School Uniform Provision Update

January is one of the busiest times of year for our team in Iringa because it is the time when we distribute uniform and stationery to those Children who otherwise would not be able to attend school – the earlier stages of schooling in Tanzania is free, but the cost of required supplies such as uniform, textbooks, pencils, etc, can be prohibitive. Many of these items such as the uniforms are made by graduates from our Sewing Class, some of whom are running their own micro businesses.

Thank you so much to those of you who give regularly to this cause! It's a cliché but education is so valuable, and it is essential for helping these Children to one day becoming self-sufficient and working their way out of poverty. At FISCH we believe in changing lives from the roots up, and education is one the biggest ways we can achieve this.

Thanks to your support we have been able to distribute uniforms to **over 300 FISCH Kids** once again this year! We are still reliant on large one-off donations for this annual need. A Visit to Iringa




In November 2021 Rich Gercke, Co-Founder of FISCH Tz and Chairman of FISCH UK took the opportunity to visit Iringa and catch up on how things were getting on. This is what he shares about his time out there...

It feels like an age ago now, but back in November I grabbed the opportunity for a quick visit to Iringa after the UK Government had relaxed the travel regulations. It was the first chance I had to visit since Covid, and I was delighted to be joined by Chris How, a member my Church here in Guildford, and long-time supporter of FISCH.

Although I am in constant communication with the Tanzanian team, receiving photos, videos and discussing operations on a weekly basis, there is nothing quite like being on the ground itself, meeting with people, laughing with people, praying with people.

I was struck by just how much FISCH has grown even in the last couple of years; the scale of what we are now doing in Iringa, the many different programs, the number of Children we are helping. FISCH really has become part of the fabric of life for so many Children and their families. It has become a real community, with a history, a heart and a vision.

Since FISCH began in 2007 we have registered over 1,000 Children, and each of them are now at a different point in their journey. Standing in the FISCH Drop-in-Centre I could see newly-registered Kids lining up for lunch, whilst in a different room Children who preparing to join Secondary School were being taught Science by Promina, one of our FISCH Kids from the past who has recently graduated from University. In the next room a class of 9 students sat at their sewing machines, eager to show me the new skills they had learnt, and to take my measurements for a shirt they would later give me as a leaving gift.

I met with Gennis and Clalence, two of the very first Children FISCH helped in 2007 when I was living there. Gennis is hoping to begin Pastor training, and Clalence to begin a new Feeding Project with his local community in Zanzibar. To be there with these guys and others closer to independence such as Aloyce (another FISCH University Student) and converse in English, having seen them progress on their journey for so many years, was truly special!

I could tell you so much more, but to summarise, I was very encouraged by the wonderful work our team are doing in Iringa, and I want to thank all of you readers and supporters for contributing over the years to grow our work to this point.

As always when I visit, I am left feeling both delighted at what is being achieved, but desperate to do more, and it's clear to me that we have probably reached a ceiling in terms of what we can achieve with the current level of resources. When we started FISCH we had a clear vision of what we wanted to achieve, and I can say that we have not yet reached that level. We have plans to build a vocational training centre and a short term rehabilitation centre, and as those of who read these newsletters will know we have taken the first steps toward that with the purchase of 9 acres of land.

There is still a long way to go, and my prayer now is for increased regular financial resources to grow and upskill the team in Tanzania, both to consolidate what we have achieved and to enable us to build capacity to reach the next level.

Thank you for being a part of this. It is exciting to think there is still so much more we can do together to make a difference!





Back HomeWhere possible FISCH aims to re-integrate Street

Children back into family life. FISCH will help provide Food Parcels for those families who just can't feed their kids, or will provide the fees or equipment for school so that the children are able to go.

Sometimes we provide counselling for broken relationships within the home. Last year a total of 34 Kids were re-integrated back into family homes. The most recent Kids include; Grand, Bahati, Zabron and Patrick. Please pray that they continue to

settle into family life after their time on the Streets.





New Partnership - Salt & Light Coaching SALT&LIGHT



We are delighted to share an exciting new opportunity that is arising as a result of a new partnership between FISCH and Salt & Light Leadership Coaching. This company was founded by Jon Bircher, a member of St Saviours Church, with a purpose of developing and coaching leaders.

Jon has built his company on core values that include love, service and sacrifice, even embedding these into the company's sales targets by pledging to donate a percentage of revenue to support our work! What an incredibly inspiring way to run a business!

Our intention is to use these donations specifically to develop a growing need at FISCH. For many years we have invested in vocational training courses for FISCH Kids for whom the normal education system is no longer appropriate. In addition to this we have trained a number through our own sewing class at the FISCH Drop-in-Centre. With more and more Kids becoming skilled there is a real need to help them into employment, and where appropriate to set up their own small micro-enterprises.

We have been doing this over the years, but as our charity has grown this need has also significantly grown. With this new partnership we now hope to be in a position to do this on a larger scale, and have begun a recruitment process to appoint a new member to our Team in Tanzania with a specific focus on vocational training placement, student support, micro-enterprise training and career advising. We see this very much as a natural step of growth for the charity as more and more FISCH Kids complete education and need support into employment to become fully independent. Please do pray for this area as it evolves in the coming months.

Our Sewing Class has been growing over the last couple of years under the tutelage of Eva, an ex-FISCH Child who we trained and helped to establish her own micro-business some years ago. The Class is thriving, so much so that during Rich's visit last November a big celebration was held for the 7 FISCH Kids who have completed their training and 'graduated'. It was a very special event with over 300 Children and adults from the FISCH Community in attendance! The next step for these Graduates is to begin their own micro-business, something that FISCH will be supporting them with, as we have done so with others in previous years.
