AAUW Stockton Branch and League of Women Voters San Joaquin County will hold a joint meeting at 10am Saturday, October 5th at the Chavez Library. League members will present the Pros and Cons of the ten propositions that will be on the statewide ballot for the General Election, November 5th, 2024.

State ballot measures present voters with many significant legislative decisions this November, including bond measures for education facilities and state and local parks: major changes to Proposition 47: possible increase in the minimum wage, and lowering the threshold for local measures for housing from two-thirds to 55%.


DIVERSITY, EQUITY, INCLUSION

By the time this is out to you the GOTV (Get Out The Vote) training will have already occurred. It will cover subjects such as voter registration, early voting, locating polling places, voter education, and community collaboration projects. Our October meeting will be held jointly with the League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan discussion of the issues.
