

**Younes Kaboul** - Played for Tottenham Hotspur, Sunderland, Portsmouth, and Watford amassing 197 games, and with it came **6** red cards

**Martin Keown** – Played for Arsenal and Everton and amassed 323 games and it came with **6** red cards

**Paul Konchesky** – Played for Tottenham Hotspur, Charlton Athletic, West Ham United, Liverpool, Leicester City, and Fulham, and amassed 347 games and it came with **6** red cards

**Alan Smith** – Played for Leeds United, Manchester United, and Newcastle United and amassed 285 games and it came with **7** red cards


**Duncan Ferguson** - Played for Everton and Newcastle United and amassed 269 games and with it came 8 red cards

# Classic Kits

Such is the commercial pull of football kits, clubs seldom miss a trick to have an excuse to release a new one. Traditionally kits would be home and away, with a new design released every alternative 2 years.

#### But times have moved on....

This HWL issue highlights some of the one-off kits that have been released to celebrate a milestone of the club, which is usually the anniversary of the year when the club was founded but can also be for other reasons.

Arsenal's and Nike's Total 90 effort in 2004 paid tribute to Highbury, the club's ground for 93 years. The maroon shirt was a shift from the traditional red and white of the Gunner's jerseys. The gold sponsor adds a touch of class to what we see as a true classic.

AC Milan, to celebrate their centenary released a home shirt with a special badge. The design is based on the first shirt the club wore back in 1899. A very retro feel to the shirt with thinner strips and a collar with a buttoned neck.

The Barca 1999/00 shirt has appeared previously in this feature (half and half), but its shiny look and strong colour combinations should be celebrated. The kit was released as it was the club's centenary year.

French club side Marseille feature twice, with a golden third kit to recognise their 100<sup>th</sup> year in 1998 (Ravanellli, Blanc, and Dugarry is a strong free-kick line-up!) and then their fourth shirt in 1999, with a blue cross central to the shirt, acknowledging their 120<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Others to feature here are the Manchester teams (City & United) who took to celebrating anniversaries by wearing modern-day versions of the 'olden days' kits. No sponsors or branding must be applieded.

Lille, Stuttgart, and Palermo again pay homage to yesteryears with classic tribute kits, with some featuring face collars, a firm favourite at The Halfway line.

Other teams to follow Arsenal with golden features are PSV Eindhoven, Kaiser Chiefs, and Inter Milan with their tribute kits, and also featured are Fulham, Ajax, and Juventus (home and away).

Finally, we also feature the Lazio 2000-01 Puma Centenary Home Shirt and their Macron 115th-year anniversary effort. Don't worry, they also released a 120th-anniversary shirt if you were worried.



Mats Hummels – Started his career at Bayern Munich, then left to join Borussia Dortmund before re-joining Munich, and then leaving for Dortmund once again. Also won 76 caps for the German national team







David Albelda – Former defensive midfielder who played for Valencia for almost 20 years, playing 480 games as well as captaining the side, with 2 loan spells at La Liga rivals Villarreal







Matthew Le Tissier – 8 capped England international who spent his entire professional career at Southampton, renowned for his spectacular goals and formidable penalty record (47 from 48)







Yoann Gourcuff – Former French Player of the Year (2009) won the domestic double with Bordeaux but had less successful spells at AC Milan and Lyon








Tony Cascarino – Winner of Ligue 2 twice (Marseille and Nancy) he is also the oldest player to score a hat trick in Ligue 1, doing so for Nancy at 37 years and 31 days









Marta – Often spoken of as the greatest female footballer of all time, winning the World Player of the Year 6 times and having scored at 5 separate World Cups finals







Marc Overmars – Speedy Dutch left-winger with great success at Ajax and Arsenal before joining Barcelona in 2000 but unable to replicate the success at the Nou Camp



#### The Serie A Greatest Nations XI

That said some are self-explanatory and imagine would not ignite too much debate, but others, perhaps less fashionable positions could irk the reader and encourage a discussion as to why their favourite right-back is not in the starting XI. I have intentionally not included a subs bench, as I fear I'd not have much space left. It should be noted, that the feature sticks to a rigid 4-4-2 formation and won't be changed to fit players of the same position.

At the end of the feature, why not play out your favourite XI from one nation and share it around for a conversation starter.

