# 2020 Annual Report



#### GREETINGS FROM JUDGE KEVIN W. DUNN

I am pleased to present the 2020 Annual Report of the Medina County Probate/Juvenile Court. 2020 was a year unlike any we have seen in our lifetime. As directed by the Supreme Court of Ohio's Emergency Orders, our court remained open to emergency hearings in-person only at the onset of the pandemic.

Juvenile and probate courts are entrusted with the care of citizens that must have access to the court at all times. These citizens include abused or neglected children, children or adults who are developmentally disabled and in need of protection, persons in need of emergency hospitalizations, and more. For these reasons, our court has long had a continuing orders of operations plan (COOP), to allow us to function during emergency closures. Admittedly, the COVID-19 pandemic was not the emergency anyone envisioned, but the Court responded swiftly and with great resolve nonetheless.

As you can see from this report, the Juvenile and Probate Courts remained active and busy throughout 2020.

Judge Kevin W. Dunn is one of the four judges of the Common Pleas Court. He began his tenure on the Bench on August 5, 2013. Judge Dunn's second elected six-year term began February, 2021.

The Medina County Probate and Juvenile Courts, wherein Judge Dunn presides, has 2 distinct jurisdictions. Juvenile Court has jurisdiction over all cases involving persons under age 18. These cases are categorized as delinquent; traffic; unruly; and abused, neglected and dependent children. Probate matters, include but are not limited to estates, guardianships, and trusts.

### **Pandemic Requires Changes in Juvenile and Probate Courts**

Medina County Juvenile and Probate Courts adapted quickly to the COVID-19 pandemic. 2020 brought about numerous changes to the Court. Immediate safety measures including adapting social distancing requirements, increased sanitization and staff reassigned to work remotely or rotated shifts where possible were some of the first steps taken in March.

With the help of the Medina County maintenance professionals, a new window with a glass divider was installed in Probate Court to safely shield court employees and the public needing assistance.

In May, the Medina County Juvenile and Probate Court was awarded a technology grant by the Supreme Court of Ohio to help fund the purchase of necessary technology to conduct hearings remotely and

to allow for telework where possible. No sooner did the new technology get installed, the Court began the use of a virtual internet application, Zoom, to conduct uncontested hearings. The use of technology has allowed the court to set and resolve many matters that COVID-19 curtailed. The court began a protocol to create meetings and send litigants a private email with a link to attend on a given date and time. Litigants, attorneys and others have been smoothly attending hearings virtually since May of 2020.

The platform is used to conduct Drug Court review hearings, some delinquency and traffic proceedings, civil status hearings, and more. The use of technology also allowed a child's extended family to be present virtually in her adoption hearing, showcasing a moment of absolute joy in such trying times.

## **Juvenile Court Programming**

**Probation Department** 

Probation Officers investigate all aspects of the Juvenile's case and make recommendations to the Court to protect public safety and to achieve permanent improvement in a child's behavior. In 2020, 73 youth were placed on probation.

**Teen Court Program** 

Teen Court is an intervention program that offers first-time misdemeanor-offending youth the opportunity to be heard by a jury of their peers. Under the supervision of the Court, local teens serve court roles. Due to the pandemic, the Teen Court program did not operate in 2020.

**Drug Court Program** 

Medina County Juvenile Drug Court provides an alternative for juveniles and their families whose criminal justice involvement stems from alcohol or drugs. Using community resources, the program monitoring by three provides specialized docket probation officers, treatment intervention, structure to juveniles. The program also reduces recidivism, protects the community, and teaches juveniles how to lead a healthy lifestyle. There were 27 successful graduates from the program in 2020.

**Community Service** 

More than 1,044 service hours were performed by youth to benefit numerous local agencies and charities in 2020. Despite the pandemic, community service staff were still able to come up with socially distant alternatives.

Ti-180 Program

Teen Intervention – 180 Program (Ti -180) is an alternative to traditional disposition. The goal of the program is to educate youth and their parents or guardians on early intervention and warning signs for substance abuse, as well as provide skills to increase resiliency. 6 youth participated in the program in 2020.

Multi-Systemic Therapy (MST)

MST is a family, home-based treatment that tries to change how youth function in their natural settings. Natural settings include home, school neighborhood. and clinician operates in the home promote positive social while behavior decreasing behavior. antisocial Seven successfully families completed the program in 2020.

**Parent Project** 

Parent Project is a program for parents with difficult or out-of-control adolescents. Parents learn and practice strategies for dealing with destructive behaviors such as truancy, alcohol and drug use, gangs and other criminal behavior, running away and violence. In 2020, 12 families participated in Parent Project.

Risk Screening — Ohio Youth Assessment System (OYAS)

Risk screening assists the Court in identifying the appropriate sanction, program, or referral for each youth. 176 OYAS risk screenings were completed in 2020.

**Family Resource Court** 

Resource Court Family helps reduce the need for court intervention on unruly and truancy Assessments identify cases. individual and family barriers. Through intensive probation supervision, case management and the Court approach, team improves community safety and helps build healthy families. families successfully 5 completed the Family Resource Twenty-three truancy Court. complaints were filed in 2020, 17 were diverted to the truancy program of Family Resource Court juveniles successfully and 12 completed the program.

#### **JUVENILE COURT COLLECTIONS**

Court costs assessed are distributed to state, county and local governments. The COPPER (Costs of Probation and Programming Expense Reimbursement) program was created to recoup part of the cost of court services.


