

Lata Shastri and I traveled close to 40 hours (there and back) to participate in the exceptional 21st #SIConventionKL2019! MWR was well represented with 8 members and 1 honorary member! Bev Bucur, Fran Ingram, Amanda Melkert, Bev White Todd, Dez Grin, Careth Flash and honorary member Helen Bailey!

The sessions and experts covered: "Woman at War" keynote with Christina Lamb Gender Equality for Water & Food Security, Financial Security for Women, Trafficking, Women in STEM and Healthcare. The Soroptimist workshops covered relevant topics for the challenges we have to address as Soroptimist's today. I personally attended and live tweeted 2 sessions: 1. Effective SI Engagement with the UN and 2. Connecting SI in the Digital World. The voice of a diverse Soroptimist's across all of our territories was insightful as we discussed these important agenda items. The breadth of the topics combined with the depth of the speakers has made for a great opportunity to learn and grow. Malaysia has opened their arms to us with a welcome for the Queen, food and drink to ensure we never go hungry and the most warm and hospitable conference team I have ever experienced.

The United Nations Civil Society Conference (previously known as the Department of Public Information (DPI) Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) Conference) is the premier event in the civil society calendar at the United Nations. It typically attracts more than 3,000 participants representing over 700 civil society organizations from over 100 countries. Each Conference focuses on a different United Nations topic of interest related to the work of civil society and NGOs. This international forum also brings together senior United Nations system officials, prominent international civil society organizations, academicians, public opinion makers and international media to discuss issues of global concern. Kuala Lumpur, SI Convention... oh my goodness, there is SO MUCH. It was amazing.

The theme: "Soroptimist Enable A Sustainable World, Global Connections, Empowered Women" with members there representing the 75,000 Soroptimists from 125 countries and territories. Coming soon are clubs in Vietnam and Myanmar; China is in planning stages. Also coming are an online Soroptimist Museum, and the new online Soroptimist News.

From outgoing President Mariet: updated on the water initiative: over \$350,000 raised to date, with educational and water retention programs in three nations so far.

We also learned that the UN now has their Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific in Bangkok, Thailand. So we now have 20 UN representatives in the seven UN centers around the world.



The queen of Malaysia spoke of her own background working to empower women and girls, having served on the board of Girl Guides/Girl Scouts International; she was nominated for president of Associated Country Women of the World, which works to help rural women fight gender inequality and violence, and health issues. She also reinforced the importance of the water initiative.

She left us with this quote: "Women are Prime Ministers of their homes and we are God's gift to men."

Keynote speaker on day one was Christina Lamb OBE, author & now chief foreign correspondent Sunday Times of London, a war correspondent for 32 years, with an amazing story to tell.

She interviewed Pakistan's Bhutto in the 1980s. She was in Afghanistan when they were fighting the Russians, staying at the same hotel as arms dealers. In 2006 she was back in Afghanistan when her group was ambushed and she was close to being killed. The next year, back in Pakistan, she was on a bus that was bombed and 150 people were killed.

In 2013 she co-wrote "I Am Malala", becoming friends with the family, She has met many many raped women and Human Trafficking survivors of ISIS. In 2015 she interviewed a Syrian refugee who escaped in a wheelchair, with her sister pushing her; they learned fluent English by watching Days of Our Lives. (An American Soap Opera)

We also met the future President of the new Africa federation. Mary Muia of Kenya.

Other topics a highlights of each (oh, this is so difficult) included:

1."Gender Equality for Water and Food Security"

Participants included a university professor of Change Management, the founder and Director of H2Go, the Legal Director of Heineken Malaysia, and outgoing President Mariet.

Takeaways: a) From Parakramabahu the Great (1153-1186): Let not even a drop of water obtained from rain, flow to the sea without benefiting mankind." b) water crises are one of the 5 top risks for next 10 years per the World Economic Forum. c) Time spent by girls collecting water is time not spent in education. d) In over 60 countries, over 50% of the population have no (that is <u>NO</u>) access to clean, safe water. e) Girls drop out at school at puberty if their schools is without water. f) Every 9 seconds someone dies due to water and sanitation issues, over 3.5 million per year. g) Heineken has stepped up to the plate, instituting rehabilitation in six Malaysian rivers plus educating adults and children to monitor the rivers, establish community gardens, as well as how to recycle river garbage into art. Their water harvesting systems are benefiting 1,000s of people in Malaysia, and more to come. h) food harvested from 28% of land used for agriculture is wasted.

- 2."Women Take Charge, End Violence, Trafficking & Exploitation". Participants included owner of a digital marketing and design agency, a rep from UN Fund for Family and Population, SE Asia.

