NEW\$FLA\$H: The New District Commissioner for Iringa Congratulates FI\$CH for its Excellent Service

Recently the Honourable Iringa District Head, Comred James, congratulated FISCH "for the great and good work done by the Centre for the care of children living in difficult environments," according to his Instragram page!

Comred James spoke on the activities running at FISCH, particularly **distribution of food to families** of Children living in difficult circumstances, and states that every child in the community deserves a good education and all the basic services so that they can grow and flourish. "Therefore", he said, "**the work**

done by FI\$CH to provide education, upbringing and basic needs of these Children deserves to be supported."

Comred James then helped with the distribution of the Food Parcels to the parents of sponsored Children, and asked the parents to help monitor the Children's progress at school, and to encourage good cooperation with the FISCH Team.

Among other things, the Honourable Head also asked the local community to build a **culture of supporting** the effort of social institutions such as FISCH, in terms of money and resources, in order to increase the help offered to the Children, so that they would have better lives. What a positive visit from the District Commissioner!



The Learning Centre

At FISCH, once a Child has been registered and their situation has stabilised, we work with the Child to encourage them to **start or renew their education**. This could be through vocational training, but it is often through school. In Tanzania government education in the early years is free from school fees; however, there are **hidden barriers** for many Children living close to the poverty line. These include the cost of uniforms, school shoes, exercise

books, textbooks, and even pens and pencils. Recently the Team have been focusing on the Children living at the Short-Term Accommodation (STA), providing them with a daily learning structure and knowledge as they prepare for the next stage of their journey, whether that be schooling, vocational training or simply reuniting with family. These Children are particularly vulnerable, so this is a great way to focus on this

group of Children with no other support to rely upon. Here you can see the Children utilising the Learning Centre, enjoying studying together and giving themselves **better opportunities in life**.



African Child Day

Each year on June 16th, Tanzania and other countries in the African Union celebrate **The Day of the African Child**. It is held to commemorate the **student uprising in Soweto**, 1976. At that time, students marched protesting the poor-quality education they received, and demanding to be taught in their own languages, not in Afrikaans, in apartheid South Africa. During the protest, tragically **hundreds of school children were killed**. The Day of the African Child is celebrated to **remember these children** and the brave actions they took to defend their rights, and to inspire a **sober reflection** on the challenges that children face in Africa on a daily basis.

The Children and Team at FISCH joined in with the **public parades and walks** to celebrate African Child Day, promoting and supporting **children's rights and welfare** across the continent. The Children had a lot of fun during the walk through the Streets of Iringa.



Food Parcel Sponsorship Scheme — Co-ordinator Handover

Our Food Parcel Scheme started running over 6 years ago and in that time we have supported over 70 Children with regular monthly food parcels of **maize flour, beans, rice, sugar and oil** (for £24.50 per month – check out <u>gofisch.org/food-parcel-sponsorship</u> for more info.) Not only do the Children benefit from regular reliable nutrition, but the **Child's family are also blessed**. With a daily decent meal, both Children and family are freer to concentrate on education or work.

A Food Parcel is quite a **personal way of supporting** a Child at FISCH. Our Sponsors are partnered with a Child in need of food support, and each Sponsor knows that their financial contribution is specifically supporting that Child and family. Twice a year the Sponsor receives an update from the Team at FISCH, detailing how their sponsored Child is getting on, and sometimes with a message from the Child themselves. All this co-ordination takes effort, and the Food Parcel Sponsorship Programme has been faithfully helmed by one of our long-standing FISCH UK Team members, **Sarah Maguire**.

Sarah and her husband Roy visited the Project for the first time in 2012, returning several years later for a second visit, but since that first trip she has been involved with FISCH and volunteered to oversee the Scheme. Through this time Sarah has **liaised with the FISCH Team**, **collated reports** on the Children and also **liaised with our Supporters**, keeping them informed and in the loop when things changed, such as when the currency exchange rates affected what we could purchase for the Kids in the packages, or when a Child was (fantastically!) no longer in need of a Food Parcel, becoming self-supporting through the ministrations of FISCH.

We now share that **Sarah is stepping down from her role** as Food Parcel Co-Ordinator after many years of faithfully serving the Children of FISCH, the Sponsors around the world, and of course, God Himself. It is with deep gratitude and appreciation that we would like to say a huge and public **Thank yea!** to Sarah, and we are pleased to know that she will be staying part of the greater FISCH Family as a Trustee of the Charity.

With this being said, it is time to introduce the new Co-Ordinator who will be taking over from Sarah Maguire... **Sarah Farrah!** Sarah F has a passion for Africa, and has visited several countries in East Africa in various mission trips. She also visited the Project back in 2012 and witnessed FISCH in action, and is now joining the Team to oversee the continuing great work of the Food Parcel Sponsorship Scheme.

Vocational Training Update

The Vocational Training Scheme is running nicely! For some Children, classroom education is not the best way forward for them. Many Children prefer instead to **learn a trade on the job**, and so for these Kids we try to provide a vocational education for them. Examples of courses that have been studied include Motor Mechanics, Hairdressing and Beauty, Driving skills, Sofa-making, Carpentry and Welding, among others.

As more Children are choosing to follow the Vocational path, we are looking to develop **more support** for these young men and women. To this end Liz of the UK Team is developing a pool of Sponsors who help to support the Vocational

Training Students through financial support. Currently, we have **20 Students** who are on various vocational courses who live with families or in the FISCH Short-Term Accommodation, and **7 Students** who have completed their course and are in the process of moving into paid work, or are already employed.

Whilst on their courses, the FISCH Team in Iringa keep in touch with the Students to see how they are progressing and help them with any challenges. Once

the course has been completed the Team work with the Students to seek employment, helping with online job searches, CV production, applications and preparation for job interviews. Some Students seek help with setting up their own small enterprises which FISCH considers based on approval of a business plan, although funds are limited in this area – however, we have had success with Neto, whom you may remember from a previous FISCH Food edition (Summer 2022).
