OPENING PRAYER: Rev. Heather opened the meeting in prayer at 12:45 p.m.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF DIOCESAN CANON J-1 ‘Vestries’, Section 2 re: voting membership – It states that you must be full age of 16 years; baptised; habitually attend divine service in the parish; and have contributed to the working expenses of the parish in the previous year.

ELECTION OF VESTRY CLERK: Helen Flavell nominated Pam Thornton to be Vestry Clerk. Pam accepted the nomination.

ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA: Moved by Louella Witney and seconded by Ruth Ryan that the agenda be adopted – Carried

Rev. Heather pointed out that when she came to St. James, we had a long ‘to do’ list of what we wanted to see accomplished in the way of accessibility issues. All has been accomplished, except for the LIFT. Main floor of the church is accessible.

FINANCIAL REPORTS for St. James, Holy Manger and 2020 Budget:

Income January through December 2019 = \$108,706.10
 Memorials = \$14,706.00 – helped to meet budget
 Apportionment will change half - way through the year
 Kim Hawn questioned his salary. The amount gives the impression that Kim is being overpaid. It was explained that the Diocese changed the way of paying salaries. Everyone felt that Kim’s amount should be left as he was deserving of it.

Elaine Smith, who is head of the Altar Guild, questioned the amount under Altar Supplies of \$1,473.50. An answer was not available at the time. ***The Treasurer, Meredith Hendy, provided an explanation following the Vestry Meeting. The heading of Altar Supplies comes out of the General

Operating Fund and covers expenses such as orders from Parasource, Palm Crosses, and Wine from the LCBO. Our Orders of Service come from the U.S.A. Once our supply runs out in the Spring, we will be printing our own. Monies received in lieu of flowers for Sunday Services are used to buy supplies for the Altar Guild.

Rev. Heather gave an overview of the Balance Sheet and Designated Funds. She also spoke to Holy Manger's Financial Report, because they are covered under our charitable registration number.

Motion to approve Financial Reports – Moved by Pat Flavell, seconded by Derek Shakespeare.

Carried.

SCREENING IN FAITH:

Bala added Treasurer to the Parish Position List.

Motion to approve the addition of Treasurer as amended– Moved by Bill Flavell, seconded by Ruth Ryan. Carried.

MEMORIALS:

Service Buffet, outside of the Chapel, in memory of Meryl Devaladares, mother of Carol Fraser.

Patio area with chairs to be left of the entrance to the LIFT in memory of Peter Stuart.

2 tables on either side of the glass cabinet at the back of the church will be in memory of Clarence "Smitty" Smith, husband of Elaine Smith and for Charles "Chuck" Thornton, husband of Pam Thornton.

Discussion re: converting the pews at the back of the church into a space that can be used for meetings and conversation. Can be done with existing pews. Rev. Heather asked for ideas as to how the space might be used. There will be new doors coming into the church made of glass. Doors will be in memory of Margaret Cozzi and her son Michael.

A bequest has been received from Patricia Morris. St. James is to receive 1/10 = \$400,000.00. We have received a cheque for \$136,000.00 and will receive at least the same amount in 2020.

After discussion pertaining to the Patricia Morris bequest the following motion was made:

Motion: "Money received from the Patricia Morris Estate will provide sufficient funds to finish the LIFT project." Moved by Ruth Ryan and seconded by Bill Flavell. Carried.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS:

People's Warden – Pam Thornton was nominated by Ruth Ryan

No further nominations were made. Nominations closed. Pam will serve as People's Warden by acclamation.

Deputy People's Warden – Nola Ibbitson was nominated by Ruth Ryan

No further nominations were made. Nominations closed. Nola will serve as Deputy People's Warden by acclamation.

NEW BUSINESS:

Synod has been called by Archbishop Anne Germond in Sault Ste. Marie for Saturday, May 8, 2020 to discuss Gender Neutral Marriage. A church service will be held the prior evening, Friday, May 7 in the Cathedral. Synod reps from last year will represent St. James.

Rev. Heather asked how the parish would like her to present the subject to the congregation. It was decided that her Homily on Sunday, February 22, 2020 would take on this topic.

Further Comments:

- Cliff Flavell brought attention to the fact that the ventilation system in the church should probably be cleaned. There are particles of dirt coming out of the system.
 - Cliff also mentioned that there are Anniversary Crosses still available.
 - Steps from the main body of the church to the altar are a concern. The issue of a ramp has been looked at, but a suitable solution has not been reached.
 - Louella Witney suggested that on Super Bowl Sunday next year parishioners could be asked to donate a can of soup with a toonie taped on top!
 - Pat Flavell thanked Ann and Ken Calvert for providing coffee/treats for the Vestry Meeting. All goodies were brought up from the kitchen to the Narthex.
 - The Choir and Kim Hawn were thanked for their faithful service and lovely music. They are small but mighty!
 - Judy Marriott and Marilyn Petsura were thanked for organizing the In-house bake table in early December.
 - It was mentioned that Marty Saar made over \$1200 with the items from his store he had on sale during the summer and fall. These items were sold during Hope Chest hours.
 - Diana Wilde asked if it might be possible to produce an up-to-date Photo Directory.
- Bill Frankish thanked Rev. Heather for the way in which she conducted the Vestry Meeting today.



