I facilitate both educational seminars on the value of advance care planning and activity-based seminars to assist residents with the completion of their Yellow Dot form and Advanced Directives.

Facilitator, Walking the Mourner's Path | St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Atlanta Georgia Bi-Annually

Walking the Mourner's Path is a small group, Christ-centered, 8-week grief workshop. Once the initial task of assessing participant readiness for the workshop is completed, each week I guide participants through different concepts of the grief, mourning, and bereavement process. Effective listening is utilized to determine how to both (1) facilitate the discussion further and (2) modify the course homework to effectively minister to the individual and collective needs of the group without the possibility of overwhelming them. Shared experiences among the participants as well as the use of narratives, allowed both Transformational and Experiential learning to occur, shepherding the participants forward in their healing. The workshop received high reviews from participants.

I presented a monthly Life Transition Series designed to educate participants on end-oflife issues and opportunities, while encouraging the participant to take concrete steps that lessen the burden surrounding end-of-life decisions that will be required of their loved ones or themselves.
