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
Jersey City Public Schools: Academic Performance



- ➤ 2021-2022 academic year, proficiency rates for reading were 35.9 percent of third graders and 36 percent of ninth graders.
- Nearly two-thirds of JC students are unable to read at age level. One in six children, who are not reading proficiently in third grade, do not graduate from high school on time.
- Compared to the 90.9 percent graduate rate in New Jersey, only 78 percent of students in Jersey City graduate.

Math

- ▶ 2021-2022 academic year, the proficiency rates were 32.7 percent for third graders and 10.6 percent for eighth graders.
- Nearly 90 percent of Jersey City students are deficient in eight grade mathematics, which is concerning and profoundly troubling.
- ▶ Reading and mathematics proficiency at an early age is highly correlated with future student success, high school graduation, and ability to enter successful careers.









For the academic years beginning in 2017 and ending in 2021, the budget remained relatively stagnant, ranging from \$628.7 million to \$660.1 million. In the 2021-2022 academic year, the budget increased to \$734.4 million. In the 2022-2023 academic year, the budget is now over \$1 billion, rising by nearly \$350 million from two years prior.

With a current budget of \$1,035,238,943, Jersey City Public Schools is currently spending **\$36,062 per student per year**, a significant increase from the average \$27,627 per student per year in New Jersey.