Dear Friends:

Having missed the joy of worshipping together in person for much of the past year, I want to extend my love and prayers for all our church members, praying for God’s guidance, grace, strength, and encouragement. I pray that we may weather this time of isolation and restrictions knowing that God is with us, as difficult as it is, and has been.

New challenges and restrictions have confronted us all. This has also been a time of slowing down and having the opportunity to reflect on the most important things of life: relationships, with one another and with our Lord and Saviour.

As our world experiences major change and upheaval, the Lord is revealing much that needs to change, bringing evil and corruption into the light for all to see. One could compare our present time to the pains of childbirth, in which God brings new life, new joys, new meaning from previous worries, fear or pain. Jesus, the Light of the world paid for our freedom on the cross.

For the first 3 ½ months of 2020, I continued my volunteer work at Beaver Creek Institution, which included teaching inmates to knit and sew, also providing leadership at weekly Toastmasters meetings. Volunteerism at the prison was suspended in March with the announcement of the pandemic. Volunteers were unable to enter the prison, and this has continued to the present time. The inmates were restricted to their ranges and chaplains were also restricted from coming into work, due to concerns about Covid.

During this time of restriction, I was invited to apply for a chaplaincy position at the prison. In October 2020, when chaplains were allowed to return to the prison, I began my work in part-time in chaplaincy, providing Sunday services, group programs and one-on-one counselling.

My previous chaplaincy work in Corrections took place in a Provincial Institution in Winnipeg, with young offenders. Beaver Creek is a Federal Prison for men, who in most cases are serving a life sentence. This is quite different from working with youth who have gone astray. The institution has been under strict Covid protocols, which recently have resulted in greater restrictions due to the resurgence of the virus. All group activities have been suspended as I write, and there is little “movement” for the prisoners. The Chapel is considered a “sacred place” for the inmates to come for spiritual renewal, counselling, and safe connections, so this is an even more challenging time for chaplains and inmates.

In another capacity, along with Rev. Heather, I serve on the Muskoka Chaplaincy Board. The pandemic also impacted chaplaincy services at the Muskoka Algonquin Healthcare sites: South Muskoka Memorial Hospital and the Huntsville Memorial District Hospital, as most volunteers were not going into the hospitals for several months. We have had virtual meetings with our staff Chaplain Karen Hamra, who has conscientiously provided spiritual care at the two sites, along with volunteers when allowed in. Let us keep in prayer all those who serve in various ways during these times, and for those who are in need, asking for the Lord’s guidance, grace, peace, and comfort to strengthen and encourage them, and ourselves, as we navigate the road ahead. May we find our peace, rest, hope and security as we trust in His abundant love and saving grace.

We used treasure hunts to review earlier lessons and slideshows and videos to teach new ones. Music continued to be a highlight of this ministry. Strong support was provided by Rev. Heather and her teaching regarding "how to pray" anticipated each service. Derek and Betty Shakespeare are greatly loved by the congregants. The ministry was shut down given Covid restrictions but has recently been revived with the sharing of videos that were made to tell Bible stories. We send the videos to Community Living and they distribute them to their client homes. Cory Brunatti has been a gift to this ministry. I was invited to assist with Muskoka Deanery services and enjoyed working with various Priests, Lay Readers and videographer Cory. In so doing, I also was able to fill in for my friend Rev. Jim Schell on a couple of occasions at St James, got to visit Barkway and renew many wonderful friendships. Covid does have some blessings.

I have kept in touch with some parishioners by phone and by letter. The responses and relationships established have been much valued by myself.

I have greatly missed the monthly services at the Manor.. I have sent them posters of Bible verses which I hope they enjoyed but one of the post Covid blessings I most anticipate will be seeing their faces and hearing their voices once again.

May your 2021 be a year in which you are each safe and may it be filled with hope and love.

Deacon's Report To Vestry

The past year has been a difficult year on many levels, for so many people. Covid 19 has caused hardships for everyone and has made church services challenging. Clergy and laity have met the challenge through diminished in-church services and via the internet. Our own Rev. Heather was busy throughout in making certain that we all had access to services and our little monthly bags with so much in them. My church involvement has been limited by lock-downs and distance, however, Pat and I have contributed where we could during in-church services and in the ongoing work within the parish.

My hospice duties have been greatly curtailed by the virus however I have been able to keep in touch with all my hospice friends by telephone, internet, and some in-home visits.

