



# Governor's Message

Greetings Soroptimist Fans!

By now, you've all read the Call to Conference. What do you think? I hope you're excited to attend, because I am. This will be my 25<sup>th</sup> conference and I've made it to all but two. In that time, I've made a lot of friends outside of my club and District. If you are new to Soroptimist or maybe new to attending Spring Conference, please avail yourself of the opportunity to meet and get to know other people, you won't regret it. "The sincerity of friendship" is a real thing.

One of our challenges this year, as it is almost every year, is Membership. We talk about it, we email about it, we blog about it, we Tweet about it – you get the idea. Did you see the results of the recent Lapsed Membership Survey from SIA and what do you think?

•Top reasons reported for leaving Soroptimist are: Club functioning (locked in tradition, no orientation, pressure to accept leadership role); Club personality (personality conflicts, did not feel welcome); Asked to give/spend too much money

• Membership and public awareness continue to be most frequently identified as the areas most needing improvement in the club.

• Former members age 25-35 were far more likely to identify networking opportunities as the reason they joined SIA compared to lapsed members overall. When asked why they left SIA, this age group chose "unfulfilling activities" more frequently than respondents in other age brackets.

• The majority of respondents indicated they would join a club again in the future, and this is highest among former members age 35-54.

Note the bit in bold print. Younger members value the ability to network more than older members - which totally makes sense. It was one of the reasons I joined my club at age 29. At 54, it matters less, but it still matters. Midwestern Region is in the midst of a demographic shift in which Millennials will start playing a larger role in leadership positions and I'm hopeful that we'll be able to address this issue in a way that resonates with them and with GenZ. If we want to grow Soroptimist, it will take all of us, from Gen Z to Baby Boomers.

In closing, more of the future. Make sure to check your club's .net email



account for instructions on using Federation's first ever electronic ballot! This should be a huge improvement in managing the election process across all of SIA. Checkout the <u>February Soroptimist Summary</u> for pointers.



# A look at how our Midwestern Region is doing!

Below are the membership goals for all regions and individual clubs:

-<u>1% or better net change in membership</u>

As of January 2020, the Midwestern Region has increased its members from 709 in July 2019 to 737 in January 2020. <u>This is a 3.9% increase</u>. Our region goal is 760 members by May 31, 2020. Only 23 more members are needed!

### • 14% or more new members

As of January 2020, our region has gained 68 new members since July 2019. Our goal to reach 14% more new members for the year is 108 new members.

### • 15% or fewer terminated members

As of January 2020, our region has lost 107 members. In order to stay under 15% terminated members our region cannot lose any more than 115 members this year.

### • Charter more than one new club per region.

Our Region has **not chartered any new clubs yet this year.** However, we do have 2 areas where meetings are being held to start the chartering process: Green Bay, Wisconsin and Western Oakland County, Michigan. If you have any family or friends in these areas that may be interested in joining a Soroptimist Club, please let me know!

**Remember**, in order to increase membership in our clubs, we must all continue to invite guests to our meetings, events and programs to get them interested in what Soroptimists is all about. This really helps to get new members!!

The purpose of International Women's Day is to bring attention to the social, political, economic, and cultural issues that women face, and to advocate for the advance of women within all those areas. As the organizers of the celebration state, "Through purposeful collaboration, we can help women advance and unleash the limitless potential offered to economies the world over." The day is often also used to recognize women who've made significant contributions to the advancement of their gender.

### What colors signify IWD?

Internationally, purple is the color for symbolizing women. Historically the combination of purple, green and white to symbolize women's equality originated from the Women's Social and Political Union in the UK in 1908. Purple signifies justice and dignity. Green symbolizes hope. White represents purity, but is no longer used due to "purity" being a controversial subject.

### History (select portions) of IWD?

On the eve of World War I campaigning for peace, Russian women observed their first IWD on the last Sunday in February 1913. In 1913 following discussions, IWD was transferred to March 8 and this day has remained the global date ever since.

1975- IWD was celebrated for the first time by the United Nations. Then in 1977, the General Assembly adopted a resolution proclaiming a United Nations Day for Women's Rights and International Peace to be observed on any day of the year by Member States, in accordance with their historical traditions.

1996- The UN commenced the adoption of an annual theme.