#### **ENGLISH XI IN SERIE A**

For a nation (in the 1990s) that was bought up on Italian football thanks to Channel 4, I still find it somewhat surprising how few English (and the British Isles) players turned out for Serie A teams, but nevertheless, we can field a pretty good XI.

In goal, we are not flush with options. Former England number one Joe Hart tried his luck at Torino when he was informed he had no future at Manchester City and played 36 league games in his sole season at the club.

Right-back, and it's another unwanted Manchester City player. Micah Richards spent time on loan at Fiorentina, in the same season as when Mo Salah excelled at the Florence club. At left-back, we have a bit more competition. We could have gone for Tony Dorigo or titlewinning Ashley Young, but we've selected Ashley Cole for the number 3 shirt. Centre-backs we have more to choose from. Paul Elliott flew the flag early and the likes of Axel Tuanzbe and Chris Smalling are playing in the league currently, but we've gone for Des Walker for his time at Sampdoria, and Fikayo Tomori for his impressive start at AC Milan.

In midfield, there's the old, the middle, and the new. Having not seen the likes of Trevor Francis, Gordon Cowans or Ray Wilkins perform in Italy we haven't picked them, and the new kids on the block, Nathaniel Chalobah, Ainsley Maitland-Niles, Ronaldo Vieira, Ben Wilmot are yet to make a significant impact. Therefore we are sticking with the middle. David Beckham would grace any right midfield. Paul Ince was widely praised for his time at Inter, and we feel compelled to play Paul Gascoigne based on the fanfare his move to Lazio created. On the left, picked over Lee Sharpe, it's Franz Carr for his stint at Reggiana.

Upfront, again having not seen enough of Jimmy Greaves, Luther Blissett, Mark Hateley, or Paul Rideout, they miss out, as do Jay Bothroyd and Danny Dichio.

Instead, we go for Tammy Abraham after an outstanding first season at Roma, partnered alongside David Platt. Platt excelled at Bari (although relegated) and Sampdoria and even fitted in a season at Juventus.

#### **GERMANS XI IN SERIE A**

We head to Germany for this nation's XI in Serie A, and there is a common theme with the majority selected. The early 1990s was a vintage time for Germans to venture to Serie A.

In goal, again we struggle with too many options. We've had to go for Jens Lehmann even though his time at AC Milan was not entirely successful.

At right-back, we got Stefan Reuter for his time at Juventus and at left-back, we've Andreas Brehme. Jorg Heinrich at Fiorentina was a solid performer, and Robin Gosens promises much at Inter, whereas Christian Ziege was somewhat poor at AC Milan.

Centre-backs we could have looked at Benedikt Howedes (Juventus), Antonio Rudiger (Roma), or even Shkodran Mustafi (Sampdoria) but the calming Jurgen Kohler gets selected, after a very successful period at Juventus and a surprise choice of Matthias Sammer. He was criminally underplayed at Inter Milan but returned to Germany a far better player. Thomas Berthold can feel hard done by not to be in the XI after spells at Hellas Verona & Roma.

Midfield we are leaving out the likes of Emre Can, Stefan Effenberg, Thomas Hitzlsperger, Sami Khedira, and even Karl-Heinz Rummenigge. The latter performing in the 80s for Inter, so somewhat off our radar. Instead, we have the diminutive Tomas Hassler on the right. What a free-kick taker he was! On the left, we've Andreas Moller who would provide an attacking force and then Thomas Doll who often kept Gazza out of the Lazio side. The glue in the midfield keeping it all together is of course the outstanding Lothar Matthaus. Domestic and European success during his time at Inter Milan, and was arguably one of the best central midfielders of his generation.

Alongside Matthaus (and Brehme) at Inter was of course Jurgen Klinsmann, and he is picked, without even taking into account his spell at Sampdoria. Alongside we could have looked at Carsten Jancker (Udinese), Mario Gomez (Fiorentina), or Miroslav Klose (Lazio) but the easy choice is indeed Oliver Bierhoff. Outstanding at Udinese and AC Milan and ever so solid for Ascoli and Chievo sandwiched on either side.

#### FRENCH XI IN SERIE A

What struck us first looking for the selection of players is there is a far greater choice of Frenchmen to have earnt their crust in Serie A.

That is except of course goalkeepers! There is always a shortage. The current number one for AC Milan, Mike Maignan has started his career there in great fashion but we are going for former Parma, Verona, Fiorentina, Genoa, and Inter Milan number one, Sebastien Frey. 446

Serie A appearance is not to be sniffed at.