I pray that the end of this pandemic is near and that 2021 will see us back in church and able to resume our daily routines. Thanks be to God.

Wardens' Report for Vestry – Sunday, February 7, 2021

Although we are back to online-only services while in the 'Red' designation, life at St. James continues being ever mindful of one another's needs. We owe a huge amount of thanks to Rev. Heather for her leadership and care of everyone. The Gift Bags, which have now become a much-anticipated present, have readings for several weeks and are filled with goodies and donations from the three churches. Rev. Heather's helpers in preparing the bags are the three Manuel men: Joe, Linc, and Luke. Thank you to them and to the angels on the delivery team.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions we were not able to be together for either Easter or Christmas services. However, there were many things we were able to do within the boundaries of the pandemic restrictions. We used the church bells at Gravenhurst, Barkway and Bala to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of VE Day, Vigil Prayers for the victims of the shooting in New Brunswick, Easter, Remembrance Day, Christmas and New Year!

We were able to have socially-distanced services on Sundays from September to mid-December, and have the churches open for quiet time, prayer and small meetings. Since the church at Barkway is small to begin with, the social-distance protocols reduced the seating capacity to exactly the size of the congregation: every service was at 'full capacity'! We were not able to have our usual Sunday Kids Program at Gravenhurst, or the summer Church Camp at Barkway, but we are hopeful that we will be able to resume these ministries again in 2021.



On Christmas Eve, St. James held a drive-by time hosted by Rev. Heather. A small crèche was at the front steps, candles were there to light in memory of a loved one. It was a lovely evening and out of the darkness appeared Lois Cooper and Mark Clairmont, with candles of their own. Mark also had his Trumpet with him and played Christmas Carols, which could be heard all throughout the neighbourhood. A Christmas Eve service via zoom followed.

Holy Manger Barkway hosted a Christmas Eve drive-by in which we collected food for the Salvation Army food bank, and donations for Gravenhurst Against Poverty. The exterior of the church featured a manger scene painted by Bonnie Edwards, music and lights to honour the season. Since this church, 'Holy Manger' bears the namesake of Christmas, it usually draws a crowd on Christmas Eve. Thanks to the drive-by, the 'crowd' could still make pilgrimage to the manger while honouring the social-distance guidelines of the Province and Diocese.



We continue to gather online and pre-tape worship videos with our neighbouring parishes; and distribute them via our Facebook and Website. Please read the Worship Report for more information about our online ministry.

Thank you to those who have kept in touch by phone or email to others who might be on their own. Life during COVID - 19 has required that we stay indoors as much as possible, leaving some days long. A cheery phone call or funny email is always gratefully received.

The Wardens appreciate and thank Kim Hawn for his music each Sunday; Stephanie Newroth, our Parish Administrator for her kind and friendly manner with all the parishioners, Graham Eliot, our custodian, for keeping the church sanitized, and Meredith Hendy, our Treasurer, for keeping us on track. It is also a pleasure to have Rev. Jim Schell, his wife Pat, Rev. Margaret Morrison, and Rev. Diana Wilde in our midst on various Sundays.

Both the tile for the floor and steps in the elevator area are now in place at St. James. We are waiting for the elevator company to come back and complete the work. Promises have been made that this will occur! The electrical system was corrected and brought up to code.

During the shut- down period the space at the back of the church was addressed. Our wonderful carpenter, Bob Vanderniet, removed pews at the back of the church and turned one into a beautiful meeting table. He also refurbished 10 old wooden chairs that are now around the table. Betty Shakespeare upholstered cushions for the chairs as well the cushions on two other small pews that are now placed by the display case at the back of the church. A runner that Pat Schell made is now in place on the new table. All is ready for when we can meet. The kneelers from the removed pews were turned into bookshelves and placed in the 'Reading Room' off to the side of the main body of the church. You will find a pew in the room as well, all providing a quiet space to sit, read and reflect.

With all the removal of pews, the carpet needed attention. This was accomplished as well. New doors are now in place from the Narthex to the church, from the church to the hall adjoining the office, and a new door to the Chapel itself. During the early part of 2020 St. James was cleaned from top to bottom. It was a tremendous amount of work taken on by Diane Matz and Graham Eliot. They both worked tirelessly for days at a time. The result was a sparkling building. Thank you to both of you for all you did. Thank you also to the crew at Holy Manger who ensure the church building is strong, sanitized and equipped to abide by the pandemic regulations.

When we were able to have services with limited seating, all proper protocols were put in place, such as social-distance seating, signage, and sanitizing with the purchase of a 'fogger'. Masks were provided and attendance was taken.

The Wardens thank you for your financial support of our parish through 2020. It was quite a year, one that no one could have imagined!

We live in hope that 2021 will find an end to this pandemic and bring about good health to all so that we might all worship together in our church.

