big should be used for the service of God and humanity. Someone who has a talent and exercises it will grow and develop it more. Just like the organists/singers: the more they play/sing the more they learn and grow in it. This is applicable to other gifts we have. In using them we grow in them. But if you fail to exercise it, you will inevitably lose it. That is what Jesus meant when he said that 'the one who has more will be given and he will grow rich; but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away'.

As human beings we have the tendency to be envious or jealous of others' gifts. Envy is a sin against the justice and love of God who in justice and love created us the way we are and gave us all that we have. Appreciate your own gift, use it and you will grow in it. Don't be envious or jealous of other's gifts. The third servant in the parable was envious of the other two because they had more talents than he had. Because he was envious, he became lazy too. The one talent he had he couldn't put it into use.

In this parable Jesus said that "After a long time the master of those servants came back and settled account with them". The language "after a long time" has to do with our lifetime on earth. We have a long time from birth to death to use our talents to serve God. At the end of our life, we must give account before God. Note that the Lord may come suddenly like a thief in the night as St.

Paul warns us in the second reading (1Thess.5:1-6). Let us thus constantly put our talents into use just like the virtuous woman in the first reading (Prov.31:10-31) so that when the Lord comes, he will find us worthy and will say to us "Well done, good and faithful servants, come and join in your master's happiness".