At right-back, we can't possibly look beyond the great Lillian Thuram. Hugely successful at Parma and Juventus, and equally brilliant at centre-back. Jonathan Zebina is worth a shout but no one is replacing Thuram. At left-back, we've selected Vincent Candela. Part of the Capello title-winning Roma team, he and Cafu up and down the flanks were a great feature of that side. Theo Hernandez started very promisingly at AC Milan at left-back so deserved recognition, and Patrice Evra at Juventus was a success.

At centre-back, there are plenty to choose from. Some to mention that aren't selected are Laurent Blanc, Bruno N'Gotty, and Adi Rami. The pairing selected is Marcel Desailly and Philippe Mexes. Both performed superbly for AC Milan and the latter also turned out for Roma at the highest level.

In midfield, the theme appeared to be quantity over quality. Vast numbers of midfielders came to Italy with great promise and reputations but left with these tarnished. The likes of Ibrahim Ba, Benoit Cauet, Ousmane Dabo, Vikasj Dhorasoo, Ludovic Guily, Yoann Gourcuff, Olivier Kapo and many more!!!

Successful midfielders unlucky to not make the XI are Patrick Vieira, Didier Deschamps, Jeremy Menez, Blasie Matuidi, Christian Karembeu, and Alain Boghossian. The starting midfield is Youri Djorkaeff (Inter), Zinedine Zidane and Paul Pogba (Juventus), and Franck Ribery (Fiorentina & Salernitana)

Upfront, we have to start Michel Platini for his outstanding efforts in the 1980s for Juventus and the question is who partners him. Ultimately we have to pick the highest-scoring Frenchman in Serie A, with 123 goals, and that is David Trezeguet, who scored all of these for Juventus









Bruno Fernandes – Average spells with Udinese and Sampdoria but Fernandes came alive at Sporting Lisbon, scoring 33 goals in the 2018/19 season before moving to Manchester United in 2019



#### SPANISH XI IN SERIE A

If German players were in vogue for Serie in the 90s, Spanish was the opposite. I counted 5 Spanish players transferring to an Italian club in the 1990s. Luckily the number has increased in recent years, so we can bring you a relatively solid Spanish XI.

Goalie = limited choices. Same old story. However, having Pepe Reina in the sticks is no bad thing. Reina featured for Napoli, AC Milan and Lazio.

In defence, we have Alvaro Odriozola on the right, who is on loan to Fiorentina from Real Madrid, and we've another Fiorentina player on the left. Marcos Alonso had a very successful spell, from 2013 to 17.

In the centre of defence, we look beyond Chico Flores and Pablo Mari and instead select Raul Albiol (Napoli) and the perhaps unknown adventure of Ivan Helguera at Roma in 1997.

Midfielders there is a case for what could have been. Imagine a foursome of Joaquin, Pep Guardiola, Ivan De Le Pena and Gaizka Mendieta. Sadly, the quartet failed to shine in the Italian league.

Instead we field Jose Callejon (Napoli & Fiorentina), Borja Valero (Fiorentina & Inter), Fabian Ruiz (Napoli) and Luis Alberto (Lazio). Premier League fans could question are Valero and Alberto the same players that struggled with WBA and Liverpool?


Other midfielders considered, all attacking natured, were Pedro, Suso, Michu, Christian Tello, Javier Farinos, and Bojan Krkic.

Upfront there are fewer options. Old La Liga favourites Fernando Torres and Diego Tristan were unable to recreate their home form in Serie A, and so instead we field two Juventus forwards in Alvaro Morata, back for a second spell in Turin, and Fernando Llorente, who complimented his Juventus spell with time also at Napoli and Udinese.











#### **COUNTRY FOCUS**

For this issue of The Halfway Line, we are focusing on **Cameroon**.

The Cameroonian Football Federation is the governing body of football in Cameroon. It is known as FECAFOOT.

On 11 December 2021, the acting President of FECAFOOT - former Cameroonian international striker, Samuel Eto'o, was elected President of the organisation.



The Cameroon national football team represents Cameroon in men's international football.

The team is nicknamed the 'The Indomitable Lions.'

The team has qualified eight times for the FIFA World Cup, more than any other African team (in 1982, 1990, 1994, 1998, 2002, 2010, and 2014. However, the team has only made it once out of the group stage. They were the first African team to reach the quarter-final of the FIFA World Cup in 1990, losing to England in extra time. They have also won **five Africa Cup of Nations** and **Olympic gold in 2000**.

