Boat Slip Rentals Rules Clarified by City

The Prior Lake City Council has approved multiple amendments to the City Code related to boat slips and mooring facilities. The purpose was to clarify language related to boat slip rental and controlled access lots.

A Personal Boat Slip allows the mooring of five or fewer restricted watercraft for personal use by the owners or tenants of residential riparian lots. A Restricted Watercraft is defined as, watercraft for use on or stored on the public waters except: Watercraft 16 feet or less in length which uses no motor or a motor of 10 horsepower or less; and watercraft 20 feet or less in length, which uses no motor and is propelled solely by human power.

Personal Boat Slip amendments included:

- •A revision from a maximum of six slips to a maximum of five slips per property.
- •A new 10-foot dock setback requirement from the side property line if three or more boat slips exist.
- ·Language added to clarify all restricted watercraft moored at the lot shall be owned and registered to the owner of property (or immediate family) or property tenant (or immediate family), not both.
- •An allowance for a boarder to place a total of one slip, provided the property owner is

not using slip(s). If property owner has a slip, then a boarder would not be permitted to have

·Specific language added to clarify rental of slips is prohibited.

A Controlled Access Lot (Homeowner Association Lot) is a riparian parcel of land used as a mooring facility for non-riparian lot owners with access to public waters. Amendments to the Controlled Access Lot regulations included:

- •A revision of the boat slip to shoreline ratio from a maximum of one slip per 18.75 feet of shoreline to one slip per 40 shore feet.
- •A requirement that shoreline counted in the boat slip ratio must be usable (no wetlands, marsh, bog, etc.)
- •A requirement that land counted in the shoreline length must abut or lie within 10 feet of navigable water.
- ·Language requiring watercraft to be owned and registered to owners or tenants in the subdivision or their immediate family. It is not the intent of this ordinance to affect the operation of any current legally existing HOA controlled access lot. All legally existing controlled access lots would be allowed to continue as they are currently approved.



Spring Lake Regional Park Offers Diverse Habitats

The parks and recreational areas many Minnesotans enjoy are often the result of the work of numerous organizations over many years of time. The master plans of parks and trail networks generally do not come with funding attached, but rather anticipated future funding.

The Spring Lake Regional Park history is no different. In 1968, the Scott County Board formed a Parks and Recreation committee and eventually the Scott County commissioners selected the Greenwald Property, a 143-acre parcel which bordered both Spring Lake and Prior Lake. The board negotiated a five year purchase plan for \$1,000 per acre and this purchase become part of what is now Spring Lake Regional Park.

The Metropolitan Regional Park System, including Scott County and nine other regional park-implementing agencies, was created by the Minnesota State Legislature in 1975. The state statute identifies the Metropolitan Council's role in establishing and updating plans for metropolitan park systems, while placing ownership and operations of the system in local city or county control.

The Spring Lake Regional Park boundary plan was adjusted in 2005, following an agreement with Scott County to sell land to the City of Prior Lake for a future city park. In exchange, money was used by Scott County to acquire land for Doyle-Kennefick Regional Park, which is located four miles south of Prior Lake in rural Scott County.

In early 2006, the Scott County Board retained a consultant to collaborate with county staff and county citizens to complete a comprehensive master plan for Spring Lake Regional Park. The County Board, Scott County Parks Advisory Committee and the Spring Lake Regional Park Master Plan Technical Advisory Committee, all contributed to the Master Plan effort.

In December 2010, the Scott County Board and the Three Rivers Park District Board established a joint powers agreement. Under that agreement, the Three Rivers Park District takes a leading role in operating and maintaining the park and trail units owned by Scott County, in addition to any Three Rivers-owned properties within Scott County. The county will provide operating resources (staff, trail maintenance agreements, county programs, volunteers) for properties in Scott County.

Spring Lake Regional Park was officially opened for public use in 2012. The park is now roughly 367 acres, with 4.4 miles of paved trails and internal trail loops which connect with many surrounding neighborhoods. Eventually, Spring Lake Regional Park will connect to the Scott West Regional Trail. Since the park has been opened, the following improvements have been implemented: dog park, parking lot (in partnership with City of Prior Lake), latrines, as well as forest enhancement and invasive species management on 170 acres,

shoreline restoration and the Arctic Lake trail loop expansion project (in Partnership with the Shakopee Mdewakaton Sioux Community).

The future scale plans for the park include features such as a four season pavilion, play area, fishing piers and picnic areas on the shore of Spring Lake along County Road 12. As adopted as part of the Scott County 2040 Parks and Trails plan, the Spring Lake Regional Park shoreline development is one of four major development priorities over the next ten years.

While funding and plans of construction are not definite at this time, area residents should anticipate work on this Scott County owned property to be finalized in the not too distant future.

The deputy said he is focused on the safety of lake users and the

education of all local lake users whether they are boating, snowmobiling or riding their ATV's.

In his free time, the new deputy enjoys camping in our state parks.

Prior Lake-Spring Lake Watershed District Updates Management Plan

The Prior Lake-Spring Lake Watershed District is nearing the end of the process to update its 10-year Water Resources Management Plan. The 2020 Management Plan lays out all of the District's activities for the next ten years with a focus on three main areas: water quality, water quantity/flooding and aquatic invasive species (AIS).

One of the top priorities for the next decade is to meet the state water quality standards for aquatic recreation on Spring Lake.

The Watershed District will also develop an AIS Plan to prevent new invasive species from entering the large recreational lakes with public access, including Spring Lake.

Many projects and activities are planned over the next ten years to achieve these goals, including an alum treatment and work in the upper watershed.


Responsible Boat Wakes


The Minnesota Legislature is considering legislation that places a 200 foot setback distance from shore for all wake-surfing activities, regardless of the watercraft. The bill's author maintains the 200 foot no-wake zone addresses concerns over safety and environmental impacts on shorelines.




Kaden Kelly rides a wake on Spring Lake

The "Own your wake" campaign by the Minnesota DNR reminds boaters about safe boating practices as well as shoreline protection. It is against state law to operate a watercraft that creates a wake that endangers, harasses or interferes with any person or property.








May 9th is Walleye Opener Spring Lake Walleyes

The DNR last infused Spring Lake with a sizeable number of walleye fingerlings in 2019 when 8,970 walleyes were released ranging up to six months old. Only 1,672 fingerlings or yearlings were added since 2013 when 9,657, or 330 pounds, of fingerlings were stocked in the 592 acre lake. In 2017 the DNR added 46 adult walleyes. Stocking of fish on Spring Lake occurs only in odd number years thus no walleyes will be added this year.


On **Monday, April 13**, candidate bios will be emailed to all members and posted on the SLA website for review.


