Janet Nortrom's Interests Know No Boundaries

When it comes to reaching out to help others, no one is more involved than Janet Nortrom.

This is the second in a series of stories about Soroptimist members whose charitable instincts go far beyond the boundaries of SI Milwaukee into a variety of activities to help others. It is inspired by the latest award Janet received, this time from the United Nations.

On May 4, with Marlowe Nortrom, her husband of 59 years by her side, Janet was presented with Global Educator Award by the United Nations Association of the United States of America, Greater Milwaukee Chapter. Janet has been a teacher at Milwaukee Area Technical School for nearly 30 years and is currently conducting a program for recovering women prisoners. But her interests and influence stretch far beyond the classroom.

"My biggest concern right now is climate control and the environment. If we don't get the air cleaned up nothing else will matter," she told the gathering. Janet has had leadership roles in the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, The Interfaith Conference of Greater Milwaukee, and the American Association of University Women as well as active roles in the Shorewood Women's Club and the League of Women Voters. She is especially proud of receiving the Frank P. Zeidler Award for her efforts to promote social justice, literacy, voter education and the environment and the Unitarian Universalist's Clara Barton Award given for promoting justice and equity for women and girls. She also was recently named a Shorewood Great Citizen.

As a U.N. envoy she has helped bring officials from the United Nations to Milwaukee and she says she is stimulated by seeing where she can help bring about change. As part of this she doesn't just talk the talk, she walks the walk, traveling to Washington for Million Woman Marches, and marches to stop gun violence and support Planned Parenthood. She's also been known to slip out of SI Milwaukee meetings just a bit early so she can get to local protests on time. With all the world's problems, Janet maintains her hope for a better future.

"I wouldn't be able to get up in the morning if I didn't believe I could help bring about change by collaborating with those around me," she said. Her mantra, Speak Up, Stay Involved.

Soroptimist International President's Appeal Update

Thank you to the members of Soroptimist International of the Americas for your contributions of \$153,987.65 to The Soroptimist International's, President's Appeal, Women, Water and Leadership. Total donations have almost reached \$350,000 as of March 31, 2019.

SI Jakarta together with SISWP proposed the fourth project of the President's Appeal. "Indonesia Earthquake Recovery through Water, Shelter and Capacity Building". The main aim of this two-year project will be to improve the lives of the women in Rebuk Satu, Rembitan, central Lombok, by providing them with clean water, WASH facilities, community awareness programs, and access to vocational educational programs on a range of subjects designed to provide them

with income generating skills. By the end of the two years, it is envisaged that sustainable practices will already be in place, ensuring a higher standard of living for Rebuk Satu, with women playing leading roles in water management, and income generating activities. The two year project will be taken over by Soroptimist International of Southwest Pacific at the end of the current President's Appeal.

SI Chicago members prepared extensively, including training from a Human Resource expert. We used portions of the SIA curriculum but modified and added at least 50% new materials. This will be available on the Midwestern Region web site. We had a corporate sponsor, Wintrust Bank, who printed all our materials and provided notebooks for 60. This saved us approximately \$500.

The evaluations were extremely positive. The girls appreciated the examples of workplace experiences related by our members and requested more.

The teacher asked us to come back twice in the next school year and the bank said they would provide more funding in the future.

Hello,

Well, I'm thinking of a kit distribution for 2020 in India!!!! I'd love to take a group of women (6-10) to come along and be a part of this life-changing experience. I'm just in the thinking, very early planning stages, but am in contact with an organization in India that will facilitate our experience. India Someday specializes in cultural immersion trips. They also have numerous contacts with organizations who will facilitate kit distribution. They can provide translators if needed. They will take care of ALL LOGISTICS for both kit distribution and travel. We will travel as a small group but this will not be a standard tour of India!

It will not be a luxury trip but neither will it be a low budget trip—- an average budget in India really is more than adequate to provide great accommodations, transportation, and local guide services.

Just a brief outline:

- ~Travel to India for 16 days (2 days of travel and 14 in India) ~Immerse yourself in Indian culture, local food, and really get to experience India
- ~Distribute kits
- ~See the sights, while getting to know the local people
- ~Stay in locally owned accommodations (comfortable accommodations with all the amenities you would expect)
- ~Transportation within India: maybe flights, train, car. to be determined
- ~Most likely based in Rajasthan and Mumbai

As I mentioned this is just a BRIEF outline to ascertain if there's any interest.

So, if you're remotely interested, please respond ASAP and then when I get more information from India Someday, I'll keep you informed.

Rediscovering the First Woman Film Director (taken from The Auction Exchange May 13, 2019)

Alice Guy-Blache of France was the first female director in film history. She wrote, produced or directed at least 1,000 films before the 1920s. She also became the first woman to head a studio, opening Solax Studios in Fort Lee when the town was the epicenter of American filmmaking earning the equivalent of more than \$1 million per year.

So how come most of us have never heard of Alice Guy-Blache? What happened to her?

She began as a secretary for Gaumont, a Paris company that sold and manufactured cameras. Alice began doing her own filming with permission from her boss Leon Gaumont. A few of her films: The Sticky Woman; The Consequences of Feminism; and The Life of Christ.

Solax Studios left Fort Lee in part due to World War I and the difficulties of filming in winter months. In addition, another problem was that Thomas Edison, the founder of West Orange's Black Maria Studio, began a trust with George Eastman charging fees to use Edison cameras and Eastman Kodak film.

A documentary about the life of Alice Guy-Blache recently premiered in New York, narrated by Jodie Foster and financed by famous backers as Jodie Foster herself, along with Robert Redford and the late Hugh Hefner. The documentary is entitled "Be Natural: The Untold Story of Alice Guy-Blache."

Laurie Jost is a board member and chair of the Human Trafficking Awareness Committee for the Wayne County Medical Society Foundation where she produced the award-winning documentary *Stuck in Traffic - Modern-Day Slavery in Michigan* and is currently producing *Men Who Buy Sex - Modern-Day Predators*. Both documentaries expose the ugly nature of modern-day sex trafficking and

the tragic results that the demand places on individuals and society.

Ms. Jost is a volunteer member of the Southeast Michigan Human Trafficking Task Force and performed foster care viability assessments for Wayne County Court Appointed Special Advocates. She is actively involved and supports the Soroptimist Club of Grosse Pointe, embracing the overall mission to empower girls and women throughout the world.

Friends, Colleagues, and Supporters,

The Wayne County Medical Society Foundation is actively changing views and opinions on human trafficking and sexual exploitation. Our last award winning and highly regarded documentary, Stuck in Traffic - Modern-Day Slavery in Michigan, is being implemented in classrooms and venues across the state of Michigan. It was aimed to educate our young people to the dangers of human trafficking and how to avoid being drawn in. The paradigm is now shifting to the emphasis on men who buy sex, focusing on combating the solicitation and demand for sex. We have made a 10-minute preview of, Men Who Buy Sex. Unless there are meaningful consequences to the "Johns" human trafficking and prostitution will not be impeded. The new video will provide an overview of the problem and make the general public aware that there is an issue. To end the problem the demand must be addressed. The video will be a 50 minute 1st class documentary of Netflix quality. It will be shown to a broad audience including the state legislature. We plan to have a pre and post video evaluation of human trafficking and prostitution included to measure the impact of our work. The cost of the video will be approximately \$185,000. We have already raised a portion of this and with your help, we are certain we can reach this goal. If this effort is successful, it may be one of the most influential activities that the WCMS Foundation has ever undertaken. You can play a crucial role in making this project a reality. We are counting on your support.