The team represents Cameroon both in FIFA and Confederation of African Football (CAF).

The country's most capped player is **Rigobert Song**, with 137 international caps. Song is currently the nation teams manager. Aside from Zinedine Zidane, Song is the only player to have been sent off in two different World Cups, once against Brazil in 1994 and against Chile in 1998. He also holds the record as the youngest player ever to be sent off in a World Cup, aged 17.

The nation's record goalscorer is **Samuel Eto'o** with 56 goals from 118 appearances.



Lucas Hernandez – French centre-back who when moving from Atletico Madrid to Bayern Munich became the club's and Bundesliga's most expensive ever signing, for €80 million



The Championnat du Cameroun de football (also known as MTN Elite One since 2007 for sponsorship reasons) is the top division of association football in Cameroon, governed by the Cameroonian Football Federation since its establishment in 1961.



Coton Sport Football Club de Garoua, or simply Coton Sport, is based in Garoua and with 16 league titles, are the most successful domestic side in the league, above second-placed Canon Yaoundé with 10 league titles

Roger Milla is perhaps the most famous of Cameroonian footballers. He started his career at the famous academy of Dynamo Beervelde. He was one of the first African players to be major stars on the international stage. He played in three World Cups for the Cameroon national team.

He achieved international stardom at 38 years old, an age at which most forwards have retired, by scoring four goals at the 1990 FIFA World Cup and thus becoming the oldest goalscorer in World Cup history. He helped Cameroon become the first African team to reach the World Cup quarter-finals. Four years later, at the age of 42, Milla broke his own record as the oldest goalscorer in World Cup by scoring against Russia in the 1994 FIFA World Cup.

Milla is also remembered for his trademark goal celebration of running to the corner flag and performing a dance.

To date, there have been 31 Cameroon players to play in the Premier League, with a variation of success.

Those with distinguished Premier League CVs would arguably be Lauren, Joseph-Desire Job (most goals), Geremi, Alex Song, and Joel Matip.

Honourable mention to Marc-Vivien Foe, who was a Manchester City player at the time of his death, in 2003.

#### The ADIDAS F50

The launch of the Adidas F50 in 2004 was the start of a very long journey for the German sports giant. To this day new F50 designs are still released. Looking at the early releases here in black and yellow, and black and white, it's impossible not to picture the likes of Ashley Cole, Robin Van Persie, or Arjen Robben styling these versions. The concept of hiding boot laces was trending, and the F50 made this option look pretty cool. Added to this there were various colour combinations that would work perfectly with some kit designs, it was an instant hit.

Then in 2006, the F50 seemed to be on the boot all of the big players featuring at the German World Cup, namely all the German internationals! The shiny look to this version again with the hidden laces worked well, and also showed the brand's three stripes as a more dominant feature.

Then came Lionel Messi. The F50 now associates itself with one of the greatest ever players to grace the football pitch. In 2009 Messi scored in a Champions League final and celebrated by kissing his boot that had come off whilst scoring. The boot was of course the F50.

### TREATMENT ROOM

#### **Finger Dislocation**

Finger dislocation is a common injury. It occurs when the bones of the finger are moved (dislocated) from their normal position. A dislocated finger can occur in any of the joints of any finger, but it occurs most often in the middle knuckle of the little, ring, middle, or index finger.

#### **Causes of a Dislocated Finger**

A dislocated finger is caused by a "jamming" force being applied to the end of the finger, or the finger may be forcefully overextended. Either of these situations or a combination of both can result in a dislocation. For example:

- During sports activities, a basketball or baseball may strike the tip of an outstretched finger.
- Your finger might get caught in equipment such as a game jersey or pads.
- You might fall onto your outstretched hand.

#### Symptoms of a Dislocated Finger

A dislocated finger is usually obvious. The finger appears crooked, swollen and is very painful. It may be bent upward or at strange angles. You probably won't be able to bend or straighten the finger if it is dislocated. Also:

- Numbness or tingling with a severe dislocation.
- The injured finger may appear a pale colour.
- The dislocation may cause a break in the skin
- If this occurs, you should get medical attention right away.

#### **Finger Dislocation Treatment**

It is not recommended that you treat a finger dislocation at home. A visit to your doctor or the emergency department is usually necessary.

