Environment

Litter is a problem. Not only does it ruin the beauty of where we live, but it also has serious implications for the health of our planet and its inhabitants. Let's look at four problems that litter creates:

- Environmental Damage: Litter can cause environmental damage in a variety of ways. It can pollute our waterways, harm wildlife, and damage ecosystems. When litter is not properly disposed of, it can end up in our streams, rivers and oceans, posing a serious threat to aquatic life. In addition, litter can be harmful to wildlife that may mistake it for food or become entangled in it. Litter can also damage ecosystems by disrupting natural habitats and in some cases introducing invasive plant species.
- Health Risks: Litter can pose significant health risks to humans and animals alike. Discarded items such as needles or broken glass can cause injuries to humans and pets. In addition, litter can attract vermin, bugs and other pests that can spread disease. Sometimes litter can contain hazardous materials or chemicals which can cause the contamination of our groundwater.

- Economic Impact: Litter can also have a significant economic impact. The cost of cleaning up litter can be substantial, with taxpayers often footing the bill. In addition, litter can discourage tourism and economic development, as it creates an unattractive and unwelcoming environment.
- Aesthetic Value: Finally, litter can take away
 from the aesthetic value of our communities. Discarded items such as plastic bags or
 bottles can be unsightly and create an unappealing environment. This can impact the
 quality of life for residents and decrease
 property values.

It's clear that litter is a problem that affects us all. The impacts of litter are significant, and it is crucial that we take action to address this issue. By properly disposing of our waste and recycling whenever possible, we can help to reduce litter and protect our planet for future generations. Women's History

This month I'd like to tell you about **Mary McLeod Bethune**. If you are part of the club's book club, you



probably recognize her name because she is mentioned throughout our current book, "First Ladies." She was a prominent civil rights leader and activist, educator, advisor to four presidents, founder of what is now called Bethune-Cookman University and founder of the

National Council of Negro Women. The first statue of a Black woman or any woman in the nation's Capital, the Mary McLeod Bethune Memorial, features three bronze figures standing on a tiered platform which has a 17-foot statue of her holding a cane that represents one belonging to President Franklin D. Roosevelt which was given to her by her very good friend Eleanor Roosevelt. Her other hand holds a scroll representing her will and a young boy and girl reaching for it. This statue was dedicated on July 10, 1974 which would have been her 99th birthday.

Another statue of Bethune was installed in the U.S. Capital's Statuary Hall in 2022. It was commissioned by the state of Florida, where she lived, to replace a statue of a Confederate General. She died in 1955 at the age of 80.
