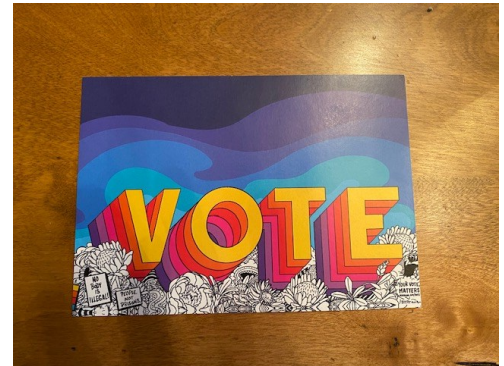

Soroptimists of Grosse Pointe had a record turnout, in September, when we had an opportunity for a Q and A with Dr. Marc Rosenthal. As an emergency room physician and expert in international disaster relief, he has been a frontline doctor in the fight against COVID-19. Our membership still has many questions about this disease and Dr. Rosenthal did a great job of explaining current practices in an understandable way. Thanks to Liz Lucas and Maureen Anthony for suggesting this important topic.

In the spirit of collaboration, Grosse Pointe Soroptimists are giving the League of Women Voters of Grosse Pointe, a hand in a non-partisan “get out the vote” activity. The League, in partnership with the ACLU, is reaching out to people who don’t always participate in the voting process: single women, people of color, and young voters. Each Soroptimist involved in the project is given a list of 25 names and addresses, along with 25 postcards. Each card is addressed, and contains a short message written by the sender. It’s a gentle, positive nudge, always delivered in a non-partisan way. Members agree, it is a fun and easy, no cost project—even the stamps are supplied! So here is a shout out from the Grosse Pointe Soroptimists: Woman suffrage is 100 years old this year. Please thank those women who worked so hard for us and exercise this right by casting your vote.



The Historical Society of Grosse Pointe is selling “scarecrows” as a fund raiser and co-President, Ellen Chapin declared this would be a fun project to raise community awareness of our organization. Every woman’s group in the area is involved in honoring 100 years of woman suffrage so, of course, the scarecrow had to be a Suffragette. 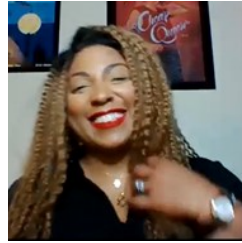
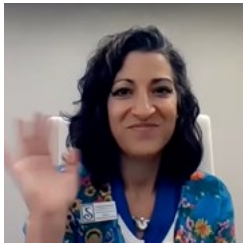
The celebration consisted of a combination of recorded and live presentations of our winners.

**Shelter** – To provide emergency shelter and case management to homeless women in Madison County, Indiana.

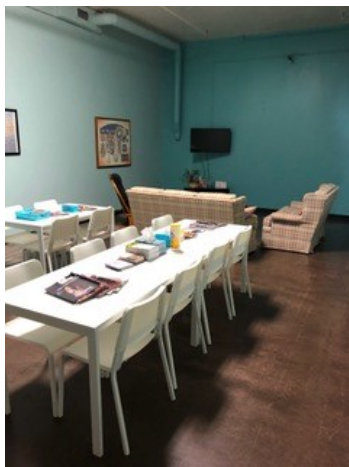
**Community** – Build more effective partnerships with community service providers to help women get back on their feet.

## HISTORY OF VIRGINIA RICHARDSON

As we approach our Soroptimist 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary, all Soroptimists should know about the founder and first president, Violet Richardson Ward.

Taken from the book: Violet Richardson Ward  
Founder-President of Soroptimist By: Lillian Estelle Fisher 1983

### Ancestry

Lucie Shipgood is the youngest of 16 children and marries John Mead Richardson, the oldest of 10 children. Both the Shipgood family and the Richardson family reside on opposite sides of Essex in England. Lucie meets John Mead Richardson at a Salvation Army meeting. Mr. Richardson has to join the Salvation Army in order to marry Lucie Shipgood since a member could not marry outside the Salvation Army. Lucie was a captain and John a major.

### Early years

John Mead Richardson's parents move to Australia and want John and Lucie to move there with them. However, John and Lucie stay in England. John and Lucie had three (3) children: John Mead "Stanley" Richardson, born in 1883; Daisy Richardson, born 1885; and Violet Richardson, born August 27, 1888. The family leaves for America and settles in New York.

Due to Mr. Richardson's job selling insurance with Metropolitan Life Insurance, the family moved around a lot. Violet attended five (5) different high schools. Eventually, Violet came to Berkeley, California in 1905. She graduates from the University of California in 1912 and receives her master's degree in 1917.

Violet's sister, Daisy Richardson, marries Dr. Paul Marchant (an optometrist) and they have three (3) children: a daughter Daisy (called Sissy); a son Jack Marchant; and a son Paul Marchant.

In 1913, Violet started and organized the Physical Education Program in Berkeley schools. She also worked in schools for the blind and deaf, and also taught lifesaving swimming classes. In 1918, the United States was dealing with the flu epidemic and schools were closed down during this time.

