## "Persistence"

Persistence is defined as "having determination, a willingness to stick to a task, even when it is challenging, and others are against it." The word became part of the feminist movement when, in 2017, the Senate was about to vote to confirm Senator Jeff Sessions as U.S. Attorney General under President Trump. Senator Elizabeth Warren criticized Sessions' record on Civil Rights and wanted to read into the record a letter that Coretta Scott King had written in 1986 to oppose Sessions' appointment to the court in Alabama.

Senator Warren was not allowed to read the letter into the record when Senate Republicans voted 49-43 along party lines to silence her. Of the vote, Senate President McConnell said, "She was warned, she was given an explanation, nevertheless, she persisted." The words, "nevertheless, she persisted," became a rallying cry for women's rights, a rallying cry that needs to be revived.

Often girls are told to sit down, to be quiet, and to let things go. They are discouraged from having dreams. Malala didn't give up. Shirley Chisholm wasn't quiet. Greta Thunberg pursued her dream of making the world more aware of the dangers of climate change. These women should serve as examples to the rest of us.

Currently in this country, there has seemed to be an attempt to wage "war" on women's rights and equality on everything from medical decisions, such as abortion, to elevating women to higher levels in business and government. There is still a wage gap, even in professional sports. For example, phenom Caitlin Clark will be paid only a fraction of what her male counterpart will earn in pro basketball, even though her popularity will bring in the fans.

These assaults on our rights to equal treatment require women to stand together and to persist against those who would have us be quiet. Noise is necessary to regain the rights some have lost and to attain equity in the work force and elsewhere.

As Shirley Chisholm said, "You don't make progress by sitting on the sidelines whimpering and complaining. You make progress by implementing ideas."

Our DEI Interest Group is exploring the major religions of the world. It is our belief that to understand a people, you must also understand their approach to faith and religion. Because there is currently a lot of attention being paid to Muslims and their belief system of Islam, it is important for us to be able to separate out the teachings of Islam and what is the impact of culture on the faith. I am going to briefly give a list of facts on Islam as well as some myths that are often believed. Of course, there is much more that needs to be learned to fully understand Islam but I am hoping that this is a start. ### **ISLAM FACTS**

- The word Islam means "submission" to the will of God.
- Followers of Islam are called Muslims.
- Muslims are monotheistic and worship one, all-knowing God, who in Arabic is known as Allah.
- Followers of Islam aim to live a life of complete submission to Allah. They believe that nothing can happen without Allah's permission, but humans have free will. This is why you hear Muslims say en Shallah (God willing) after things that they propose to do.
- Islam teaches that Allah's word was revealed to the prophet Muhammed through the angel Gabriel.

- Mosques are places where Muslims worship.
- The Quran (Koran) is the major holy text for Muslims.
- A central idea in Islam is "jihad" which means struggle. While the term has been used negatively in mainstream culture, Muslims believe it refers to internal and external efforts to defend their faith. Although rare, this can include military jihad if a "just war" is needed.

#### **ISLAM MYTHS**

- Muslims don't believe in Jesus
  - Muslims believe he was a fully human prophet and not divine himself
- Most Muslims are Arab
  - Only 10% of Muslims are Arab
  - The largest Muslim population is in Indonesia followed by Asia, Africa as well as other parts of the world
- Islam oppresses women
  - Ill treatment of women is based on local cultural norms and not Islam
- Muslims are violent
  - Terrorism cannot be justified under valid interpretation of Islam
  - The Quran emphasizes hope, faith and peace
- Islam is intolerant of other religions
  - Jews, Christians and Muslims all worship the same God, however, they also worship different prophets (Mohammed, Jesus, and Moses)
  - Muslims respect people of the Book

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Unfortunately, your Lobby Days team members weren't able to get a scheduled meeting with our legislative representatives as we had hoped. But you can still keep up-to-date with the bills supported by AAUW-California at:

Not just supported by, but written by AAUW-CA, is our signature bill AB 2843 "Health Care Coverage for Rape and Sexual Assault Survivors." So many times rapes may not be reported because of the cost of medical care required. The bill eliminates cost-sharing, including deductibles, from being imposed on any rape survivor seeking medical care following a rape. *Insurers will be required to cover the cost of medical care with no copay*. AB 2843 ensures that those individuals who wish to report a rape and file charges will have the benefit of a rape kit test and forensic exam to provide evidence. In addition, they can receive the care they need following a traumatic sexual attack.

The second "A" priority bill, AB 2326 "Title IX Oversight and Compliance Act" is also sponsored by AAUW-CA. This bill falls under the Public Policy Priorities pillar "Equal Access to Quality Education for All Students" and champions something that AAUW-CA has long supported: Title IX enforcement. AB 2326 requires the Chancellors of the Community Colleges and State Universities and the President of the University of California to provide an annual report of their compliance with Title IX, presented publicly and orally to the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees on Higher Education Finance, a move to hold the systems, and their leaders, more publicly accountable.

Our third "A" priority bill is AB 2099, "Protecting Reproductive Health Clinics." This bill falls under the pillar "Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society." The bill makes it possible for the D.A. to file a felony charge for sharing personal information or images of individuals such as reproductive health care providers or patients, with the intent to cause harm or violence against them, if the posting and any subsequent action results in bodily injury. With violence against abortion providers continuing to rise following the reversal of Roe, the protection of providers and patients is now more important than ever.

## AAUW 2024 Scholarship Update

The Stockton Branch of AAUW annually awards scholarships to Delta College women. For the past eight years, our branch awarded \$2,000 in scholarships each to three women (total of \$6,000). This year, due to less funds generated to donate, the Board decided to award \$1,500 in scholarships each to two women (total of \$3,000).

Last year, our Scholarship Selection committee developed some minor changes to our scholarship criteria, making it more precise (AAUW Board approved), and requested that College change several application questions which clarified the information we needed to help ensure that our applicants met our AAUW criteria. Those changes resulted in a more manageable number of qualified applicants to consider this year.

The AAUW Scholarship Committee met and narrowed down 17 applications downed to top recipients that met our revised scholarship requirements: Female student completing two years of college, earning a minimum of 60 units by the end of the current spring term with a minimum cumulative 3.50 GPA, transferring to a four-year institution and attending full time starting in the fall term of the current year (upon verification of enrollment), and a resident of San Joaquin County for at least five years. Serving on the selection committee with me for the second year was Jennifer Balestracci, thank you Jen! Carolyn Wischhusen, who has served on the committee for the past seven years, was unavailable and missed.

Our two scholarship recipients are invited to our June Branch meeting to share their inspiring stories. I hope you will attend to support them. More details about our recipients will be included in the June Delta Steamer.

### **Reading Is Fundamental Update**

Last spring, the <u>Steamer</u> article "Where the RIF Books Are" discussed the following:

→How AAUW-Stockton manages the national literacy program Reading Is Fundamental (RIF) for our community at four targeted schools.

→How students at each RIF school actually examine and select their new free books in various settings: an empty classroom, a school library, a multi-purpose room, places where hundreds of inviting books could be displayed for children to handle and examine. Each youngster chooses a free book to take home, read with/to family members, and share with siblings.

Each month for the rest of school year 2023-24, the <u>Steamer</u> is featuring a RIF book distribution. In April, we visited Lottie Grunsky Elementary School's multi-purpose room, AKA "the cafeteria." May's site is a multi-use classroom at Van Buren Elementary School on 10<sup>th</sup> St. south of the San Joaquin County Fairgrounds.