Worship Report

2020 will certainly be a year to remember, and not all of it bad. While we have seen the locking down, reopening, and locking down again of our churches we have figured out ways to gather for worship. None of us anticipated the new skills we would have to learn, quickly, to stay connected in a meaningful way with each other. In some respects, it has been an exciting, albeit stressful, time to be involved in planning and participating in our liturgies.

As part of our on-going training, many of the Lay Readers of the parish attended the Layreaders Conference on-line in September. This is the first time the conference has been an on-line version and it was very informative and interesting. There were 85 Layreaders from the Diocese in attendance. If you have any questions about Layreaders or how to become one please talk with Rev. Heather.

By the end of February things were starting to happen with COVID and there were discussions about whether we should go ahead with the scheduled "Lenten Leap Day" retreat. Of course, it didn't happen as by mid-March we were in lockdown. And that's when things became really interesting. We were fortunate as Rev. Heather adopted Zoom fairly quickly as a means of gathering for worship. The first few weeks were tough trying to figure out how to fit a service into 40 minutes and allow people time to chat and connect. However, Rev. Heather did a great job of balancing it out. A few of the early attempts to have multiple people participate were not totally successful because of technology issues and our own lack of understanding of the inherent difficulties of lag-time and bandwidth capacities. But continually trial and error have made the services better. Rev. Heather, with contributions from a large contributing group, has been providing "Worship" bags on a regular basis. These bags include weekly readings and prayers, small tokens from groups or individuals, coffee hour items and other surprises. People have taken time to help stuff the bags and help deliver them when they are ready. This ministry is now reaching 90 households between the three sister points in our Parish. And I see people referring to these readings and prayers on-line while participating in the weekly Zoom service.

We also partnered with the Parish of Muskoka Lakes in a series of weekly pre-recorded services. These have been twice weekly prayers of the church offered on Wednesday and Friday, and a Sunday morning BCP Morning Prayer service. Different people from our congregation have made video recordings, help to lead service, delivered reflections, and in my case provide weekly intercessions. This is still an on-going partnership. These services are uploaded to both Facebook and YouTube and reaches people from around the world. The statistics have been very interesting. For Christmas Eve, all 3 churches worked together on a video service that was distributed by Facebook, YouTube and on our parish website, www.balagravenhurstchurches.com

We have also participated in several other worship offerings on-line. We had a number of people record The Lord's Prayer for the National Church video that was done in the Spring. We have participated in Deanery On-line Worship services and in Diocesan On-line services. All of these have reached out to a larger community than just our own parish family.

When we were able to go back to in-person services in September, the decision was made to continue the Zoom services as there were some members of our congregation who, for a variety of reasons, were not going to be going back right away to the physical building. It was around this time we made the decision to go to a paid Zoom account which removes the time restriction and makes it easier to have a service with regular music and still allow time for visiting and connecting with each other. We try to source out singable music with words as we can sing in our homes. We have been getting people to do readings and prayers. We have different people offering reflections. So very similar to what we would do in-person. We also made the decision to open these services to members of other congregations who were missing live connection with others before, during or after service. We now have a diverse group of people, from all over the deanery, who participate in our services.

Rev. Heather and I, along with Rev. GailMarie and Cory from PML, are involved in longer term discussions regarding an On-line Ministry team. This is an initiative to support what is happening in individual congregations but reaching out to the larger community with resources already available within the Deanery. It has the potential to be a very interesting team with some very different ideas. Started by necessity but driven now by what we see as some benefits to allow us to reach people that can't always be a "bum in the pew" on a Sunday morning.

These things may not be "church" as we would like it, in an ideal world, but it is helping to feed our souls. We have discovered new ways of praying with each other!

St. James Hope Chest Report

In 2020 the Hope Chest operated both Wednesday and Thursday mornings for the months of January, February, and early part of March. Due to COVID 19, the store was closed for the remainder of 2020. During the pandemic, a socially-distanced group of volunteers accomplished a stock sort; and the store was accessed twice for emergency needs for two families.

Every year the volunteers have met at the end of the year to discuss the disbursement of funds. Since the restrictions pertaining to the pandemic did allow for this, funds of \$1985.81 from the Hope Chest remained untouched. An email was sent out by volunteer Judy Marriott in January 2021 asking the volunteers if they would agree to send \$500.00 to the Salvation Food Bank and \$500.00 to Gravenhurst Against Poverty via St. James Virtual Walkers team in the Coldest Night of the Year effort to raise funds for local homelessness. The amount of \$985.81 will remain with the Hope Chest. A positive response was received.

The Hope Chest has been a wonderful source of outreach at St. James for several years. It has provided funds for many programmes in our community. This could not have been achieved without the help of the volunteers who came in cheerfully each week to look after the store. In 2021, the volunteers will keep in contact to determine when and how to continue this ministry.