Violet's brother, Stanley, was in Canada teaching when World War I broke out. He enlists with Canadian forces and went overseas for four (4) years. Stanley marries and has four (4) children.

In 1921, Violet's father, John Mead Richardson, dies.

### Violet and Stanley

In 1923, Violet meets Stanley Arthur Ward, who graduates from the University of California and receives his master's degree from Stanford. In June 1926, Violet and Stanley marry. On December 18, 1927, Violet and Stanley welcome their son, John. John graduates from College of the Pacific in Stockton, California. John marries Gloria and has four (4) children: daughter Sandra Ward West (who had one child, Daisy Elizabeth West); and three (3) sons: Art, Jim, and Tom.

# HISTORY OF VIRGINIA RICHARDSON

## **Beginning of Soroptimist**

In 1921, Stuart Morrow, a professional organizer of men's clubs, started a women's service club and asked Violet Richardson Ward to start the club. Violet refused to sign a charter until Mr. Morrow assured Violet to make it an international club. Mr. Morrow agreed. The first Soroptimist club launched in Oakland, California with 85 women on October 3, 1921. The first club was named "The Alameda County Club." The first meeting was held October 10, 1921, with Violet Richardson Ward as the first president. By 1927, Stuart Morrow sells his rights of ownership to the Soroptimist organization for \$5,500.00. By October 30, 1928, the Alameda club becomes the "Oakland Club."

In 1924, Paris, The Hague, and Amsterdam, joined with the British group to form the European Federation in 1928.

The American clubs formed the American Federation of Soroptimist clubs later named "Soroptimist Federation of the Americas" and later "Soroptimist International of the Americas Inc." July 1934, Paris, was the first international convention. By this time, the American Federation had 53 clubs; Great Britain had 32 clubs, and there were 25 clubs in 10 countries.

In 1952, Copenhagen, offices were established for Soroptimist International association. In 1956, Soroptimist International Convention held in New York City. Violet Richard Ward was introduced as the originator of Soroptimist.

In 1970, a bust of Violet Richardson Ward was made by Ono de Ruyter, famous sculptor in San Francisco. In 1971, it was the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Soroptimist, and the American Federation entered a float in the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California, on January 1, 1971. April 1971, at the regional conference in San Francisco, that bust of Violet Richardson Ward was unveiled. Also in 1971, the international convention was held in Rome. A copy of the International Association Golden Jubilee History 1921-1971 was presented to Violet Richardson Ward. Violet had been a member of the Berkeley club for 51 years, from 1928 to 1979.

**August 27, 1978 - Violet's 90<sup>th</sup> birthday**

**August 2, 1979 - Violet passes away.**

**We now have 21 representatives at the UN, and 7 centers**

**We have General Consultative Status at the UN; evidence based at grass roots level to prove and show that we know about women and girls.**

**President's Appeal is now being referred to by President Sharon Fisher as "international appeals."**

**We have had: See Solar Cook Solar; Birthing in the Pacific; Women Water and Leadership; and now the Road to Equality.**

**Local clubs and SI have to close the gap and work to bring local clubs up to date on SI and the UN. Everything starts in our communities. How can we close this gap from local to SI. We can collaborate with other organizations as a start.**

**We have six (6) barriers regarding Gender Equality: 1) domestic violence; 2) human trafficking; 3) forced and child marriages; 4) FGM; 5) Older persons; 6) Migration-people on the move.**

**Local clubs can hold forums and/or webinars on these topics.**

**What have local clubs done in this era of the coronavirus? We are looking for something to measure. Data is needed.**

**Regarding the topic of FGM (female genital mutilation), we have these women who have knowledge about the topic: Rugiatu Turay of Sierra Leone; Lisa Camara of Gambia; Gift Abu of Nigeria; Ayo Bella of Nigeria; Ifrah Ahmed of Somalia; and Sadia Husseinn of Kenya.**

Continued message from our former Governor Vivian Walczesky:

**Thursday, September 10, 2020** Attended via ZOOM by Vivian Walczesky and 200+ Soroptimist members around the globe.

**Subject: SI Voices – Trafficking Our Girls Webinar**

**Three (3) SPEAKERS:** Jacqueline (Jackie) Shapiro; Theresa Flores/SOAP; and Evelien Holsken of Free a Girl.

**Jacqueline (Jackie) Shapiro** – She is one of SI representatives to the United Nations in NY. She is also a representative to ECPAT (End Child Prostitution and Trafficking). She has been at the UN for 25 years and she reminded us that the UN has been around for the past 75 years. CSW was created in 1946, and ten (10) years ago, UN Women emerged to advocate for women’s rights. Trafficking is part of the UN Women program. The Palermo Protocol: to prevent, protect, and promote cooperation among the current 190 member states regarding trafficking. Numbers regarding trafficking: 40.3 million people are in modern day slavery around the globe; 4.8 million forced sexual work; \$150 Billion profit worldwide; and 66% of global profits are from sexual exploitation. Trafficking is the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest enterprise in the world.