 Takeaways: a) Human trafficking generated about \$217 billion in 2018. The chain of control consists of several layers of intermediaries, including crime syndicates. b) trends are for more diverse and sophisticated methods to recruit, more and more children and younger adults, as well as an increasing culture of sexploitation. c) need to work w/ youth, especially to educate young men. We saw a video of teen boys standing in a hallway, getting ready to have their turn with a prostitute. The first boy enters; when the woman turns to face him it's his mom. d) Recap: lack of education, financial, legal, professional, medical, and opportunity equities put females in greater susceptibility to domestic violence, and Trafficking. e) "We (Soroptimists) should be completely proud of our contributions because we are changing the lives of people 'on the ground".
- **3.**"Women Leading in Technology & Innovation". Participants were an MBA/ Civil Engineer, a Malaysian engineer, a PhD physics who is President of a science commission

 Takeaways: **a**) STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Math) should also mean "START THEM EARLY MOVEMENT. **b**) 80% of new jobs next 10 yrs will demand math and/or science, **c**) In 1888, Bertha Benz used her dowry money so her husband Karl could develop his car. **d**) firms with more women in management have up to 34% higher Return on Investment. **d**) things women invented include the circular saw, life raft, brake pads, windshield wipers, and much much more. **f**) #MakeWhatsNext
- **4.** Our Climate, Our Responsibility, Our Actions. Participants included a scientist who was part of Al Gore's "An Inconvenient Truth" team who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 2007, a World Bank environment & natural resources specialist, a Senior Executive Director of Sunway Educational Group, and a former minister of Housing, Spatial Planning and the Environment of Netherlands

Takeaways: a) More people die every year in NYC from extreme heat than from guns, b) the increasing water crises, floods, fires, droughts, heat waves and extreme weather world wide are all attributable to Climate Change. c) Extreme weather events, failure of climate change mitigation and adaptation are two of

the top 5 risks for next 10 years per the World Economic Forum. d) The earth's temperature now is the highest in *3 million* years. We are moving to 6th worst extinction in history, e) The richest countries are most responsible but poorest countries feel results soonest and most drastically. Richer nations should help poorer countries work to goals. f) Climate changes disproportionately affects the poor, especially females as women are main farmers in poor countries, producing 45-80% of food. g) 2018 was the 3rd consecutive year of increased number of world hungry. h) 1/4 of human health issues worldwide are due to environmental degradation. i) too much of economy is based on CO2. We need to phase out coal, gas, oil in next 30-40 years. We also NEED to hold temperature rises well below 2*, hopefully less than 1.5*.j) There is a lack of leadership, ambition, commitment among politicians. Before the Copenhagen 2015 conference there was Greenland dialog to accelerate later formal meetings, agreed upon proposals, with trust built among scientists, Ministers. Then the heads of State went to Copenhagen, took over, and everything blew up. All negotiation, compromise, strategies were lost due to power issues and antagonisms. (k Future costs will be increasing worldwide: water insecurity, food insecurity, displacement and migration (more refugees), increased violence as urban issues escalate due to people leaving their villages to come to the cities.

To do: Work to promote sustainable development, sustaining rain forests, solar panels roofs of all buildings, write letters demanding action EVERY Friday, 9 AM EST. "Women and girls around the world can save our planet.

One more takeaway: Each of these topics was covered by one keynote speaker, followed by a conversation among the keynote speaker and the other experts in that area. Afterward each panel took questions from the audience through Twitter or hand written notes. After the Climate Change session, the keynote speaker noted that about half the questions were basically the same: "What can been done about all the superpowers that won't acknowledge Climate Change. What can we do?" I looked at my travel companion and asked, "How many superpowers do you think there are that are denying Climate Change?"

There is so much else I'm not covering.... a section on women's health, the projects and programs of each federation, the breakout workshops, the incoming President and her new President's Appeal, the new African Federation, Bev Bucur's talk, not to mention meeting new amazing friends from all over the world. I even met two of my Facebook friends in person!

There was much conversation about the San Francisco Birthday bash in May 2021. Many women I spoke to from all over were looking forward and could not understand how any one from US would not attend. So if you'd like to attend an international convention without the travel time and passport, I strongly recommend you plan for San Francisco. And wait till you hear the details about Dublin. in 2023...can't wait!!

On July 13 Soroptimist collected food and cash at Lannings, Bakers IGA, and Wal-Mart in coordination with the Knox County Sheriff Dept. This event helps restock the pantry in all 5 Interchurch locations: Centerburg, Bladensburg, Danville, Fredericktown and Mount Vernon. The summer months are their busiest time with children home from school.

Total cash collected was \$11,991.62 along with 2,164.00 items going directly to Interchurch which served 7,204 households in 2018. Every dollar donated purchases ten dollars worth of food at the Mid-Ohio Foodbank!





The Community Outreach to Runaway Youth (CORY) Project has had tremendous success with the second distribution of posters for this year. The posters were distributed to 652 locations and seven of the eight missing children or teens have been found. Law enforcement has received a tip about the last one, so we are very hopeful.

The club is also supporting efforts to pass Ohio Senate Bill 105. This bill requires massage parlors to have licensed massage therapists. Ohio is the only state that allows for unlicensed massages. Massage is the only profession in healthcare that spends so much time with someone behind doors while one person is clothed, and

another person is not. This creates intense vulnerability for massage therapists. The general public is impacted with assumptions of sex acts and the stigma of massage parlors. Not all massage parlors are involved in sex and labor trafficking. This bill closes the loophole in state law to allow for businesses to operate as fronts for commercial sex enterprises.

We have moved the showing of the film "I am Jane Doe" to the spring of 2020. The Dayton community continues to rebuild after the devastating Memorial Day tornadoes and continues to heal after the August mass shooting. We will endure. We will thrive. We are #DaytonStrong.




Current projects that our Canton/Stark County Club is involved with include:




