Arts Performing

- Recently I was lucky enough to attend two wonderful performances – one on film and the other at a theatre. The movie was Audrey's Children, the true story of Dr. Audrey Evans who was born in York, England in 1925. Dr. Evans was a pediatric oncologist who spent most of her career working at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP). Dr. Evans was known as "Mother of Neuroblastoma" because of her work treating children with the disease. In 1971 she created the Evans staging system to determine neuroblastoma disease progression and determine what treatments would be most effective, reducing mortality rates by nearly fifty percent. Dr. Evans saw the need for a home away from home for both patients and their families while being treated at CHOP. She was introduced to the Philadelphia Eagles owner, Jimmy Murray, after the team had raised \$100,000 for children with cancer in honor of one of the player's daughters who had leukemia. When she was accepting the money Evans let Murray know that she would need another \$32,000 in order to buy a house for the children and their families. Murray asked Ed Rensi, Regional Manager of McDonald's, to donate this and Rensi agreed under the condition that the house would be named the Ronald McDonald House. The film was recently in local theatres.
- The show I saw was DREAMGIRLS, which tells the story of a 1960s Supremes-like girl group that catches its big break during an amateur competition. This is a dazzling production with powerhouse vocal performances and an unforgettable score. A wonderful evening of musical theatre! DREAMGIRLS is at the Walnut Street Theatre until May 4.

Women's History

Juneteenth, officially Juneteenth National Independence Day, is a federal holiday in the United States. It is celebrated annually on June 19 to commemorate the ending of slavery in the United States.

The holiday's name is a portmanteau of the words "June" and "nineteenth", as it was on June 19, 1865 when Major General Gordon Granger ordered the final enforcement of the Emancipation Proclamation in Texas at the end of the American Civil War. [8][9] In the Civil War period, slavery came to an end in various areas of the United States at different times. Many enslaved Southerners escaped, demanded wages, stopped work, or took up arms against the Confederacy of slave states. In January 1865, Congress finally proposed the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution for national abolition of slavery. By June 1865, almost all enslaved were freed by the victorious Union Army, or abolition laws in some of the remaining U.S. states. When the national abolition amendment was ratified in December, the remaining enslaved in Delaware and in Kentucky were freed.

Joanne Lotierzo Memorial Scholarship



Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention

Evesham Township Police Department and Providence House Domestic Violence Services of Catholic Charities work collaboratively to recruit and train volunteers who are interested in becoming part of the Domestic Violence Response Team (DVRT). Team members work in conjunction with police to provide



victim support, information and referrals at the time of a domestic violence crisis. Applicants must be willing to serve a minimum of four 12-hour shifts per month, as well other

qualifications. This also includes a 40-hour mandatory training course held over a six-week period, during evening hours and includes observations at Superior Court in Mount Holly.