**Theresa Flores** – told her story to the audience. Many of us in the Midwestern Region have had Theresa as a guest speaker but the global audience had not heard the story. At the age of 40, Theresa realized that she was a survivor of human trafficking. She did not disclose her rape and all the “prostituted” times. Her trafficker said that Theresa “had no name” and her traffickers told her they would “kill her family” and blackmailed her with photos. She spoke about her SOAP project and how the global audience could participate.

**Evelien Holsken** – of Free a Girl. She is founder and director, and Nicole Franken is the campaign manager. Evelien is 50 years old, living in the Netherlands, and started “Free a Girl” in 2008. Free a Girl is an international organization that believes that every child should grow up in a safe environment. Child rights are still violated on a large scale. She said that violence against women and girls has intensified; that sexual exploitation of children will increase and that it continues online. Focus should be on children and law enforcement agencies. In 2017, the School for Justice was created, a program to give survivors the opportunity to study law and other human rights related studies, and to empower these survivors to change the system from within. Main donor to School for Justice are Soroptimists of the Netherlands. As campaign manager and social activist, Nicole Franken spoke of a video in which President Sharon Fisher has a part, as well as Amal Clooney and Nadia Murad. Nicole Franken will furnish the video to Sharon Fisher. Support for Free a Girl may be made to [FreeAGirl.org](http://FreeAGirl.org).

**Sue Riney** – said another webinar will be available on September 24, 2020, entitled “Protecting the Rights of Older Persons.” The Soroptimist Lab: [MightyNetworks.com](http://MightyNetworks.com), and find “Teams” for a conversation with other Soroptimists.

### **GERALYN STIEMKE, Live Your Dream Winner**

In a note to SI Milwaukee Awards Chair Barbara Collignon, GERALYN STIEMKE, Hartland, left no doubt about the value to her of the Live Your Dream Awards she received after years of stress and financial hardship:

“I can tell you that I am in such a better place mentally and emotionally since being blessed with winning the award. It alleviated a tremendous amount of stress for me. I even feel like a different person. I strongly believe that my situation will only continue to improve. I am six months into my surgical technician program and have one year left. I am working full time at a nursing home on the night shift. As hectic as my schedule is, there is finally a light at the end of the tunnel. A huge reason for that is due to what you all do with Soroptimist. You actually change lives. Thank you so many times over for giving my children and me hope. God bless you.”

GERALYN has been working at two to three jobs to support herself and her daughter, Mikayla, 17, and son, Hunter, 14, after divorcing the husband who was imprisoned for abuse of the

children. She knew she had to get more education in order to provide a better life, and, after eight years away from school, she entered the surgical technician program at Milwaukee Career College.

“I’m chomping at the bit to graduate and get going,” she said. “I see only good things ahead.”

When she can find some free time, GERALYN enjoys being a role model by showing her children the pleasure to be found in the out-of-doors. She said she loves hiking and hunting and fishing. Closer to home she maintains a vegetable garden and supports three cats and her son’s African bull frog. “That thing is huge, and really ugly,” she said.

GERALYN also makes time to support friends who need a helping hand.

She's a woman of many talents and many interests and she is runner-up for SI Milwaukee's Live Your Dream award, 2019-2020.

## VIRGINIA WAGNER EDUCATIONAL AWARD

### **AUGUSTA IKE, Virginia Wagner Award Winner**

Her family won the immigration lottery in Nigeria, in 2001, opening the way for them to find a better future in the United States.

“God led me here,” Augusta Ike said, “but it is my parents who inspired me. They have worked very hard to get out of poverty and to advance the lives of all of us.” Augusta has three brothers and a sister.

“Education is a gift that I never took for granted. I always wanted to know more, do more, and be more. Since my mother dropped everything to make sure her children have a life worth living, I will make sure that I never forget who I am, where I come from, and what got me here.”

Augusta said she felt the need to understand herself before she could be able to help others escape depression and trauma.

“I am not an African American but American African. I assimilated to American customs to move through spaces efficiently. I learned what makes an American an American and mimicked it to be seen as normal and not an outsider. For a long time I lost myself in trying to be a true American, but as time continued I realized that I am a Nigerian

American who can’t be broken because it is my destiny to help people,” Augusta wrote in applying for the Virginia Wagner Award.

This fall she moved to Madison to start her pursuit of a future in which she will be able to help the trauma healing process after earning certification in communications or gender women’s studies. She entered the University of Wisconsin already having earned credits in her psychology goal while a student at Rufus King High School in Milwaukee.

The switch from neuropsychology to an emphasis on abnormal psychology and trauma came this summer when she was able to lead a friend away from suicide. “Some keep their emotions bottled up and feel that showing them makes them look weak, but showing them is when you really are the strongest.” She said, “God gave life, then it is worth living.”

“I am joyful. I’m still searching for who I want to be. Perhaps it eventually will be teaching. I give all that worry to God. But I know the future is bright,” Augusta said.

In her spare time she loves to read, dance (she was in a competitive dance team in high school) and shop. She’s especially happy celebrating birthdays, socializing and networking.
