

Recently, Sarah Sanders, governor of Arkansas, signed a bill into law that creates a process for challenging books available to children in public and school libraries. The bill would create an offense for "furnishing a harmful item to a child," a misdemeanor.

Sanders justified this act by saying that she wants children to be "as safe in the libraries as they are in their classrooms." Really? In this country, our classrooms can hardly be considered safe.

Apparently, Governor Sanders has never heard of Sandy Hook, Uvalde, or Columbine. As of September 6th, 2024, there have been at least 46 school shootings in the U.S., so many that most schools conduct "active shooter" drills to prepare students for the event so that they know how to react and to protect themselves as much as possible. Recently, there have been two school shootings here in California at small, private schools with religious affiliations. It seems no one is exempt from this violence.

An estimated 4.6 million children live in a home where at least one gun is kept loaded and unlocked. These improperly stored weapons can contribute to school shootings. The easy availability of guns at gun shows and the like where there is no requirement for background checks also contribute to school shootings. The new Arkansas law would require that books would need to be evaluated before being placed in libraries, but, apparently, guns are okay for children to have easy access.

Supporters of the law explained that the measure is needed to protect children from what they consider to be obscene material. The fact that children are not safe from the danger of gun violence in the street, in their homes, or in the schools is what is obscene. To some people, books seem to be more dangerous than guns. Our children deserve better.

The funds go to our Community Outreach Programs, which include RIF, Mentor, Delta Scholarships, Tech Trek, and the Essay Contest. So now we have funds from the tea to help with our programs. In this issue, a celebration of the world's holidays continues. This month, January 29th, to be precise, is the start of Chinese New Year. This holiday is celebrated by one sixth of the world's population and is celebrated worldwide in regions and countries that house significant overseas Chinese or Sinophone populations, especially in Southeast Asia. Chinese New Year or the Spring Festival is a festival that celebrates the beginning of the New Year on the traditional lunisolar Chinese calendar. It is one of the most important holidays in the Chinese culture.

In China, each lunar cycle has 60 years, and 12 years is regarded as a small cycle. Each of the 12 years is defined by an animal sign: Rat, Ox, Tiger, Rabbit, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Sheep, Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Pig. 2025 is the year of the Snake and 2026 is the year of the Horse.

The celebration decorations are mostly red. Houses are decorated with red lanterns and red paper cuttings; city streets are lit up with red lanterns; many people dress In red traditional clothing. The red decorations are the equivalent of Christmas trees to the Christmas holiday. Rather than receiving gifts, children are given red envelopes filled with lucky money from their relatives. The largest fireworks displays in the world are held during the Chinese New Year celebrations.

Just like holidays celebrated around the world, food is a very important aspect of the Chinese New Year celebration. The most famous festival food is dumplings. Many other foods such as rice cakes, spring rolls, fish, spring rolls, noodles, wontons and rice balls are also served.

The beginning and the peak time of the celebration is New Year's Eve and 15 days later it ends with the Lantern Festival. Gong Hay Fat Choy (Happy New Year)!




