Oxford House

They work with those leaving rehab, healthcare professionals, legal professionals, veterans and parents of addicts.

Oxford houses are rented family houses where groups of recovering individuals live together in an environment supportive to recovery from addiction. Each house is self-run and financially self-supported following a standardized system of democratic operation. Each group obtains a Charter from Oxford House Inc., which is the umbrella organization for the international network of individual Oxford Houses.

All Oxford Houses:

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- Must be run democratically.
- Must be financially self-supporting.
- Must expel members who relapse.

Oxford House offers:

- Twenty-Four hour support from peers in recovery.
- Learn alcohol and drug-free living skills.
- Shared responsibilities for maintaining the house.
- Equal vote on all housing decisions.
- Social interaction and activities.

Eligibility for membership:

- Sobriety that is free from dangerous withdrawals.
- Completion of alcohol or drug treatment.
- Completion of a medical detoxification program.
- Agree to follow individual house guidelines.
- Stay current on his/her share of expenses.
- Demonstrate a desire to grow in recovery.

Cost of living:

- Move-in ranges from \$ 150-250 (due upon acceptance into House)
- Weekly costs range from \$ 100 to \$ 150 per person.

Penelope House

Helps victims of intimate partner violence to gain social and economic independence through shelter, counseling, advocacy and referral to community resources and agencies in Mobile, Washington, Choctaw and Clarke counties. The shelter can provide refuge for victims and children when their lives are in imminent danger. Temporary shelter allows escape from a violent situation.

Victims who are admitted to the shelter are provided a safe place to stay while assessing their life situation and setting goals for the future. Shelter services include food, clothing, case management, advocate services, vocational counseling, child care and support group. An on site medical clinic is available for limited medical services.

Court advocates assist all intimate partner violence victims by helping the victims work their way through the court system. The advocates provide information to victims about their rights and options in the legal system, assist with obtaining warrants and protection from abuse orders. Court advocates accompany victims to both civil and criminal hearings.

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MOGO is a shared ride service in Mobile for \$ 1.25 or less per ride.

Download the **Mogo Rideshare app** from the App Store or Google Play Store and follow the signup steps. Enter your pickup and dropoff address. Choose the ride that works for you by tapping **Book This Ride**.

Find the designated pickup point in the app. It may be a short walk from your exact pickup address but they will pick you up and drop you off at your exact location whenever possible.

Tap the accessibility icon in your profile to request wheelchair vehicles.

This service is available 7 days a week from 6:00 AM to 8:00 PM. **They do not accept cash payments.** They only accept credit and debit cards.

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They offer the State Health Insurance Plan whose counselors offer advice concerning: Medicare, Medicare Supplements, Medicare Savings Programs, Medicaid, Prescription drugs, Plan Comparisons, Billing & Claims, Rights & Protections and Long-Term Care.

Their Senior RX program assists people by applying for Patient Assistance Programs through pharmaceutical companies.

They offer a homebound meal program.

They have an ombudsman, Frank Willis, who is an advocate for people in nursing homes.

They operate 27 Senior Centers; such as Dumas Wesley.

Their attorney, Ms. Bragg, can assist in wills, power of attorney and any legal disputes.

If they do not provide a service they will try to find someone who does.

Senior Programs

The Dumas Wesley Community Center's Senior Activities for Independent Living (S.A.I.L.) Program provides daily enrichment for seniors 60 and older.

The program serves an average of 85 seniors, Monday – Friday from 9:00 AM to 12:00 Noon. Seniors enjoy fellowship over a hot lunch and are provided activities that encourage healthy lifestyles that include: arts and crafts, games, nutritional and financial education, guest speakers, wellness checks, exercise and computer classes.

Transitional Housing

The Sybil H. Smith Family Village was founded in 1999 to fill a void in housing services for women and families experiencing homelessness. This program has a success rate of 88% among residents who exited the program successfully and transitioned into permanent housing.

Major program goals are:

- * To meet the immediate need for stable housing so that residents are free to work on becoming self-sufficient.
- * Help residents obtain job skills and educational skills so they can financially support themselves.
- * Help overcome other critical obstacles such as lack of affordable child care so they may work outside the home.
- * Help individuals and mothers with children recover from and avoid trauma which homelessness and economic instability causes to their health, self-esteem and emotional development.
- * Help secure and retain permanent housing when they complete the Family

Village program.

Each resident is assessed at the time of entry into the program and a detailed case management plan is formulated.

There is also a Women's Sober Housing within Sybil H. Smith Village.

Community Service Block Grant Program

This is a federally funded program, whose primary is to help individuals and/or families achieve self-sufficiency. Provided funding is available to assist with the payment of mortgage or rent and or emergency utility assistance.

GED Program

MCA's program is designed to assist people, who are income eligible, to attain skills and knowledge to achieve self-sufficiency and prepare them for today's competitive job market. Students are able to attend GED preparation classes, as

long as need to assure that they are prepared to successfully take and pass the GED exam.

Head Start

For children 3 to 5 years old. More than a traditional child care, this program promotes school readiness by enhancing the social and cognitive development of children through the provision of educational, health, nutritional, social and comprehensive services to enrolled children and families. 20

Those who do not qualify for free services may qualify if there are special needs or foster children in the household.
