Food Parcel Sponsorship Programme



The Food Parcel Sponsorship Programme has been one of our **longest-running ministries** and has affected and blessed so many Children.

Each month a package containing **maize flour, beans, rice, sugar** and **oil** is provided to the family of a sponsored Child. This package not only provides a **decent meal each day** for the Child, but also provides **for their**

family as well. Twice a year, an update report is provided from each Child to each individual Sponsor. Sewing Class Update



The Sewing Class has been running for quite a while now with many Children passing through and learning the skills and techniques needed to become a seamstress or tailor.

Eva, an ex-Street Child, learnt the trade several years ago, built up her experience and skills and now runs the Class, teaching the young ladies and lads each week. She has also been working alongside Paulina, a FISCH Tz Trustee and local Maasai with lots of experience in design, who is coaching Eva in some new designs to include in the classes.

Currently we have **two Sewing Club Students** who are close to completing a 1-year Sewing Course at FISCH, and have succeeded in creating a skirt and dress that looks both **beautiful and intricate!** According to feedback from the Sewing Class, the Students have learned how to make measurements of a customer, to design and make a gown from 8 pieces, a skirt from 8 pieces, trousers, a shirt, and a pencil gown.

Our Team in Iringa try to match the Sewing Students with experienced sewers in the community when they have finished their course, so that they can become more familiar with dealing with the public, marketing, bargaining rates and items, and so on. We very much hope that our two Students will have much success when they graduate the Sewing Class!

Mechanical Vocational Training

An academic education is not for everyone, and so we support some of our FISCH Kids through the Vocational Training Programme. After completing their training, the next step is employment, and we are currently supporting four young men through their Car Mechanic training, by placing them in local garages and assisting them with accommodation. FISCH has provided them with suitable clothing, boots and tools. Recent communications with the Team in Iringa has provided good feedback that the Students are actively involved with their work at the garage and are happy in their placements.

The Vocational Training Programme is the appropriate form of training for more and more FISCH Kids. For this reason, we are hoping to develop a pool of Sponsors who donate regularly into a pool of ringfenced funds which can be utilised to provide the suitable candidates for Vocational Training. Reunification with Family - Thomas' Story



Thomas* is a young lad from the streets who was registered with FISCH back in July 2023. During his time with FISCH he received **counselling**, **food provision**, **clothing**, and **accommodation**. Recently he decided that he was **ready to return home**, and the FISCH Team set about trying to trace his family through the Social Welfare Office of Iringa Municipality.

Fantastically **Thomas' grandmother** was located near the Western border of Tanzania. Thus, on the 24th of August, an epic journey began!

A FISCH Team member accompanied Thomas as he left at 5am to travel by bus across the country, finally arriving in the district by 10pm that evening. The next day a meeting was held with the **Social**Welfare Officer for the district, and after a further 5 hours travel, Thomas arrived at his grandmother's house.

Here, he was received with **great joy** by his grandmother (who dropped the jug she was carrying at the time when she first saw him) and his uncle. There were **smiles all around** as they **embraced their missing Thomas**, with his uncle immediately ringing around to other family members to announce his return.

Thomas' grandmother shared that she **never expected to see her grandson alive again** – after his unexplained disappearance in December 2022, she had reported him missing to the village ward, the local police and the local government. They could not believe Thomas was still alive! They prepared a meal and shared together as a family, and began **making plans for the future** which included Thomas once again – including planning to enrol him into **automobile mechanics training**, following in his uncle and other family members' footsteps.

What an amazing story to share with you, our readers. We'd also like to take this opportunity to thank the FISCH Team for not only tracking down Thomas' family, but assisting and accompanying him in the journey to the village, and of course, the long long journey back to Iringa. What an amazing Team and ministry!



Reunification with Family - Benjamin's Story



Benjamin* had been registered with FISCH since 2019, when he was 15 years old. He was living with his grandmother but **\$he \$truggled to care for him**, so he would come to the FISCH Drop-in-Centre **during college holidays to hang out**.

Benjamin decided to return home to his mother to try and help provide for her, especially as his father abandoned her previously. His intention was to engage in **vecational training** of some sort near to where she lives, as he felt he was honour-bound to return and try to provide for her.

To make this happen, in August the FISCH Team were able to connect with Benjamin's mother and a local garage in the area. His mother was **very happy to have her son back home** again, and was amazed that Benjamin had been granted the opportunity via the FISCH Vocational Training Programme to study Car Mechanics, and to receive support providing **rental accommodation** for him during this time.

One of the Team members went with Benjamin to visit the garage to **confirm his upcoming training**, and to meet the garage owner. The owner requested that Benjamin pay the entrance fee before starting to train, and to have his equipment (toolbox, tools, overalls and boots) ready. Benjamin did not have these items or the finances to fund them, so our Team Member explained to the garage owner how FISCH was supporting the Street Children through the Vocational Training Programme. We invited the garage owner to take on Benjamin as a way of supporting FISCH and **giving back to the community**, until such a time as we could provide the funding for his training. The garage owner agreed to this, and so Benjamin was kitted out and able to **start training** immediately!

We hope to keep you updated with Benjamin's progress in his training in future editions of the FISCH Food. **Watch** this space!

School Meal Contribution

Noel is another vulnerable young boy who has been benefiting from Educational Support since 2021. He comes from a very poor family who struggled to provide him with adequate food, and life was so hard for the family that his mother decided to move back in with her parents. Consequently, Noel's walk to school now takes over an hour each way. It's brilliant that Noel continues to go to school despite the long hike twice a day, but it did add an extra difficulty to his day to day life no lunch. The school Noel attends does provide lunch meals but Noel's family was unable to afford these, and it was not practical for Noel to walk home to share a small lunch with his family... so he was enduring the whole day without any food until that evening after he'd walked the hour plus home after school. Unsurprisingly, Noel was finding it difficult to focus on his studies. When FISCH discovered this extra difficulty in his life, we agreed to pay the school meal contribution to help him focus and provide him with a decent meal each day during school hours. This simple blessing has been transformative to Noel's school life, and we are so pleased for him. Getting a good education opens doors for these Children to achieve a better lot for themselves in life and increases the chances of them becoming self-sustaining in the future, so we are really pleased to have been able to help Noel in this small way to continue in his studies.



A Cycling Fundraiser



Samuel, his dad Rob, his uncle and cousin (James and Jude) decided they wanted to ride from Bramley to Brighton for fun. Samuel thought it could be a good opportunity to get sponsored and raise money for FISCH so that's what he did! He created a Just Giving page and raised around £300 from generous supporters.

The ride went really well with no-one falling off and no punctures! They completed the **43-mile** ride in **4:20hours** and arrived looking as fresh as when they'd started and immediately went to the arcades!
