This 4th grade student is an absolutely wonderful, sensitive child who came up to me in November asking for literacy and math tutoring. He told me that he was really behind in both and was one of the first to bring in his signed permission slip. I welcomed him onto my schedule and began meeting with him on November 9th. I feel that we have a very good working relationship, and he is enthusiastic about coming to tutoring.

He has demonstrated growth in his ability to write by having more confidence in front of a blank piece of paper and expressing himself. This student has a lot of potential and I am looking forward to seeing/hearing/reading more of his work in the future.

In regards to other students' successes, I immediately think of two of my students who have similar challenges and seemingly, similar untapped potential. The first, considered to have some of the the most difficult behavior issues in school, also really struggles to complete work. After his I-Station scores in reading went up in November, I've seen a rise in his confidence. It proved to me that he has been carrying a lot of self-doubt and that doing quality work is really important to him. Since then, I've been providing more scaffolding and allowing more discussion about the topic at hand, when reading and responding to passages. We've been slowing down. His writing and reading have become more fluid. I have also included a five minute transition time at the beginning of our sessions, which has helped him to calm down and be ready to focus on rough days. My other student also has a lot of difficulties focusing and completing work, along with being disruptive. The same method applies to her: five minute transition time, scaffolding, and discussion of the material we are reading. Through our discussions, she has revealed an interest in geography and world cultures (food!) that we are excited about researching together!

Peñasco Middle School - After School and AVID program

It function as a teachers assistant in 6th, 7th, and 8th grade math classes, helping anyone who needs it. The AVID program I am tutoring/mentoring for is very appealing. Students identify something with which they need additional help/understanding in their coursework and go through a tutorial process to assist them in better understanding and troubleshooting. It's supposed to help with healthy study skills habits, goal setting, and early college prep. One class is 7th/8th grade mixed and one is a 9th grade class.

For after school program right now we are working on a living herbal/medicinal plant library. Identifying plants around campus and creating a library of their historic uses and contemporary uses. I have an idea of some printed and some drawn botanical drawings with plant information displaying in the classroom or maybe in a big book. Most of the experiential science we have been talking about requires being outside and it's not the season right now so we will add this component in the spring.

How has tutoring helped you in school? "It helped me tremendously with writing, socializing and being more honest with myself."

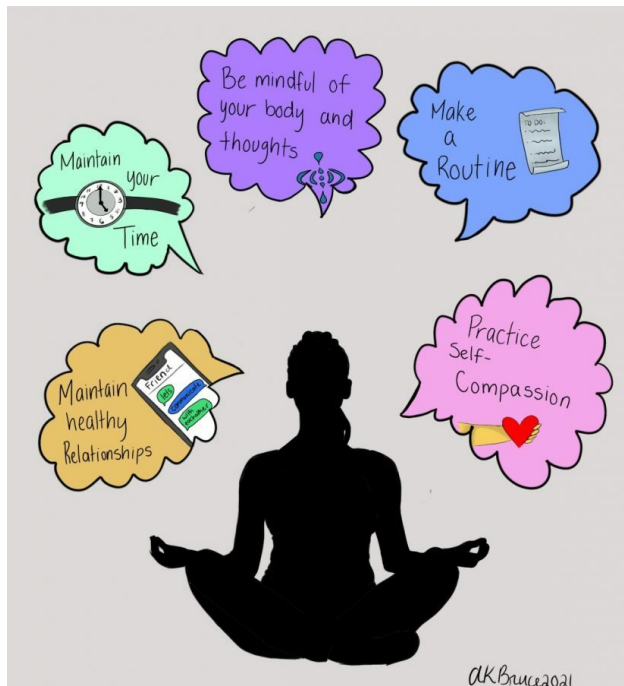
