Public Policy Update

One of AAUW California's Public Policy Priorities is to promote women in Leadership positions, so it is a pleasure to report that Claudia Goldin, 77, is the first woman to win the Nobel Prize in Economics without men as collaborators and the third woman to win overall. She was also the first woman to be offered tenure in Harvard's economics department, in 1989.

Dr. Goldin's Nobel-winning study focuses on causes of the gender wage gap, the evolution of women's participation in the job market over the past 200 years, and the implications for the future of the labor force. In a paper in the National Bureau of Economic Research, Goldin writes that, "the golden era of American women's rights lasted from 1963 to 1973." Of the 155 important moments for advancement of women, 45% took place in those years during which women changed from having jobs to pursuing careers. This one factor is "among the grandest advances in society", according to Dr. Goldin.

However, her work also focuses on the work that we still have to do to continue to advance.

Another AAUW Public Policy Priority is Economic Security for all women including equity in the workplace, enforcement of workplace antidiscrimination statutes, access to job training for career development, and work-life balance, including access to quality affordable childcare and paid sick and care-giving leave. These are exactly the factors studied by Dr. Goldin to understand why U.S. women earn \$.80 for every dollar a man makes, why men's wages are than women's in the same occupation, and why women lag behind men in the top jobs.

"Women are now more educated than men," Goldin told the Associated Press. "They graduate from college at much higher rates than men. They do better in high school than men do. So why are there these differences?"

In the first half of the 20th century, laws limited women's ability to work when married or pregnant. In the second half of the century, birth control, later marriages and education resulted in substantial progress for women in the labor market. However, a gender

gap persists into the present day-a gap that is compounded by additional factors, such as class, race, ethnicity, and ability. Dr. Goldin's research shows that, when gender is the primary factor for consideration, parenthood and lack of childcare are the main factors contributing to the ongoing pay gap. As women are normally expected to shoulder caregiving responsibilities in the home, this pay gap begins a year or two after a woman's first child is born. And yet, since the Comprehensive Child Development Act was vetoed by President Nixon in 1971, an act which would have created a national daycare program, consistent and affordable access to quality child care options remains elusive for most American families. While Goldin's research is not focused on solutions to entrenched problems related to gender and labor, other economists note the importance of her work for better understanding these issues, which is a critical step for creating meaningful social and legal change.

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In Case You Missed the June Meeting...

A traditional and exciting feature of our last meeting of the year is the revealing of our Named Gift Honorees. These are the branch members who have performed extraordinary service to our AAUW branch in the past, especially during the previous calendar year. For every \$750 contributed to the AAUW Fund in that year, our branch may honor one member for service to the branch by making the contribution in that member's name as a Named Gift Award. (See the complete list of honorees at the front of our branch directory.) Stockton Branch calls these helpful hymenoptera our Wonder Bees.

At last June's meeting, we honored two such bees for the 2023 calendar year. Our colony's AAUW Fund Chair Cindy Milford shared hints about each bee's personal life, talents, activities, and positions, then the hive buzzed with guesses about that Wonder Bee's identity. That morning, Wonder Bee #2 was outside the hive assisting with a young women's activity (where else?) so will receive her framed certificate from AAUW-National and a very special embroidered towel (above this article) at our September 7 meeting. These gifts will long remind our two bees of how much they are appreciated. Their <u>persistence</u> in doing their tasks and their <u>dedication to equity</u> for women and girls have helped our colony thrive. Even if you attended the June meeting, do revisit the following tributes to our Wonder Bees!

Wonder Bee # 1 flew with her family from their Arkansas hive to Southern California then pursued her studies at CSU Chico and at CSU San Jose where she earned her teaching credential. She taught 4th and 8th grade American History for over 34 years. Along the way she met and married another teacher with whom she recently celebrated 55 years of marriage, the last 20 of which have been in Stockton. Her family is very dear to her as evidenced by her traveling each week for years to her daughter's Mill Valley home to spend two days caring for her two granddaughters.

in 2010, this Wonder Bee landed in Stockton AAUW's hive, became acquainted with opportunities to serve, and then in the last six years really got involved in the work AND the fun of the colony. During that time, she led her husband into AAUW membership.

Work? In the Pre-Covid Home Tours of 2018 and 2019, our Wonder Bee shouldered Head Hostess duties where she showed her strong work ethic, organizational skills, and sociability. In Post-Pandemic years, she and her husband have participated in each annual Rotary Read-In. From 2021 to the present, she has accepted the challenge of being the Reservations Chair, a role that requires communication skills, ease with math, and social gifts including patience while interacting with callers and meeting attendees—almost every month!

Fun? She is known for her hosting talents which she has used especially with two groups. One is the AAUW Board for which she has hosted several work-focused retreats in a pleasant setting. The other is the Mentor Group for which she has prepared holiday meals and organized swim parties and other activities. She declares that she loves using her food preparation and decorating skills for AAUW activities which, in turn, contribute to equity for women and girls, a very satisfying outcome indeed! One of her colony-mates reminds us that this Wonder Bee is a member of a branch book group Book Club Light, another opportunity for camaraderie in the hive.

Devotion to family and young people in general, a friendly nature, the willingness to work hard for the colony, attention to detail, and reliability in doing her monthly Reservations Chair duties—These qualities belong to Wonder Bee #1, Betty Parsons!

Wonder Bee #2 reveres her Chinese heritage, but surprisingly, she is fluent in Spanish because she was raised in Panama! After applying to colleges in the States, our then-17-year-old Wonder Bee-to-Be chose to study at USF where she met her future husband. The couple settled in Stockton, and our bee began a 28-year career at State Fund. AAUW colony bee Paula Almaas, a Fund co-worker, recalls how for three years our bee worked on her Masters in Social Work via a new CSU Stanislaus program—after doing her day job at State Fund! She and her husband raised two sons and a daughter who have added four grandchildren to the family.

Inside the Hive: In 2013, our Wonder Bee winged into the AAUW hive where she quickly got involved in the work of the colony. Pre-Pandemic, she was Head Hostess for the Home Tour three times, and post-Pandemic, she has shared books with classes during each annual Rotary Read-In. She labored tirelessly in the kitchen during our AAUW Thanks for Giving Tea. Our bee joined STEM Trek and the Mentor Group where she is typically available to transport mentees to and supervise them during activities like Dinner with the Scientists. She uses numerous local contacts to promote opportunities for mentees' service projects such as creating food baskets for LULAC. Her expertise in Spanish aids communication between several mentees' family members and the mentors.

Outside the Hive: This bee shows a devotion to community service. She has been deeply involved in Hospice of San Joaquin, including being President of the Hospice Butterfly Auxiliary. In 2008, she and her husband were awarded the Judges' Award of Excellence from the S.J. Council of Governments for dedication to the S.J. Regional Community. In 2018 she was honored with the Susan B. Anthony Award for Community Service. Her recently embraced outlets for service include membership in Junior League of San Joaquin and being an advisor for Eleanor by Women United.

She is described by fellow worker bees as dependable, hard-working, compassionate--the iconic "volunteer" who sincerely wants to help others and does so effectively. This valued member of our AAUW Colony is Wonder Bee #2, Rosa Solis!
