Health Insurance Provision



In Tanzania, health care isn't free. If you can't pay, you won't be seen by a doctor or treated for any illness or injury. The Team in Tanzania are able to give First Aid and the Drop-in-Centre carries basic medical supplies, but beyond this, a nurse or doctor is required. Wonderfully, this year, in large part to a hugely generous donation from a Friend of FISCH named David, we have been able to provide Health Insurance for an amazing 420 Children! The Children at the Short-Term Accommodation, those who are Food Parcel Beneficiaries, and those who join us for Breakfast and Lunch Projects, are all covered if they need to go to hospital and receive medical services. This could make a huge impact to the lives of some of these Children let's hope they never need to go to a hospital, but if there is a need, praise God that they now have the means to do so! FISCH Church and Easter Celebrations

Elijah's Reunification with Family





Elijah* is one of the Children who had been living in the Short-Term Accommodation at FISCH's Drop-in-Centre. During his time there he attended the FISCH Sewing Class and after a year completed his Certificate. In addition to this training, the FISCH Team provided regular counselling and life-skills education, and began the process of tracing his family. After many months of hard work, in partnership with the local Government Social Welfare Department, and in line with Elijah's own wishes, our Social Workers were able to approve the transfer of Elijah to live with a relative.

The journey itself involved several hours of travel, after which Elijah, together with FISCH Social Worker Gasper and the local Social Welfare Officers, were able to meet with his Aunt. She was very happy to see him after almost two years! She stated, "Thanks everyone who made this happen, as well as the FISCH UK Team for your support to him and for FISCH Tanzania as well".

The Food Parcel Sponsorship Programme

The Food Parcels are an integral part of our ministry and impact in Iringa. These aren't just sacks of maize flour we are giving out to Children - we are giving their families essential nutrition via wholesome meals. which allows the Children and their families to focus on other pursuits, such as education or paid work, or helps keep families together, because there is enough food to go around. Each month we provide many, many Food Parcels to grateful families, and it is a pleasure to do so. Each Food Parcel costs each sponsor £24.50 a month, and provides 25kg of maize flour, 3kg beans, 5kg rice, 1kg sugar and 1 litre of oil. Noah's Reunification with His Brother

Noah* is another of our Children who have benefitted from the **Short-Term Accommodation** and fantastically has moved **back in with family**. He was born in 2006 and has a brother, both of whom were raised by their grandmother, as his father sadly abandoned his mother who suffered from mental illness. Due to the challenge of growing up in a struggling home, Noah did not complete his primary education studies and **left school early**. At age 13, he left the family home and moved in with other relatives, but he was not well cared for, so he ran away to the city of Iringa and began **sleeping on the streets**. He remained living on the streets for almost two years, before taking the opportunity to move into FISCH safe accommodation at the Drop-in-Centre, and was also supported by FISCH with Vocational Training in Motor Mechanics....

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Noah Continued...

Having recently graduated, he is now gaining experience working in a local garage.

Noah had developed a lot of self-reliance and determination in his life, as a consequence of his younger years, but we were keen to reunite Noah with his family. His elder brother was located by the FISCH Team, and after discussions his older brother was happy to welcome him back into a sibling relationship and to then oversee Noah in his ongoing path of life. In partnership with the Municipal Social Welfare Officer, Noah was re-united with his brother, and he is starting his new life. FISCH helped Noah to sort his basic needs, including renting a room, and will continue to keep in contact with him, encouraging him and assisting him where necessary so he can continue to move forward, bettering his life and circumstances.

What a great testimony to hear! Please do pray for Noah to continue in his progress, both relationally and also in his mechanics training.

Vocational Training: Why?



It's not always appropriate for Children to continue in academic channels of education, and so Vocational Training (VT) continues to be an important avenue of education following on from early formal education to our FISCH Children. It is a source of skill and character development and many of our Vocational Students complete their course and go on to have gainful employment utilising their skills. This gives them the opportunity to become self-sufficient and contribute to society – and to be a source of inspiration for any Street Children following in their footsteps.

Vocational Students live **with family** in the local area or at the FISCH **Short-Term Accommodation**. Courses available can include carpentry, motor mechanics, sewing training, driving qualifications, hotel management, building construction, hairdressing and beauty, welding, and sofa construction.

The Tanzanian Team are in regular contact with the Vocational Students, both during their training and afterwards, to see how the Students are getting on and what challenges they might be facing. The Team will help Students to seek employment, helping with online job searches, CVs, applications and preparation for job interviews.

VT: Visit To Vocational Training College

Recently two members of the Team, **Erasto** and **Emeliana**, visited **VETA** (Vocational Education and Training Authority) College to visit some of our Vocational Students who are working and studying there. After conversing with the Students and their teachers, it sounds as if **all four of them are doing well!** Erasto and Emiliana also had the opportunity to meet with the VETA College Principal, who sends his greetings and thanks to all FISCH Teams and Supporters.

Bahati and **Daniel** are training in Welding, with a further year training ahead of them.

Salimu is studying a Carpentry course, with a further year of studying ahead of him.

Haruni is studying a 2 year Certificate in Motor Mechanics.







From Vocational Training to Employment



It's wonderful to see the Students thriving in their training, but another joy entirely to see them progress from education to employment! Here we share how some of our Students have moved successfully into the world of work...

Msando was supported through the VT Fund to attend a course in Construction at a local sugar company, which has included training for large equipment such as CAT diggers! (see picture below) The VT Fund covered the costs of his training and also his living expenses during this time. He has now completed his training at the Kagera sugar company and has since applied for a job at a company in Iringa and constructs irrigation systems for farms. We are thrilled to share that Msando got the job! He is currently working through a paid probationary period, and if all goes well he will be provided with a permanent contract and better pay. Amazing! Well done Msando!

Eunice (below right) was supported by a FISCH Sponsor through her Diploma in Forestry, which she completed in August 24. She has recently found a volunteer job in Amani Forestry, a government reserve in the Tanga region. As part of this volunteer job she receives accommodation and meals, plus a small payment each month.

Edson's graduation from his Carpentry Certificate was featured in the last FISCH Food. He is now enjoying being employed and paid for his work

<u>Two of our Vocational Students</u> have completed their Motor Mechanics courses and negotiations with two local garages means that they are both happily employed now. They both enjoy their work and express their gratitude for the help they have received.

One of our earliest Vocational Students, **Novarth**, started as a beneficiary of the Food Parcel Scheme, finished his basic academic education, completed a vocational training course, and is enjoying working in a city as a loans officer in a microfinance business. Although he isn't employed in his field of training, the Vocational Training gave him a real sense of purpose and self-worth, which is a success in itself!
