Advocates for Children

Little Hands Little Feet is a non profit organization run out of St. Andrews United Methodist Church in Cherry Hill, which works directly with social workers in Burlington, Camden and Gloucester counties to provide clothing bundles to children in need or in crisis. They provide boys and girls clothing ages newborn to youth size 16. They seem to always run out of boys clothing sizes 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and also boys and girls size 14 and 16.

LHLF looks forward to receiving new and gently used books for all ages including high school age children. When available they also like to give out coloring books, activity books and are always in need of small boxes of crayons.

Gently used stuffed animals are always appreciated. With the help of PetSmart, they collect seasonal donations every year at Christmas so that the children can be the proud owner of a new stuffed animal to love. It is a wonderful thing to be able to give two stuffed animals to children that may literally have just the clothes on their back.

Children under 12 months old get baby blankets and a lightweight receiving blanket, as well as underwear and like-new infant and toddler socks. Bibs are also appreciated.

Each child is given a zip-up hoodie or lightweight jacket, so they are always in need of them. In fall/winter they get a winter coat, gloves and hats. Right now the charity is in the process of revamping their rooms to better serve their needs. Since the founding of LHLF they have grown over the years and now work with more than 168 social workers. Last year alone they filled close to 1,300 orders. From January 2024 to present they have already filled 925 orders.

During the month of November, we ask that members collect donations of new or gently used clothing, books or stuffed toys and bring them to our November meeting on Nov. 25th. The Advocates for Children committee is very grateful for your support!

LHLF also will have volunteer opportunities on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings to help with bundling and distribution. More details will follow next month.

Environment


This is Part One of our look into the causes of Global Warming and Climate Change. Global warming from fossil fuels is one of the biggest environmental problems of our lifetime as greenhouse gas emissions blanket the Earth, they trap the sun's heat, leading to global warming.

2023 was the hottest year on record, with global average temperatures at 1.46C above preindustrial levels and 0.13C higher than the elevenmonth average for 2016, currently the warmest calendar year on record. The year was marked by six record-breaking months and two record-breaking seasons.

What's more, carbon dioxide (CO2) levels have never been so high. After being consistently around 280 parts per million (ppm) for almost 6,000 years of human civilization, CO2 levels in the atmosphere are now well above 420 ppm, more than double what they were before the onset of the Industrial Revolution in the 19th century. According to National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Administrator Rick Spinrad, the steady annual increase is a "direct result of human activity," mainly from the burning of fossil fuels for transportation and electricity

generation but also from cement manufacturing, deforestation, and agriculture.

Women's History

I learned something very interesting and surprising this month. A very important part of a car was invented by a woman, windshield wipers!

Mary Elizabeth Anderson was born in 1866 in Alabama. When older, she had a job in New York and took the trolley to work every day. She became very upset when the trolley driver had to stop the trolley every few blocks and get out to clean off the window of snow and water in bad weather. This made her late for work several times. So mad was she that she invented a "window cleaning device" which was operated from inside the trolley but located outside on the window. She tried selling the idea to several companies but nobody liked the idea and she was never able to sell it. She even got a patent for her idea in 1903. One Canadian company said the wipers would distract drivers and cause accidents.

Her patent expired before Henry Ford came up with the first car. Can you imagine a car today without wipers? Even though her patent expired before cars became popular, some companies, around 1913, thought wipers might be useful. Cadillacs started to use wipers on cars in 1922.

Mary Elizabeth Anderson died in 1953 but was given credit as the inventor of windshield wipers and was inducted into the Inventors Hall of Fame in 2011.
