




A Fond Farewell: The One Block Parade

Moreover, many of our high school seniors face the risk of not graduating, as statewide exam results indicate a lack of readiness for further education, whether vocational school, college, or employment.

Our city must offer a robust educational system: our teachers, schools, and children. Regardless of their zip code, every child deserves access to a quality education that nurtures their potential and prepares them for success.

The time is now for us to come together as a community to support our educators, advocate for our schools, and, most importantly, champion the cause of our children. Let us join hands in a concerted effort to transform these statistics and shape a brighter future for Jersey City. Together, we can ensure that every child receives the education they deserve, laying the groundwork for a thriving, vibrant city.

A Tribute to the Unsung Heroes of Civil Rights

On March 25th, a conversation with my friend Regena Thomas opened a new window into the past that continues to shape our understanding of courage and resilience. She recommended exploring the narratives and research housed at Stanford's King Institute, a recommendation I swiftly acted upon.

Diving into these resources, I was struck by the stories of brave women whose strength, support, and unwavering determination were pivotal in the Civil Rights Movement. One narrative, in particular, that of Fannie Lou Hamer, stood out as a beacon of inspiring courage amidst adversity. Hamer's biography is not just a recount of events; it's a powerful testament to the human spirit's capacity to confront cruelty with grace and resilience.

These stories underscore the profound impact of women in the movement, often operating behind the scenes yet fundamentally shaping the course of history. It's a reminder of the collective strength found in the fight for justice and equality and a call to recognize and honor the contributions of these incredible women. Let their courage inspire us to face today's challenges with the same tenacity and hope for a better world.

Hamer, like King, was motivated by faith. Although she was only semi-literate, she had committed countless verses of the Bible to memory. The children of Jersey City deserve to receive the highest quality education offered in the State of New Jersey. If not, it is only our children that will suffer.

Recent events, where members of the Jersey City Board of Education changed leadership, as well as calls for the State to intervene, demonstrate that the JCBOE is characterized by dysfunction and unable to meet the needs of teachers and children.

These are the facts:


- The cost of educating a child in Jersey City is over \$36,000, among the highest in the State.
- School board taxes have increased by nearly \$350 million from 2020 to 2022.
- The School Board now spends over \$1 billion per year.
- Jersey City's academic performance is deficient. We need to a culture of support for our teachers and our children, where their interests are placed first.

IN R E CENTYEARS, THE BUDGETFORTHEJERSEYCITY SCHOOL DISTRICT HAS INCREASED PRECIPITOUSLY.

The budget remained relatively stagnant for the academic years beginning in 2017 and ending in 2021, ranging from \$628.7 million to \$660.1 million. In the 2021-2022 academic year, the budget increased to \$734.4 million. In the 2022-2023 academic year, the budget is now over \$1 billion, rising by nearly \$350 million from two years prior.


With a current budget of \$1,035,238,943, Jersey City Public Schools is spending \$36,062 per student per year, a significant increase from the average of \$27,627 per student per year in New Jersey.

\$36,062 per student in Jersey City


Compared to \$27,627 per student in New Jersey

In the 2021-2022 academic year, reading proficiency rates were 35.9 percent for third graders and 36.0 percent for **ninth graders**.


Nearly two-thirds of JC students need help to read at their age level. One in six children who are not reading proficiently in third grade do not graduate from high school on time.

Compared to the 90.9 percent graduate rate in New Jersey, only 78.0 percent of students in Jersey City graduate.

For the 2021-2022 academic year, the proficiency rates were 32.7 percent for third graders and 10.6 percent for eighth graders.

Nearly 90.0 percent of Jersey City students are deficient in eighth-grade mathematics, which is concerning and profoundly troubling.

Reading and mathematics proficiency at an early age is highly correlated with future student success, high school graduation, and the ability to enter successful careers.