The world has witnessed a significant change and attitudinal shift in both women's and society's thoughts about women's equality and emancipation.

The unfortunate fact is that women are still not paid equally to that of their male counterparts, women still are not present in equal numbers in business or politics, and globally women's education, health, and the violence against them is worse than that of men.

IWD is an official holiday in many countries. The tradition sees men honoring their wives, mothers, girlfriends, colleagues, etc. with flowers and small gifts. In some countries IWD has the equivalent status of Mother's Day where children give small presents to their mothers and grandmothers.

The IWD 2020 campaign theme is drawn from a notion of "Collective Individualism." We are all parts of a whole. Our individual actions, conversations, behaviors and mindsets can have an impact on our larger society. Collectively, we can make change happen. Collectively, we can each help to create a gender equal world. We can all choose to be **#EachforEqual.**

### Soroptimist International of Dayton

SI Dayton will be hosting a free showing of the film *"I AM JANE DOE"* on March 28<sup>th</sup> at the downtown Dayton Metro Library. The showing runs from 1-3:30 with a panel discussion following the film. *"I AM JANE DOE"* chronicles the battle that several American mothers are waging on behalf of their middle-school daughters, victims of sex-trafficking on Backpage.com, the adult classifieds site that for years was part of the iconic Village Voice.

The Jane Doe plaintiffs who have filed lawsuits against <u>Backpage</u> include middle school girls from Boston, a 15-year-ol violinist from Seattle, and a precocious 13-year-old girl from St. Louis. The documentary follows the journey of these young girls and their mothers in real time as they run headlong into a collision course not only with <u>Backpage</u> but with judges, special interest group, large technology companies, and Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act, an internet freedom law that has been interpreted by federal judges to protect websites which facilitate criminal conduct.

#### BATTLE FOR FREEDOM: DETROIT STYLE By: Erika Repasky

Soroptimist of Trenton Area raises more than \$20,000 to be donated to local human trafficking charities

On January 25th, Soroptimist of Trenton Area held its bi-annual hair and fashion runway competition, Battle for Freedom. The event was held at the Prestige Hall in Allen Park. Nearly 400 guests packed a sold-out venue to enjoy a night of food, drinks, and fashion to support a cause that hits very close to home. According to the National Human Trafficking Hotline, Michigan currently ranks #7 in the nation for human trafficking.

This year, seven salons participated in the Battle for Freedom. Each salon customized their models' looks from head to toe with creations that represented the night's theme: Detroit Style. Guests were treated to artistic representations of popular Detroit locales that included Eastern Market, Greektown, Hart Plaza, and The Detroit Zoo. Also in the mix were creative shout-outs to the Detroit Free Press, the Movement Electronic Music Festival, and The Heidelberg Project.

After the runway show, attendees placed cash votes to support their favorite salon. In a very close match, Aubrey Salon of Riverview walked away with the first-place win. Other salons who participated included Daybreak Salon and Spa, InStinct Salon, Stylezz Ink, Sterling Hair Co., Volume, and Glammed Up Inc. The audience's cash votes raised over \$9,700 in donations.

During Battle for Freedom: Detroit Style, Soroptimist of Trenton Area joined forces with Hope Against Trafficking (HAT), a restorative rehabilitation program for trafficking survivors based out of Pontiac. Soroptimist will be donating 40 percent of the evening's proceeds to HAT. The rest of the funds raised

Also part of the evening's festivities were the basket raffles. The baskets contained goods and services donated by several local businesses as well as citizens of the community. # Soroptimist International Of Downriver Area

# Soroptimist International Fundraising Information

The SIA Fundraising Council (FRC) meet for their annual meeting in Philadelphia October 25 – 27. The group worked diligently to review and analyze FY 18 – 19 results, reviewing FY 19-20 plans and firming up any details that were needed. The FRC is charged by the SIA Board to solicit and attract charitable donations, gifts, sponsorships and bequests in order to support the programs of Soroptimist International of the Americas, and to provide recommendations regarding fundraising in support of the Board's fiduciary responsibilities. The Fundraising Council is a committee of the Board and as such reports to SIA's Board of Directors. The FRC also supports the Region Fundraising Chairs to ensure they have the tools, resources and training to complete their role with impact and confidence.

MWR was well represented at the meeting with Lee Ann Cochran and Diane Thompson.
