The homework help club

Since April of this year we have been running a homework help club at the drop in centre for our secondary school children. This came about to meet the need for the young people to have a place where they could go after school to do their homework before returning home where they are expected to help out, often into the evening when it is then too dark to work. Many of the families do not have electricity and so it is not possible for the children to do school work in the evenings. Our secondary children now come to the drop in centre after school during the week to have lunch and then spend an hour or two completing their homework. Thanks to a generous donation from a church team visiting us this summer we now have a very complete library of Tanzanian cur-




riculum textbooks for the children to use at the homework help club. There is always a member of staff on hand with teaching experience to help the students with any problems and to provide extra tuition on various subjects for any students that want some extra help.



In the future we hope to be able to provide something similar for the older primary school children to give them the best possible chance of achieving the grades they need to be allocated a free place at secondary school.

Rory and Sammy's trip to Iringa:

This summer my wife (Sam) and I had the privilege of working with the FISCH project for two and half weeks at the end of July. It was a thoroughly enjoyable time in which we witnessed the amazing work which God is doing through some highly gifted and generous people living in Iringa. We became involved with the FISCH project very early on in its development as Sam had gone to school with Lissie and the three of us had been involved in the same church for a number of years. After being inspired by the many newsletters and updates that we received regarding the development of the project, we really wanted to get out there ourselves to experience it first hand and to try and serve the guys running the project in whatever way possible.





After arriving in Dar, without our baggage, and enjoying a good night sleep we embarked on the infamous bus ride to Iringa. We were both immediately struck with the beauty of this country, its wildlife and most importantly its people. On arriving in Iringa we felt immediately welcomed with Mote, Rich and the legendary Land Rover that is, 'Hakuna Matata', awaiting our arrival...what a vehicle! During our stay we had the privilege of staying with Mote, Atu and their three boys Simi, Billy and Kasuma. This is such a great family who God is using in wonderful ways to do His work through FISCH. Mote's devotion to God and his knowledge of Him is inspiring and he certainly has the gifting required to lead this project well and deep into the purposes of God. Soon after arrival we were eager to get down to some work!

During our first week with the project, there was another group of guys from the UK also in Iringa working with FISCH. Therefore there was a special week of activity which we did our best to aid in any way possible, playing games and singing mainly! After this week of fun activity passed we settled into helping the team in three main ways.

Helping to organise the FISCH filing systems. From children's files to minutes of staff meetings.

Sam is a biology teacher and so she was using her expertise to aid the development of the new learning centre.

Re-decorating one of the classrooms in the drop in centre and hopefully making it attractive to the children who use the centre.

Due to Sam rudely catching Malaria at the start of our second week, it was down to me to kick off the filing and organising of paperwork. Now for anyone that knows us it is clear that Sam is the neat freak who genuinely, thoroughly enjoys tidying and organising and re-organising whilst I am the one who happily ruins the system whilst being oblivious to the fact that she has indeed created a system... not good! So anyway this was a chance for me to try and redeem myself which I certainly gave my best shot, to what degree of success I suppose can only really be judged by Paul and the guys using the system.

Once Sam was back to full health she embarked on trying to help Joseph and Alex in the learning centre. This involved teaching a few science lessons whilst also trying to give the guys some training in different ways to deliver lessons effectively. She also gave some of the older girls involved in the project some lessons in how to give French Manicures, with the hope that they may be able to use these skills in the future to earn themselves some pocket money.



Once my work was done in creating the world's best filing system, I spent most of my time painting one of the classrooms used for the learning centre and tried to help out with any other jobs which were in need of doing. I also provided a couple of music workshops for some of the older boys involved in the project.

The time we spent with FISCH was certainly a hugely inspiring and humbling experience. The work that is happening in Iringa is truly amazing and we tried our best to support and bless the team there by serving them with the little that we have. We hope and pray that the guys found our stay beneficial and that God empowers them to continue their great work in good health and with lots of success in helping those children in need, to a better future.

- put up a poster of prayer requests somewhere in your church