- If you have a dislocated finger, the finger will swell. To prevent further injury to the finger, immediately remove any jewellery, such as rings.
- Apply an ice pack to your injured finger and elevate the hand above the level of your heart

#### **Medical Treatment for a Dislocated Finger**

The doctor may realign the dislocated bones of your finger with a simple technique. This will often require a local anaesthetic injection into the finger to help decrease or stop the pain and allow the doctor to reduce the dislocation and realign the bones. You may also receive medications by mouth, injection, or IV to help the pain and ease the reduction.

#### **Outlook for a Dislocated Finger**

Most simple finger dislocations can be put back into place easily. Full function in the injured finger will usually return. Mild or moderate discomfort or disability can continue for 12-18 months. You may expect some permanent swelling or disfigurement of the injured joint. There is an increased risk of developing arthritis in the joint later.

Occasionally, a fragment of the dislocated joint or some surrounding tissue can become lodged between the displaced bones. This prevents the bones from going into place. Surgery may be necessary to put the bones into the correct position. Results of this surgery are usually very good, but some functionality may be lost.

# The Brazilian League



## Structure explained





The Brazilian football league system is a series of interconnected leagues for football clubs in Brazil. It consists of several independent pyramids, which are the national pyramid and the state pyramids. As these pyramids are independent, clubs usually compete in a state pyramid and a national pyramid. Both the national pyramid and the state pyramids consist of several levels. The best-placed teams in the states championships as well as the best clubs ranked by the Brazilian Football Confederation (CBF) compete in the Copa do Brasil.

### The Structure

There are two simultaneous and independent functioning pyramids in Brazil's football, the national pyramid, and the state's pyramids.

While the national competitions are organized by CBF, the state championships are organized by the respective football federations of each state (for example, the Campeonato Pernambucano is organized by the Pernambuco Football Federation).

The national pyramid competitions start in May and end in December. The state pyramids have varying durations and schedules in each state. In states with clubs competing in the national first and second divisions, the state championships run from January/February to April/May.

### Campeonato Brasileiro Série A

The Campeonato Brasileiro Série A commonly referred to as Brasileirão is a Brazilian the top of the Brazilian football league system,

Contested by 20 clubs, it operates on a system of promotion and relegation with the Campeonato Brasileiro Série B.

Due to historical peculiarities and the large geographical size of the country, Brazil has a relatively short history of nationwide football competitions. Only in 1959, with the advancements in civil aviation and air transport and the need to appoint a Brazilian representative to the first edition of the Copa Libertadores was a nationwide tournament created, Taça Brasil. In 1967, the Torneio Rio-São Paulo was expanded to include teams from other states, becoming the Torneio Roberto Gomes Pedrosa, which was also considered a national tournament. The first tournament downright called a national championship was held in 1971, although it was only referred to as "Campeonato Brasileiro" starting in 1989.

Since 1959, a total of 156 clubs have played in the Campeonato Brasileiro. Seventeen clubs have been crowned Brazilian football champions, thirteen of which have won the title more than once.

Palmeiras is the most successful club in the Campeonato Brasileiro, having won the competition ten times, followed by Santos with eight titles and Corinthians and Flamengo with seven titles. Santos' Os Santásticos won five consecutive titles between 1961 and 1965, a feat that remains unequalled.

The state of **São Paulo** is the most successful state, amassing 32 titles among five clubs.

Winners of Serie A and all the way to 6<sup>th</sup> place teams, and winners of the Copa do Brasil all qualify for the following years Copa Libertadores.





Most states have at least one secondary tournament, involving smaller clubs not in the top two leagues of the national championship.

These lesser championships run from July to December. Besides the trophy, it may award the winner(s) places in the main tournament or in the Brazilian Cup next year.

Smaller states, whose clubs do not take part in national competitions have longer competitions, usually running during the "winter" months: April to October.

### **National League**

In the national pyramid, there are four leagues, the Série A, Série B, the Série C and the Série D. The Série A, Série B and Série C currently consist of 20 teams each. Série D was contested by 40 teams and expanded to 68 in 2016. Série A and Série B are contested in a double round-robin format by all clubs; Série C and Série D have regional groups.


Each year, the four worst-placed clubs in the Série A are relegated to the Série B and the four top-placed clubs in the Série B are promoted to Série A. This relation of four promoted and four relegated is the same for the other levels.

The clubs competing in the Série D are the bottom four from last season's Série C and the best-placed state championship clubs from the previous season which are not competing in the Série A, B, or C.

