## **Grace and Aloyce's Graduation**

Two of our university Students, Aloyce and Grace, graduated at the end of last year. To celebrate, a small party was held at the DiC, with a shared meal, cake and a karaoke! Grace achieved a Diploma in Community Development, and Aloyce graduated from his Degree course with 2.1, also in Community Development

### Aloyce's story

Aloyce is the youngest of seven children in his family, and his father passed away when he was a young boy. Life was hard, and his mother was unable to care for all her children, so Aloyce and his siblings were cared for by their grandparents. Sadly, a few years later his mother also passed away. Aloyce remained with his grandparents, who sold mousetraps and beer to support themselves. Unfortunately, within a few more years both his grandparents died, leaving the siblings alone and to fend for themselves.

FISCH began to support Aloyce when he was 14 whilst he was at Primary School, and this continued through Secondary School. His favourite subjects were English, Biology and History. He also took on various jobs around Iringa to help his sister in providing for his siblings.

Since 2011, Aloyce regularly attended the **Saturday Feeding Project** where he received a **good meal** once a week. He got involved with leading the Sunday Bible lessons at FISCH Church, and prior to starting college he took part in the **Youth Club** and the **After School Club**.

Losing his parents and grandparents within a several years of each other was a traumatic experience for Aloyce. Wonderfully he began to see the Team and Children at FISCH **as a new family to him**.

Aloyce **grabbed the opportunity** to better his life. He was accepted into university and FISCH was able to connect him with a **Sponsor** to support him through his Degree. He graduated with a **Bachelors** in Community Development achieving a **2:1** through his hard work, and as you can see from the photos, he looks rather pleased with himself! And so he should!

Aloyce is a joyful example to the Children as to what can be achieved with perseverance when the opportunity comes their way. Aloyce has gone from a Street Child to a Student to a Graduate who can now being to support himself and his family and become self-sufficient. We thank God for the opportunity to be part of his story, and we hope Aloyce will inspire other Street Children to dare for more in life.

DC Kessy took a tour of the Drop-in-Centre and was able to witness the work of the Sewing Club first hand, plus interact with many of the Children.

Since this visit, the local government has been very keen to **help** promote the work we are doing and **work**together with us to tackle the challenges these Children face. They are also keen to assist individuals

FISCH have trained or sponsored through University and Vocational Training into employment, which we
hope will open up a number of opportunities!

This is a wonderful testament to the developing relationship between FISCH and the local authorities.

This year, FISCH were invited to participate in some of the community activities taking place. After helping to tidy the grounds of the local hospital together with other organisations and groups, the Children were treated to enjoy a breakfast chicken soup with goat meat provided by the government.



## Voluntary Walk Against Gender-Related Violence

In December some of the Children and Team from FISCH took part in a voluntary walk through the Streets of Iringa in support of the prevention of gender-based violence. They crafted a banner and they joined the procession which ended up at the Samora football stadium, where talks were given to the crowds. The Kids banner reads; "Invest in preventing gender-based violence".



### Jerry's Story\*

Jerry is a FISCH Kid whom we managed to successfully reunite with his grandmother last year.

Jerry's mother sadly abandoned him and his siblings with his grandmother, and his father had a new life with a new wife where Jerry was not welcome. His elderly grandmother **struggled to provide** for the grandchildren and herself, scratching a living from washing clothes in the village for **little money** every few days, as her health complications prevent her from other work. **Meals were irregular**, and some days didn't occur at all. His bed was a small old mat that he shared with his siblings. The situation was pretty dire. Jerry came to Iringa in search of a better life, but **ended up on the streets**, hardly better off.

Jerry registered with FISCH and in time the Team set about trying to reunite him with his grandmother and to arrange support for her and the other children. Contact was made with the District Social Welfare Officer and Jerry and a FISCH Team member set off for a two day trip back to Jerry's village. On the first leg of the trip, the bus was so full Jerry wasn't able to gain a seat, and so sat on an upturned bucket for most of the journey! However, the journey was a success, with Jerry and the FISCH Team member arriving safely at his grandmother's house late in the evening. However, before counselling and family resolutions could occur, it was discovered that Jerry's siblings and grandmother had not eaten anything that day, so food was obtained from the village and a meal was prepared first. A new mattress for the bed was also purchased.

The District Social Welfare Officer met with them at their home and arranged for Jerry's grandmother to be enrolled in a programme to help support her and the family, and also started the process of getting Jerry in to some sort of **vocational training**.

Since then the FISCH Team have continued to monitor Jerry's situation, along with the District Social Welfare Officer, and **fantastically he has settled back** in to life with his grandmother well. He has also been offered a place on a **training cours** which FISCH is funding, and we are so glad to be able to offer Jerry the chance of a **better life**, and that for his family too. Please do keep Jerry, his siblings and his grandmother in your prayers.

#### More News in Numbers

- 81 the number of school uniforms provided to Children in January, when the academic year started. Without uniforms, Children would be unable to attend school, so they are an essential provision for any Child aspiring to continue their education.
- 3 the number of Kids who have moved out from the Short-Term Accommodation at the DiC and are now living safely and independently. Their beds have been filled with three Children previously living on the Streets.
- 16 the number of Children **resident in the Short-Term Accommodation**; 6 are in vocational training, one has begun an apprenticeship and 1 an internship.
  - 12 the length in hours of the bus ride that took Atuswile and a FISH Team member to a centre in another city that will provide **education**, **accommodation and food**. Atuswile was initially supported at FISCH over the last few years due to her family situation and has now moved on to a new start in life.





#### The Annual Christmas Craft Stall at St Saviours

Every year St Saviours Church in Guildford host the Christmas Market, and over the last few years the Craft group at the church come together to create dozens and dozens of homemade items suitable for Christmas gifts. Last year was no exception! The Group made lavender jam, chutneys, keyrings, marmalades and more, and raised over £600 towards the work at FISCH! The Group also had leaflets about FISCH to hand, to share the great news about where the funds raised was going, and what impact it would have.
