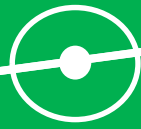

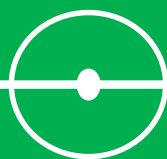
At the end we look at some of the observations we made along the way putting this issue together.

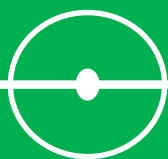