Clubs that are successful in their state leagues can rise higher in the pyramid, be promoted to the Série D, and eventually to higher levels. Some state federations organize special competitions with the purpose of qualifying teams to the Série D.

Since the national and state pyramids are independent a team can be in a national division and also be in a lower division in the state league in the same season.







### **State Leagues/Championships**

In the state pyramid, which consists of several independent state championships, the participating clubs, which also include Série A, Série B, and Série C clubs, are limited to their own states.

However, there are some minor exceptions, like in the Campeonato Brasiliense, where Unaí from Minas Gerais,

and Luziânia and Bosque Formosa Esporte Clube from Goiás also compete, due to their proximity to Brasília, the capital of the Brazilian Federal District.

The leagues are usually divided into two, three, or four levels. The number of clubs per level, as well as the number of levels, are different in each state. For example, in São Paulo there are 16 clubs in the first level, but in Minas Gerais, there are 12, and in Rondônia, there are just eight clubs.

Also, the number of promoted and relegated clubs is different from one state to the other. Since 2009, the best-placed clubs in the state leagues not already qualified for Série A, B, or C qualify for the Série D.

As the Série A, Série B, and Série C clubs usually have to be seeded to avoid fixture congestion, some rules adopted may be quite unfair. In the 2008 Campeonato Carioca, the big four (Botafogo, Flamengo, Fluminense and Vasco da Gama) always played home against the other participating clubs.

There are currently **27** State championship leagues in Brazil.

Copa do Brasil (like the English FA Cup)

The Copa do Brasil is contested between the winners and best-placed clubs of the previous season's state championships, and by the best-placed clubs in the CBF ranking. Since 2013, it is played between the months of April and November.

# Who is playing against who?

Back again for a Magic Eye XI versus XI this issue, so let's see if you can spot the theme amongst these line-ups.

In this issue, we've put together 2 line-ups, and for each team, there is a common theme. You know the deal with this now.

Perhaps the inclusion of club colours, and the club badges somewhat gives the game away and we'll change tactics to make it more difficult.

The first line-ups are a combination of two European giants of the game. Linked by the great Johan Cruyff, Ajax Amsterdam and Barcelona are often compared due to their style of football, but here we have linked them by playing staff. Cruyff would manage one of the teams, as would Ronald Koeman, but we actually need them both to play, to make up the full 22 players.

One tiny element of artistic license is the inclusion of goalkeeper Andre Onana. He qualifies undoubtedly for the Ajax line-up, but can only claim to have features for the Barcelona youth teams.

The second set of line-ups is less of European giants but very much rivals in their own league, Lique 1 in France.

Before the domination of Lyon and Paris Saint-Germain in the 2000s, the fierce rivals of French football were Monaco and Marseille.

We are able to put together 2 full line-ups of players to have played for both sides during their careers, and I am sure you will agree there are some absolute monsters that appear in the teams.



Matteo Bianchetti – Italian centre back, although on the books of Inter Milan, never made a first-team performance at the club instead spending time at Verona, Spezia, Empoli and Cremonese







Roberto Inglese – Italian striker, currently on the books of Parma, played in the lower Italian leagues with Pescara, Chievo, Carpi and Lumezzane







Scott Malone – English left-back, who represented Huddersfield Town in the Premier League and strong performer in the Championship with Derby County, Fulham, Cardiff City and Millwall







Arsen Zakharyan – Young and very promising Russian midfielder, who at 19 has been voted Dynamo fan's player of the season two years in a row, 2021 & 2022









Bayern Munich recently sowed up their Bundesliga triumph in the 2021/22 season which was their 10<sup>th</sup> league trophy in a row. That is remarkable consistency, even though it could be aimed at the club they are the richest club in the country and often have the pick of the best talent in the country, although in recent years their recruitment has looked outside of Germany.



It got us thinking about who are the clubs with a better run of consecutive league title wins.

Looking close to home, the record of consecutive Premier League wins is only three in a row. This has been achieved twice by just one club, Manchester United (1998-2001 and 2006-2009)

North of the border and in Scotland three '9 in a rows' have been achieved, once by Glasgow Rangers and twice by Celtic. A great statistic is with their latter run, from 2011-2020, midfielder Scott Brown captained the Celtic side in every one of those successful campaigns.

But consecutive wins of 3 and 9 don't touch the sides, and we can go even better than the Bayern Munich achievement of 10.




